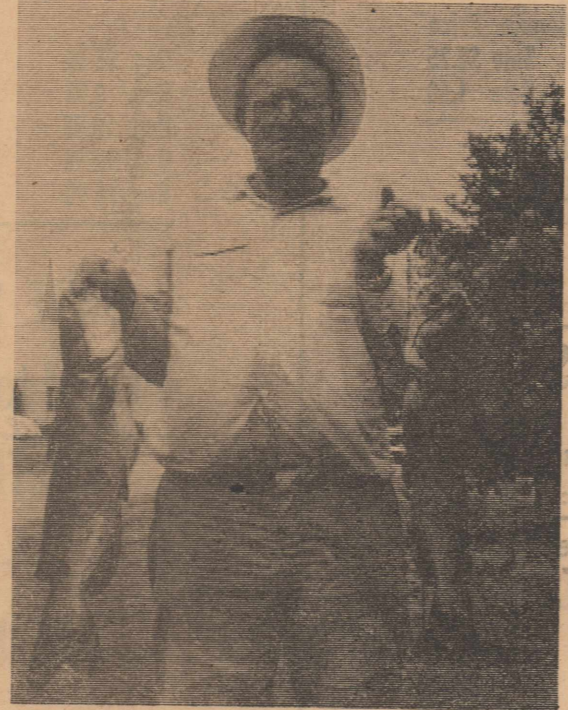

Elmer Berryhill, Vocational Agriculture Teacher at Quitaque High School will participate in the In - Service Education Workshop for Teachers of Vocational Agriculture to be held at the Hotel Texas, Fort Worth, August 9 - 12. Guest speaker for the opening general session on Tuesday, August 9, will be R. L. McMillon, Branch Manager, Business Men's Assurance Company of America, Abilene, Texas. The meeting will start at 8:30 a. m. in the Grand Ballroom.

Conference workshops to be developed include Recent Trends in Swine Production, Beef Production, Developing and Conducting Agriculture Mechanics Programs, Leadership and Citizenship Training through the Texas Association of Future Farmers, Study of the Proposed Revised Lesson Plans of Farm Electrification, Young Farmer Training and Assisting First and Second Year Teachers in Developing and Conducting Local Programs of Vocational Agriculture.

Also on the agenda for the week is the annual association Awards Breakfast during which tenure awards will be presented to 10, 15, 20, 25, 30 and 35 year teachers. Awards will also be presented to Honorary Members, Legislators, District Public Relations Chairmen, School Administrators, and Members of the Press, Radio and Television.

Approximately 1200 Vocational Agriculture Teachers are expected to attend the meeting. The Vocational Agriculture Education program in the state is under the direction of the Division of Vocational Agriculture Education, Texas Education Agency, with George H. Hurt, Austin, Director. Teachers meet annually for training in new developments and trends in Vocational Agriculture Education.

Mr. Berryhill will be on the program as speaker on Wednesday during one of the sectional meetings. This will be the 14th conference that he has attended in 16 years.

FEDERAL MATCHING FUNDS APPROVED FOR DEVELOPMENT AT PALO DURO CANYON STATE PARK

AUSTIN, August 4 — Approval of \$271,494.00 in matching funds for the development of outdoor recreational facilities at Palo Duro Canyon State Park has been received from the Denver Regional Office of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will Odom announced.

The total cost of the project including the State's share, will be \$542,988.00.

Two new concession facilities will be built at the vast 15,103-acre Panhandle park. One will be a 2500 square foot concession building to be located in the floor of the Canyon and will serve the entire park. This facility will offer visitors grocery items, prepared food, souvenirs, ice, gasoline, oil, sundry drugs, notions and camping supplies.

The other concession area was included in the addition to the 1,300 seating capacity amphitheatre. This addition also includes a prop dressing room, a ticket booth and storage rooms.

Upon completion of the project, Palo Duro Canyon State Park will provide 26 trailer camp sites, 45 tent camp sites, and 75 picnic sites. Other fa-

ilities include rest rooms and showers, an interpretive building, and a park headquarters building. Miscellaneous items include the electrical system, roads, boundary fencing, and park signs.

A complete new water system will be built to support both the existing facilities and those included in the project, as well as those planned for future development.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park, largest of the Texas State parks, is located southeast of Amarillo in Randall and Armstrong Counties. Visitation to the park was 256,439 in 1964. The additional facilities will be completed in 1968, at which time visitation is expected to reach 432,000.

