PETE CLARKS DRIVE NORTH TO CANADA ON SIGHTSEEING TOUR

Mr. and Mrs. Pete Clark loaded their camper on their pickup and left here August 8, driving through Raton Pass N. M., and to Pueblo Colo. where they saw the great steel mill, then to Colorado Springs. From there they drove to Cheyenne, Wyo., then to Lead, S. D. in the Black Hills where they saw the largest gold mine in the U. S. A. They report the Black Hills as beautiful, being covered with fir trees.

The Clarks stopped at Deadwood, S. D. where they took pictures of a statue of a preacher named Smith, who was a Methodist Missionary, the statue bearing the date 8-20-1867. They visited Spearfish, S. D., home of the Black Hills State College. The Clarks caught up with the wheat harvest in full swing at Bowman, S. D. There the wheat is cut and put into windrows to dry and then it is combined.

The Clarks crossed the Missouri River at Williston, N. D., and drove through Fortuna, the last town in the United States before entering Canada. They spent one night at Weyburn, Saskatchewan, Canada. Gasoline there costs 47 cents per gallon. According to the Clarks the people there are very friendly.

On their return trip they drove back through North Dakota and saw pit mining at Noonan, N. D. They crossed Garrison Reservoir, which is 8 miles across, just before they came to Riverdale, N. D. and crossed the Missouri River again at Washburn. The farms in North Dakota have long barns, sometimes 2 or 3 barns at one farmhouse. The Clarks described all of the farmhouses as being small but all of them being two story high, regardless of the size. Many silos are seen and baled hay along the highway. They drove through Hazleton, N. D. which is the flax capital of the nation.

In Valentine, Neb. they saw women directing traffic, running mowers and hay bailers. Through North Platte, Neb. they saw the first telephone and electric power lines they had seen for many miles.

They drove through Scott City, Kansas, Garden City and crossed the Cimarron River at Liberal, Kansas. They drove on to Perryton and Pampa and visited Mrs. Clark's aunt, Mrs. Ola Orr, at Pampa. They found that her aunt had been very ill and had spent 18 days in the hospital at Groom, but she was recovering. The Clarks arrived home last Saturday, reporting a very good trip.

While the Clarks were on vacation their son, Dr. B. J. Clark and his family of Odessa, were vacationing in Washington, D. C. Another son, Burl, and his family had been here and found them gone. Burl and his wife had attended the funeral service of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Smith Purdy, in Tulsa and drove down here before returning home.

NEW DEAN AT CLARENDON COLLEGE

Mr. Kenneth Vaughan, President of Clarendon College, has announced the recent employment of Beryl D. Clinton as dean of the college. Mr. Clinton assumed his duties on August 1, following the resignation of the former dean, Weldon Day.

Mr. Clinton is a native Texan, graduating from Stanton High School in 1941. He is a graduate of West Texas State University, where he played a prominent role in the athletic program. He holds a B. S. degree, with a major in Physical Education and a double minor in speech and government, and a Master of Education degree in the fields of Administration and guidance. He has done additional graduate work at the University of Texas.

Mr. Clinton has been active in the field of education since 1947, accumulating experience in the areas of teaching, coaching, counseling, and administration. He previously taught and coached at Clarendon High School for two years and served as counselor of Donley County for one year. He has been associated with the public school systems at Childress and Amarillo, and prior to his acceptance of the position as Dean at Clarendon College, he served for three years as Superintendent of Schools at Stanton. In addition to his experience as an educator, he also spent three years in the sales and administrative departments of the life insurance business.

Mr. Clinton is a Baptist deacon, a Mason, and is an active member of Lions, Kiwanis, and Rotary Clubs. He is a member of T.S.T.A., N.E.A., District, state, and national Association of School Administrators, the American Personnel and Guidance Association, and the National Vocational Guidance Association. He is currently serving as secretary of District IV Texas Association of School Administrators.

Mr. Clinton is married to the former Billie Quinn, who is also a graduate of West Texas State University. They have 2 sons, Gary and Charles.

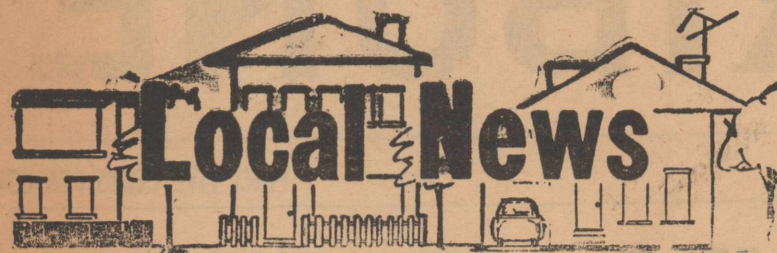

skirt sets—to keep these outfits clean while working in the kitchen or hobbies.

