Sidelights From Washington

Our Subcommittee on Appropriations for Government-Owned Corporations is now in the third week of hearings. It will be late in May before our bill will be ready for submission to the House for action.

We have concluded hearings on the seven corporations that operate in the interest of agriculture. The Commodity Credit Corporation is perhaps the most powerful Government Corporation which deals with

agriculture. The CCC operates the price support and loan programs for cotton and grain and numerous other agricultural crops. Congress has guaranteed a support price, or loan, of 92 1/2 percent of parity on cotton for a two-year period following the year in which the official end of the war is declared. A support price of 90 percent of parity is similarly provided for other basic crops.

Loans and purchases thru the years by the CCC on cotton, wheat, corn, peanuts, eggs, and other farm products run into the billions of dollars, but the CCC has sustained relatively few losses on crop loans and purchases. On cotton the CCC

has made a net profit of \$147,000. Cotton farmers will rejoice over the fact that practically all Government owned cotton will have been disposed of prior to August 1st. This is particularly gratifying when it is recalled that at one time the CCC had on hand over 11,000,000 bales of surplus cotton.

Governor I. W. Duggan of the Farm Credit Administration has appeared in support of the four Government Corporations under his supervision, all having a direct bearing on the year to year operations of millions of American farms. Governor Duggan expressed alarm over the sky-rocketing of farm land prices. However, in contrasting the rise in farm real estate during World War I and World War II, he pointed out the encouraging fact that while the mortgage debt of farmers rose sharply during World War I, the mortgage debt of farmers went down during World War II. The mortgage debt of the farmers is now \$1.4 billion dollars, the lowest since 1916.

The remarkable war record of the farmers of America was made in spite of manpower shortages and often in the face of inadequate prices.

According to Governor Duggan, the total assets—real estate and otherwise—of farmers have increased from \$3 billion dollars in 1940 to \$9 billion dollars in 1946. He said that American farmers are now indebted for all purposes only to the extent of 10 per cent of their assets. It is estimated that in cash, Government bonds and bank deposits the farmers of the nation have a total of fifteen billion dollars.

Of course, what we need in West Texas right now is not agricultural statistics but a good rain. Quite often these days Members of Congress from agricultural areas can be seen standing in front of a weather map which hangs just outside the House of Representatives and that records weather conditions throughout the Nation as of one-thirty o-

clock each morning, Washington time. The red arrow, indicating fair weather and no rain, is too often apparent over West Texas.

By order of the President American flags are flying at half mast for thirty days on public buildings in the United States and on our embassies, legations and consulates in foreign countries out of respect to the memory of the late Chief Justice Harlan F. Stone.

BLUE GRAMA AND BUFFALO GRASS FOR SUMMER GRAZING

Blue grama and buffalo grasses may be relied upon by cattlemen for summer grazing, and western wheat and crested wheat may plug the gap between wheat field and the growth of native grasses in both spring and fall, the Texas A. and M. College has announced.

These recommendations were released by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in reporting results of the third year of steer grazing trials at Amarillo Conservation Experiment Station, carried on cooperatively by the Research and Operations Division of the Soil Conservation Service and the Station's Division of Range Animal Husbandry.

This test involved a 171-day winter period, from November 1, 1944 until Nov. 1, 1945. Through all phases 120 steers were used. They averaged 381 pounds when received at the Amarillo station. Calves wintered on native grasses with less than 2 pounds of cottonseed cake daily, then summered on native and reseeded grass pastures gained 495 pounds during the year; while similar calves wintered on wheat fields and sorghum bundles,

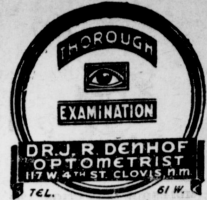
then summered on native and reseeded grass pastures made a total gain of 535 pounds.

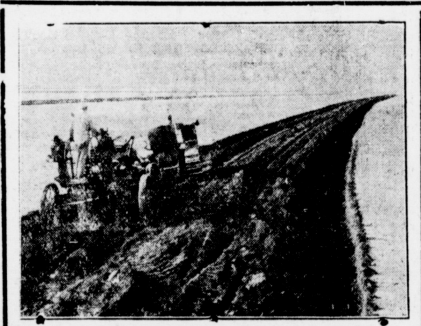

RAINFALL CONSERVATION

The precipitation over Bailey County is great enough nearly every year to produce good crops if all the rainfall were properly conserved. Frequently, however, the spring and summer rains fall very quickly and on unterraced fields run off without wetting the soil to any appreciable depth. It has been thoroughly demonstrated that terraces will check the runoff enough so that a fair crop can be produced, when on adjoining unterraced fields a complete failure results. In many instances where the slope is not too great the mere contouring of the crop rows will help very materially in holding the water on the land. While contoured rows help a great deal it is advisable to use terrace structures also.

