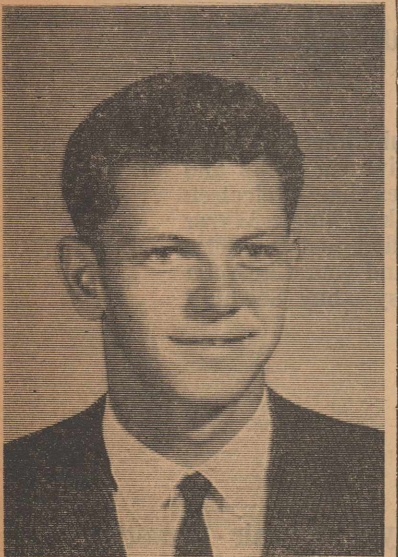
SPENDS EASTER AT RED RIVER

CLARENDON COLLEGE RECEIVES ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS ON COLLEGE WORK-STUDY PROGRAM

The Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D. C. announced April 11 the approval of funds for the Federal College Work - Study Program for the fiscal year of July 1, 1966-June 30, 1967.

Clarendon College received an allotment of \$43,665 from the program which was created under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, according to Mr. Vaughan, President of the college. This figure represents more than a 100 percent increase over last year and will open up some sixty to seventy jobs for students at the college. Job categories range from office and secretarial personnel to that of maintenance and grounds, both on campus and off campus. Applications are now being taken for both summer and fall job openings. Students who wish to work while attending college should write or call:

Student Work-Study Representative, Clarendon College, Clarendon, Texas, to obtain information and to ascertain their eligibility to work under the Federal program.

JACK HIGHTOWER MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT FOR SENATOR

During his first term in the State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon today formally announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary for re-election to a second term in the Texas Senate. He seeks election in the new 30th Senatorial District which includes Briscoe County.

Senator Hightower, 39, was the choice of a wide margin of voters in 1964 to succeed the well-known Sen. George "Cotton" Moffett of Chillicothe, longtime agricultural leader. Senate, Sen. Hightower became well known as an effective and dedicated legislator. He has achieved the enviable record of appointment as chairman of an important committee and a member of twelve of the Senate's committees, some of the most important of which are: Water and Conservation; Finance; State Affairs; Counties, Cities and Towns; and Agriculture and Livestock. He has been named by the Lieutenant Governor to two interim committees to make studies of the Texas Election Laws and the needs of the Nursing Profession in Texas. The findings and recommendations of these committees will be made to the next legislature.

Senator Hightower's distinguished service earned his appointment by Governor Connally as a delegate to the Southern Regional Education Board Conference on Higher Education. His effectiveness has been fully demonstrated in his support of important legislative measures concerning water and soil conservation, education, law enforcement, water and air pollution, health, etc.

Senator Hightower has an impressive record of public service. He served two years in the Texas House of Representatives and seven years as District Attorney. In 1957 he was appointed by the Governor to the Texas Law Enforcement Study Commission, and at the time of his election to the Texas Senate, was vice-chairman of the Board of Regents of Midwestern University.

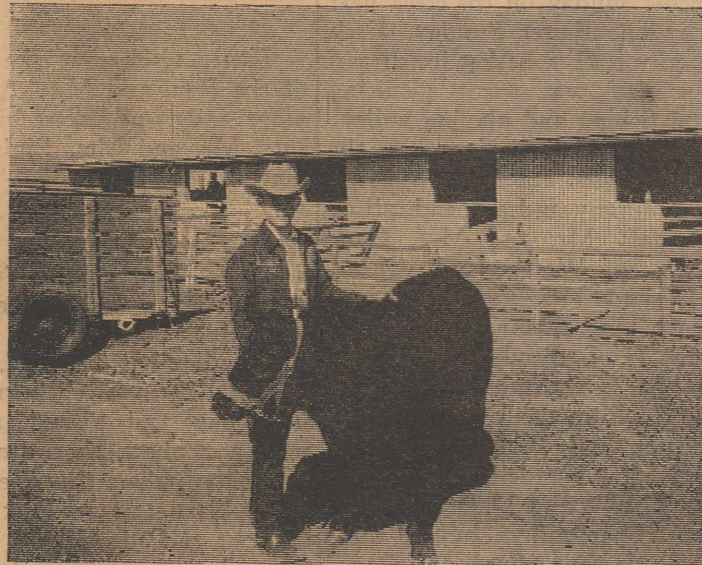
A native of Memphis, Texas, where his mother, Mrs. Walter Hightower, still resides, Sen. Hightower moved to Vernon in 1951 to begin the practice of law upon his graduation from Baylor University. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

He is a leader in civic, religious and fraternal affairs on the local and state level. His wife, the former Colleen Ward, is a native of Tulia, Texas, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ward of that city. The Hightowers have three daughters: Ann, 13, Amy, 9, and Alison, 6.