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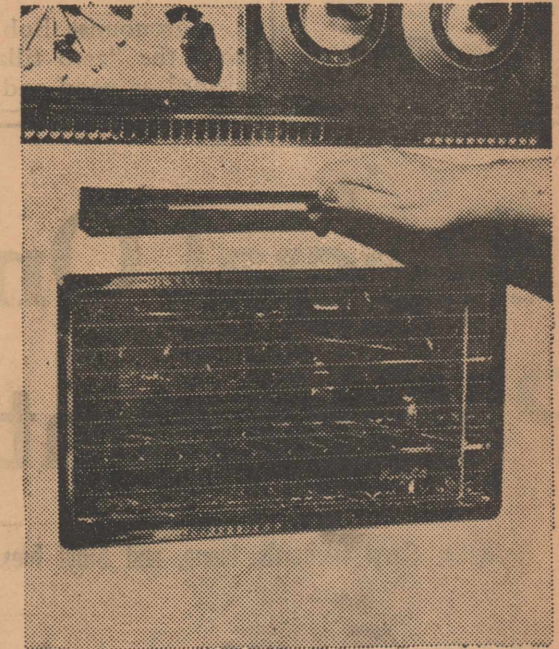

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be provided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

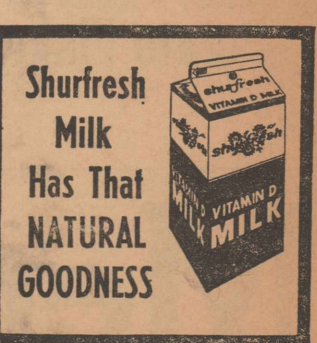

HIGH YIELDS FROM ZERO TILLAGE COTTON

McGREGOR, Tex. — Cotton is being grown with absolutely no cultivation at Texas A & M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center here.

Agronomist Bob Lynce reports the "zero tillage" cotton yielded as good and better last

year than cotton that was cultivated twice. He's experimenting to see if cotton or other row crops will produce high yields using herbicide—and no cultivation.

According to the A&M researcher, Treflan was broadcast and incorporated at 1 quart an acre early in the spring. Half the test was cultivated twice, the other half got no cultivation.

The cultivated cotton yielded 368 pounds of lint per acre. The cotton that was not cultivated yielded 387 pounds of lint per acre.

For this year's crop Lynch said he broadcast Treflan in the fall while the land was still flat. Then the land was bedded. The ground was not disturbed until planting time.

"There were no weeds in sight, so we didn't even till the beds before planting," he said. Now, the ground looks clean and almost weed-free. Lynch predicts another high yield from the zero tillage land.

He says banding also gives weed control—enough to reduce cultivation.

Peach season is in full swing. From now into September, homemakers should find a good selection of this luscious fruit on the market. Good buys should be available in most markets.

Select plump, firm, smooth

peaches that have very few if any blemishes. The peaches should show a full flush of pink. Peaches are usually picked just before maturity, as they ripen rapidly after this stage. Pale yellow peaches with a green cast were probably picked while still green. Gum oozing from a peach indicates insect damage.

Since peaches are yellow fruit, they contain vitamins A and C. They are very low in calories—only 46 calories for one medium sized, fresh peach. When you buy peaches, remember that one pound will serve four people. This allows two medium sized halves per person.

Fresh peaches are delicious, whole or sliced, but they are also good in assorted fruit and congealed salads, and in a wide

variety of tempting desserts. A peach half filled with jelly, juicy grapes or cottage cheese makes a colorful garnish to serve with ham, your favorite roast, or leg of lamb.

The next information we want to share with you comes from Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Texas A & M University Extension Consumer Marketing Specialist.

In general, look for best beef values on chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef, round steaks and roasts. There may be other beef "specials" in your favorite store, so check the price lists before buying.

Fryers remain an economy buy in most meat departments. Turkeys are attractively priced, too.

Frozen fish products continue to be good choices for the

main dish in your meal. If plan to use fish on the grill, use foil under it when cooking since fish flake easily.

White seedless grapes are among the best values at fruit counters. Peaches, nectarines, plums of several varieties, and bananas are other good fruit choices. Quality cantaloupes remain moderately priced.

Budgetwise, you can't beat potatoes this summer. Supplies are excellent, and they are a wholesome food, adaptable to so many ways of cooking they can be served every day for weeks without appearing the same way twice.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election. "The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state. Sec. 4. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board up to a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction, enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the State Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis. "Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part. "Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in that when monies are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities." Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
