The Soil Conservation Service of the USDA has provided all of the funds needed to date on construction work under the provisions of Public Watershed Act. \$301,338.59 this time. It is not possible for the U SDA to reimburse the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement District for any costs other than actual construction and vegetative costs. 