The recent Supreme Court decision concerning redistricting caused a major rearrangement of Senatorial Districts in West Texas. The new 30th district now contains 90 thousand voters, approximately 60 percent of whom live in that part of the new district heretofore represented by Senator Hightower and approximately 40 percent live in that part of the district heretofore represented by another Senator.

"In order to properly represent the people a Senator should know them, their problems and their needs. I have been privileged to know many people all over the wide area that is now the 30th District. I hope to become better acquainted with many hundreds more during this campaign. My promise is to serve you sincerely," Senator Hightower said.

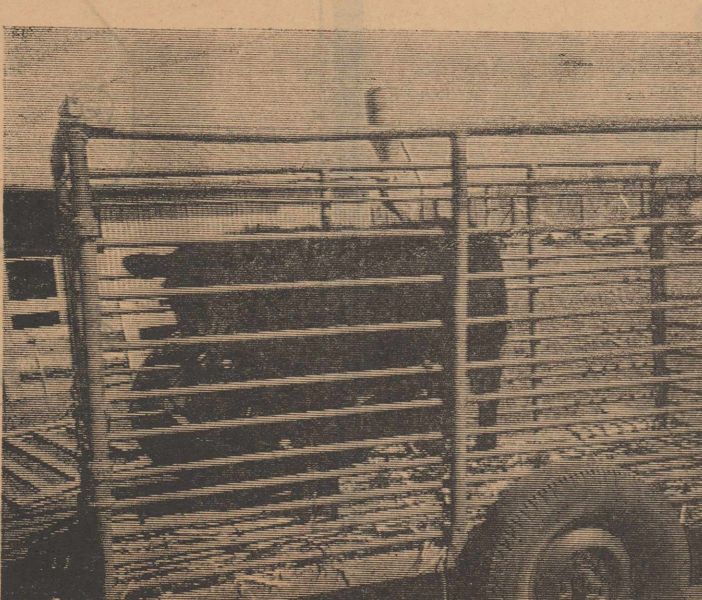

CLARENDON COLLEGE AGGIE CLUB RODEO SCHEDULED FOR 22 & 23

The Aggie Club of Clarendon College will be presenting the second annual Clarendon College Rodeo at the Donley County Fairgrounds, April 22 and 23. Performances will begin at 6 p. m., Friday and Saturday nights and 2:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

There will be a total of six events: bareback riding, bull riding, tie-down calf roping, girl's barrel racing, and girl's pole bending. Contestants will be limited to two head per event. Fees for boys' events are \$5.00 per head and fees for girls' events are \$4.50 for one run or \$8.00 for two runs.

Livestock will be furnished by the Ration Rodeo Company of Happy. There will be fifteen head per event each performance.

A total of 38 trophies will be awarded, and will include a trophy for the all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl. To qualify for all-around cowboy, one must enter in a riding and a roping event. A trophy will be given to the top individual of each event for each performance. Each event averaged for three performances will carry three trophies.

Contestants must be at least fourteen years of age and not over 21, unless they are college students. A Queen contest will be held following the Saturday afternoon performance and any girl is eligible who meets the requirements of contestants. Queen contestants need not enter the main events.

The purpose of the rodeo is to promote school publicity, create interest among the members, and finance annual Aggie Club tours. The tours take the club to many outstanding agricultural enterprises and activities of the country. The Aggie Club hopes eventually to raise enough money to present scholarships to agriculture students.

Admission to the rodeo will be \$1.00 for adults and 50¢ for children under 12.

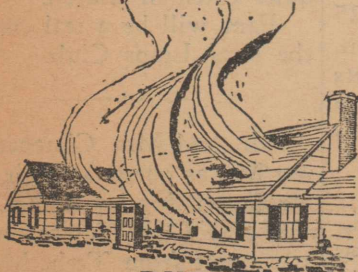
