## CONGRESSMAN ROGERS TO OFFER AMENDMENT TO BILL

In a telephone call from the office of Congressman Walter Rogers in Washington, D. C. on Tuesday of this week, the following information was released for publication:

Congressman Walter Rogers Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, said today he will offer an amendment to the Lower Colorado River Basin Project, legislation to include West Texas in studies to be made of future water requirements in the West and Southwest.

Congressman Rogers, who is presiding as Lower Colorado Projects continue said, "Watershed areas must think now about their future and consider all possible means to alleviate problems, including importation of water from water-surplus areas elsewhere in the United States or adjoining foreign countries. There is simply not enough room for all of us to live on the banks of the creek, but all of us must have water."

Congressman Rogers said, state responsibilities "cannot be avoided simply because the federal government is willing to help" adding "the Texas Panhandle and High Plains should be included in the Texas state water plan."

light Sonata," followed by a solo by Pam Curtis, "Everything's Coming Up Roses."

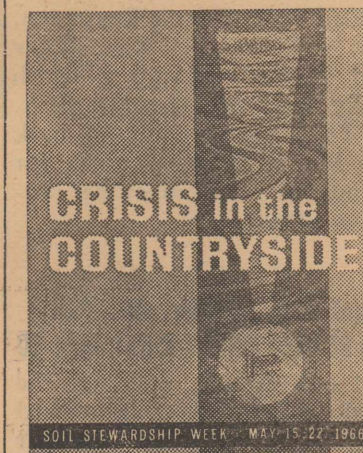

Is the land to become the "undeveloped space?" With more and more rural people moving to the towns and cities, increasingly greater responsibility is being placed on those that remain on the land. The Land is God's gift to all of us and it is here to be used, but without care and protection those who follow will have but little left to do with.

America is at this time a land of plenty but this condition can reverse and this land of plenty might become a land of want if the land we now have is not protected from improper use.

With each passing year more of our young people are leaving the land for life in the city and for each one that leaves the land the responsibilities of soil stewardship becomes increasingly greater.

Land improperly used and cared for loses its natural beauty and productive usefulness. Orderly planning of resource use is the responsibility of all. With improper use of the resources we are failing our responsibility to our children and to society.

Conservation is no longer a problem of the farmer alone but it is a problem to be faced by all Americans. For without proper use of the land all can suffer from the lack of clean water, lack of adequate food, and the natural beauty that this land has to provide.

Now is the time for all of us to exercise our freedom of speech

against the careless and deliberate misuse of the land and its resources.

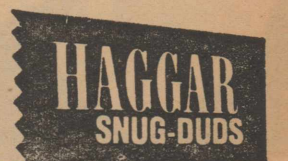