Chairman Odom, State Liaison Officer for the Administration of the Fund in Texas,

says this project has been approved by the Denver Regional BOR Office and now awaits final approval in Washington. The Federal matching funds are made available under the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service, shall be deemed to be resolved by the LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language: "Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion, the adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote in the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 7. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

"(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the lease, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General

Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir or works associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of the Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest on such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment."

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized."

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when monies are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred."

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified."

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, or a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned."

Section 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law."

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court."

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Section 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court." Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

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Banquet on a Picnic? by Betty Crocker

Who says you can't pack a banquet in a picnic basket? — or take along frosted grapes and onion biscuits made with sour cream? Not me, I'm all for bringing inside glamour to outdoor eating. And how's this for the rest of the menu? Cold fried chicken and potato salad. Vegetable relishes, olives and pickles. Lemonade with sprigs of fresh mint. And for dessert, a spectacular fresh fruit platter, garnished with the frosted grapes, and a slab of Cheddar cheese on the side. Pretty paper plates are fine. Your everyday stainless, too. But go ahead, use a washable cloth and napkins for your banquet table under the sky. Now, about those biscuits.

ONION BISCUIT SQUARES

- 2 cups sliced onions
- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 2 cups Bisquick
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to 450°. Brown onions in shortening. Sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon salt and the pepper. Mix Bisquick and milk with fork. Beat vigorously 20 strokes until stiff and slightly sticky. Knead 8 to 10 times on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Roll into 10-inch square. Pat firmly into greased 8x8x2-inch square pan, pressing edge to sides of pan. Top with onions. Beat remaining ingredients; pour over onions. Bake about 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Cut into squares.

Save your strength for croquet on picnic day by baking the biscuits and frying the chicken the day before. Wrap both in foil and store, ready to go, in the refrigerator.

And if you like to mix your potato salad on the spot, why not? Prepare and carry all ingredients in a large plastic bag except the salad dressing which goes into a jar. (Keep both chilled en route.) At banquet time, toss the salad right in the plastic bag — gently squeezing the bag to mix the dressing throughout.

To frost grapes for the fruit platter, brush with slightly beaten egg white. Dip in granulated sugar. Dry on rack. Arrange grapes atop fresh strawberries and peaches on a gold paper plate. Overwrap with foil for safe traveling. And isn't that posh for a picnic? Who but you would think to do it!

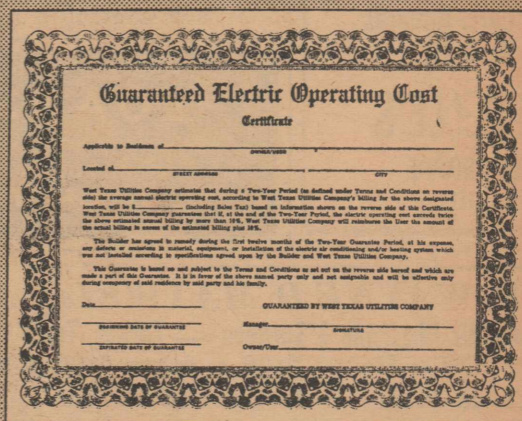

of recommended insecticides at the correct time.

In order to assist cotton producers in their fight against insect pests, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has released the 1966, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects" and copies are available at the offices of all county agents in cotton producing counties.

County Agent Leon Grosdidier said copies of the revised guide are now ready for distribution from his office to any interested cotton grower. Supplemental guides are also available for counties in South Texas and those in the High and Rolling Plains and the Trans-Pecos areas.

The county agent added that the guide not only lists the recommended chemicals but also the amounts of each needed for insect control. Advice and suggestions are also given on the safe use of insecticides.

Recommendations in the guide are based on the results of continuing research conducted throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Entomology Research Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The cotton insect control program for 1966 include three phases: namely, early season control which insures early fruiting and maturing in certain areas; late season control which insures continued fruiting and fruit protection and early stalk destruction and farm cleanup which reduces overwintering populations of boll weevils, pink bollworms and tobacco budworms.

to inspect their cotton fields to determine the degree of infestation and to check for such pests as aphids and spider mites which may influence the choice of insecticides before applying an insecticide.

Local county agents can supply additional information on insects as well as those which attack most of the farm crops and pastures.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

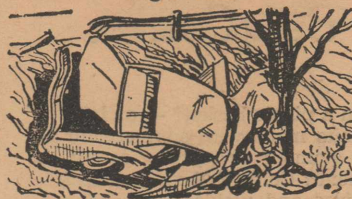
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
