**PARKS & WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT BACKS PANHANDLE EPIC THEATRE**

AUSTIN — Will Odom of Austin, chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, said the Pioneer Amphitheater complex in massive Palo Duro Canyon State Park was expanded because "it is the one place with enough space and a back drop impressive enough to tell the real story of mighty Texas."

He said the improvements carry out part of Governor John Connally's program for broadening and developing Texas

state parks and are specifically needed because of tremendous interest shown in the rugged setting now reflecting early-day activities. These include an Indian hideout that existed long before the explorer Francisco Vasquez de Coronado tumbled through a sea of grass into what also later gained further notoriety from rendezvousing smugglers.

Odom said the state financial aid is significant in that the original amphitheater project to elaborately depict pioneer history was privately financed through Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, Inc. now headquartered in nearby Canyon, Texas.

"Success of the area - wide venture was demonstrated last year," he said, "when an amazing turnout of 36,000 persons saw 'Thundering Sounds of the West,' a lively, inspiring show which ran through the summer months."

The intriguing setting in Texas' "Little Grand Canyon" comprises a complex of modest buildings, arranged around the open air theater itself, all nestled in a curve of land facing a 600-foot bluff forming the stage backdrop.

From their seats, Odom says, patrons who came from virtually all states last year, could see "the magnificent Palo Duro Canyon and imagine themselves living in a time when wild buffaloes sought refuge in the mam-

moth depression from tribesmen, hide hunters, and blizzards.

"This noble undertaking," said Odom, "honors the Panhandle pioneers and provides a stage for the preservation of their memorable experiences. The deep setting itself in the early days was so remote and so forbidding that only the adventurous knew about it. Now its accessibility is complete since it is only twenty-five miles from the junction of four national highways in Amarillo."

Odom said the improvements, particularly dressing rooms, storage space, paved parking area and a shop, will permit more varied presentations. These will include the Paul Green Drama "Texas" (currently underway) about the epic develop-

ment of the west. This actually provided inspiration for the original installation.

Dressing rooms form the arms of a large U-shaped building, 102 by 72 feet. The center section shop provides for a

**Boating Tips...**



**LOADING**

Never step on the gunwale of a small boat (it's pronounced "gunnel" and refers to the top edge of the boat's side). Step as nearly in the center of the craft as possible. Step aboard, don't jump, and use your hands to steady yourself. Never let your fingers come between the gunwale and dock. Don't carry your Mercury outboard or other gear aboard. Place it on the edge of the dock, get aboard, then lift the equipment in after you. If the dock is high and you are alone, consider lowering the motor into the boat with a line while standing on the dock. If the boat is pulled to shore for loading, one person should steady the boat while others climb in over the bow. Those who go aboard first should sit near the stern to raise the bow so it can be easily shoved off by the last person to climb in.