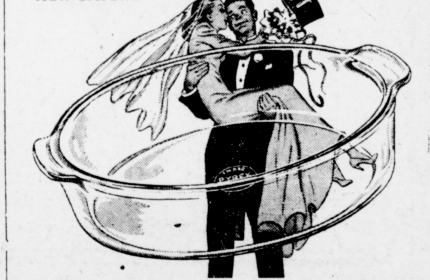

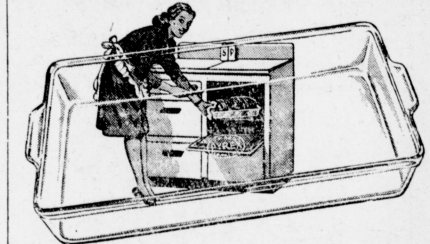

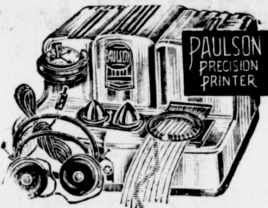

SANTA FE CROP REPORT
 A review of conditions in this area recently published by the Santa Fe, reads as follows:
 On account of continued dry weather, the general condition of wheat in Northwest Texas is gradually de-

clining. Very little moisture has fallen in this region since last September. In fact, Amarillo weather bureau reports only 3.4 in. of rainfall from October 1 to April 26, inclusive, and crop prospects are not very encouraging.

Wheat on summer fallow is holding its own fairly well, but that on other land is becoming spotted and badly burned. With the summer fallow is approximately 75,000 acres of irrigated wheat that is in fair condition and quite promising; otherwise, chances for a 50 percent crop in this area depend on rain in the immediate future.

Considerable of the poorest wheat is being plowed under, and this acreage will either be fallowed for 1947, or planted to grain sorghums between now and early June.

Wheat in the Orient line territory is also being greatly reduced by drought. Harvest throughout the northwest will be ten days to two weeks early, starting at Crowell about May 15 and moving to the South Plains about June 1.

Acreage of cotton and grain sorghums in northwest Texas where increases were expected, now will be gauged by the future moisture

supply. Some 7,000 acres of potatoes have been planted under irrigation at Herford, Plainview, Monroe and Muleshoe. Small acreages are being planted to onions, tomatoes, carrots and black eyed peas.

Our Composers

A German musician, poet and essayist, the foremost operatic composer of the 19th century as the founder of that operatic form called music drama, Wagner is universally recognized as a great creative force in the world of music, and his influence is on a par with work of Goethe and Shakespeare. Wagner was a native of Leipzig. His father died five months after his sons' death. A year later his mother remarried and they moved to Dresden.

The boy was very studious and at the age of twelve, he translated the first twelve books of Homer's *Odyssey*. His early teachers thought of him as self-willed, because he like to do things his own way. Wagner's mother returned to Leipzig in 1821, after the death of her second husband, and there Wagner began his earnest study of music. In 1833 he composed his first symphony, and in 1835 he composed his first opera, "Die Feen." Some of the works he composed were "Rienzi L'auhauser," "Lohengrin," "Ring of the Nibelung," "Tristan und Isolde"

and Die Meisler singer and many other wonderful master pieces.

It should long be remembered that Wagner was a great poet and dramatist as well as a composer, for his librettos make masterly literature. He created a new epoch in musical history by showing that the melodies of opera should follow the meaning of the story, whether beautiful, ugly, hideous, gentle or airy in short, he apparently made music express everything it was capable, when united with poetical and dramatic literature.

Previously the families had taken two pickups and gone to Enid to bring articles of furniture and household goods. These were all arranged, rugs were placed, curtains and pictures hung, there was a supply of food

in the pantry, and the hot water heater was lighted.

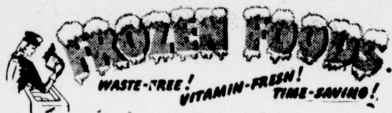
