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CANDIDATE MILLER TO SPEAK AT LIONS CLUB MONDAY NIGHT

Dee Miller, 32, district attorney of Potter-Armstrong counties, who has been selected by a special committee to be the Democratic nominee for Congress from the 18th district in the Panhandle, will speak at the Lions Club meeting Monday night, September 5.

Congressman Walter Riggs, who was not opposed in the primary, has announced that he would not seek re-election this November.

Miller was selected by the 30 county Democratic chairman that make up the congressional district.

He won on the fourth ballot over State Senator Andy Rogers of Childress and Dick Brown, a farmer from Hartley.

Miller attended West Texas State College, the University of Texas and SMU, from where he received his law degree.

He had been assistant district attorney before being appointed district attorney in mid-term.

Miller will face Bob Price, the Republican from Pampa, in November.

TELEPHONE COMPANY ISSUES NEW INSTRUCTIONS FOR LONG DISTANCE DIALING

A new and improved method of placing long distance calls is being recommended by General Telephone Company of the Southwest for customers served from the company's Memphis long distance center.

The new method which requires the use of the area code also eliminates the need for giving the name of the town being called, according to Wayne Goodrum, Manager of General's Memphis District.

"The best way to place a long distance call," Goodrum said, "is to give the operator the information in five steps. First, the Area Code of the place being called; next the number you are calling; the person you are calling (but only if you are calling person-to-person); then wait until the operator asks for your number. Your name will not be needed unless the operator asks for it."

"With the new procedure the operator enters all the necessary information on an IBM card instead of the more familiar tickets. All handling is purely automatic operation once the card passes from the operator's hand," Goodrum explained. "IBM computers, located at San Angelo, do all the rating of the calls automatically, eliminating possibilities of human errors."

"Beginning with the October bills details of most long distance calls will be printed directly on the customer's bill and will include the "from" and "to" points, called number, minutes talked and amount of call. A code will be used to indicate the type call and the rate class. This code is explained on the back of the bill."

General's Memphis long distance center serves as the "Master" office for 10 area communities. The exchanges are Clarendon, Dodson, Estelline, Flomot, Hedley, Lakeview, Memphis, Quitaque, Turkey and Wellington.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. — A record number of 460 students were candidates for degrees from Colorado State University this summer. The university held its annual summer commencement exercise on Friday, August 19 on the CSU oval.

This total included 190 candidates for bachelor's degrees, 250 for the master's and 20 seeking their Doctor of Philosophy degrees. At last summer's commencement 284 degrees were issued, making this year's total an extraordinary 60 percent increase in summer degrees awarded.

Robert Anderson delivered the commencement address. A CSU graduate himself, Anderson is now a vice president of the Chrysler Corporation and general manager of its Chrysler-Plymouth division. CSU President William E. Morgan awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree to Anderson at the commencement.

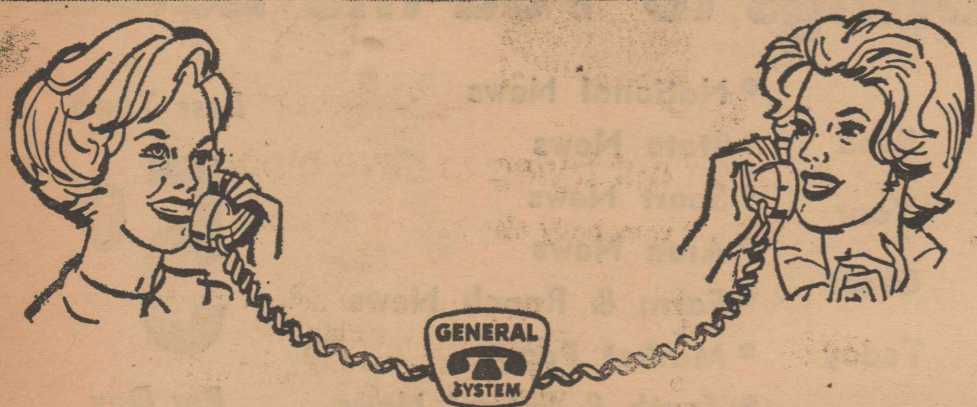

According to 18 million young people who participate in the National School Lunch Program in the United States, 380,500,000 hot dogs are consumed during a school year.

The number of hot dogs devoured in public school lunch programs during the 1965-66 school year would weigh 85 times more than the Statue of Liberty, according to a spokesman of the Sausage Council of the National Live Stock and Meat Board of Chicago.

Students usually choose to ignore the nutrition aspect when it comes to satisfying hunger pangs, snacking on only that which is either tasty or filling or handy, says Jacue Filiatreau, secretary for the Sausage Council. He explains that the hot dog is all three, but in addition

it contains body-building protein, plus many vitamins and minerals and contains only 146 calories.

The Sausage Council spokesman added that "the hot dog is certainly the noblest dog of all. It feeds the hand that bites it," he quipped.

While it is common to think of the hot dog reclining in a bun, the versatility and flexibility of the popular food knows no limitations. It turns up in casseroles, salads, pizzas and hors d'oeuvres.
