Season's First Bale of Cotton Ginned By L. D. Gilbert Last Saturday

The first bale of cotton for the current season was ginned here last Saturday morning, September 24 and the cotton belonged to L. D. Gilbert.

The lint weighed 540 pounds and the seed from the bale totaled 950 pounds. Paymaster Gin processed the cotton free of charge and also gave L. D. \$50 on the bonus for the first bale produced for the season. Paymaster paid \$33.25 for the seed and will also buy the cotton after it has been graded.

Friends and merchants also contributed another \$146.50 to bring the bonus up to \$196.50 for the season's first bale of cotton. The cotton was planted in May.

Last year's first bale of cotton was produced by Willie Woods and was ginned August 27, which is a pretty good indication of how much later the crops are this year.

Marker Placed At Grave Of Confederate Veteran of War Between the States

Judge Moreland then presented a very interesting talk on "Changes in the Law." He said, "The law should be for the protection of all people, and that free society should be free." He also said that a judge is not allowed to tell a prisoner that he might be out in four months after being sentenced to two years. He said that it is possible for a person to get from two to ten years for stealing animals, and might get much less time for committing a murder. He went on to say that voters should read proposed Amendments before voting on them.

Mrs. C. O. Allard conducted the business meeting.

Bill Griffin reported that a marker had been received and it had been placed at the grave of Confederate veteran Franklin

Marion Arnold. C. O. Allard drove to Tulia with Mr. Griffin and assisted him in bringing it to Silverton, and the two of them were assisted by George Seaney in putting up the marker. Mr. Griffin, along with the Historical Society, wishes to thank all of those who helped in any way in getting the marker put up. The marker medalion for the jail has also been ordered.

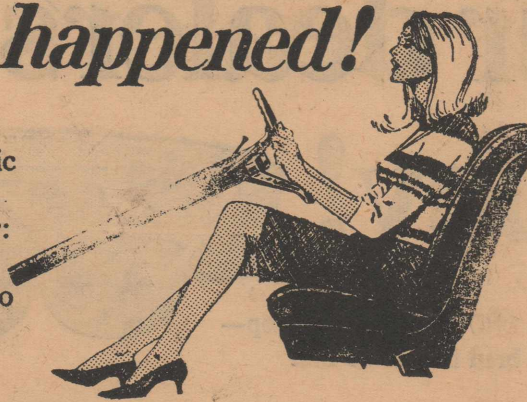
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CONGRESS PASSES THE MINIMUM WAGE BILL
Congress has concluded action on a bill to raise the \$1.25 an hour minimum wage to \$1.60 on February 1, 1968, with an intermediate stop at \$1.40 one year earlier.
Business groups sought to postpone the \$1.60 rate until 1969 but AFL-CIO and the Administration insisted on the earlier date and got their way, by a bare 20 votes in the House. An NNA convention resolution had urged the 1969 effective date.
Nearly 30 million workers are now under the Fair Labor Standards Act. When the new law takes effect next February, another 8 million will be covered.
Newly covered employees, including many who work in small retail stores, restaurants, laundries, hotels, schools and hospitals, will start at a \$1.00 minimum and move up to \$1.60 at 15 cents per year.
The bill will have a considerable effect on small towns because many workers now exempt will be covered for the first time.

The presiding minister of the Quitaque congregation, V. D. Tiffin, said, "The object of the program is to equip every one of the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's Witnesses in the practical use of the Bible as a means of fortifying the spiritual morale of people in our community."
District Supervisor, A. A. Catanzaro, Watchtower Society's representative over 10 circuits in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, will be chairman of the Texas Circuit 9 assembly.
E. A. Grover, supervisor of the circuit, met with some 20 department heads, September 8 at Childress, in preparation for the Lubbock meet. To overcome existing ministerial weaknesses in the circuit, various ones in the 16-congregation circuit have been selected by Grover to discuss and demonstrate ways to bring weaknesses up to district and national averages in producing the "fruit of the spirit."

WORKING MOTHERS NEED TO PLAN TIME

COLLEGE STATION — Time-savers and housekeeping shortcuts are important to all mothers, but especially valuable to the working mother.

Here are a few ideas from Mrs. Wanda Meyer, Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University. Written schedules can improve your efficiency. You may not want to run your home on a stop-watch timetable, but it does help to write down everything down that must be done, and then assign an approximate hour for doing it. This not only gives you an idea of the scope of your job, but helps you to see and eliminate non-essentials. Allot yourself an extra hour in the morning to accomplish

a few tasks. Many mothers prefer to get up early rather than face a messy kitchen and unmade beds at the end of the day. Some women keep up with the ironing by doing a few pieces several mornings a week. Others prefer to save this task for evenings or weekends. Remember that no-iron fabrics and wash-and-wear clothing save lots of time and energy.

Plan menus for the entire week so that there's no last-minute meal planning every afternoon after work. Do main marketing once a week. Stock up on staples, canned and frozen goods, and then fill in with fresh fruits, vegetables and meat as needed during the week.

Lists kept in strategic places help to jog your memory. For instance, a pad and pencil hung on the kitchen wall make it possible for you to jot down need-

ed items when you think of them.

A blackboard or bulletin board in the kitchen makes a fine place for notes and family communications. It also provides a convenient spot for posting special chores to be done by the youngsters, and for tacking up menus. A busy mother can leave messages for the family.

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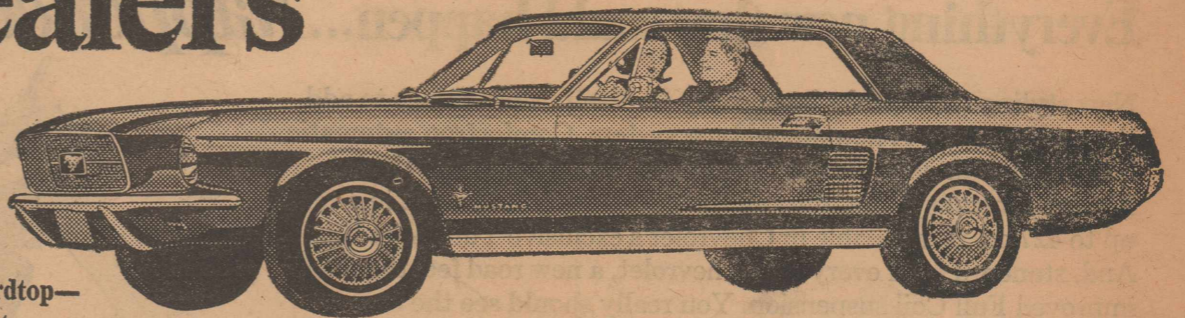

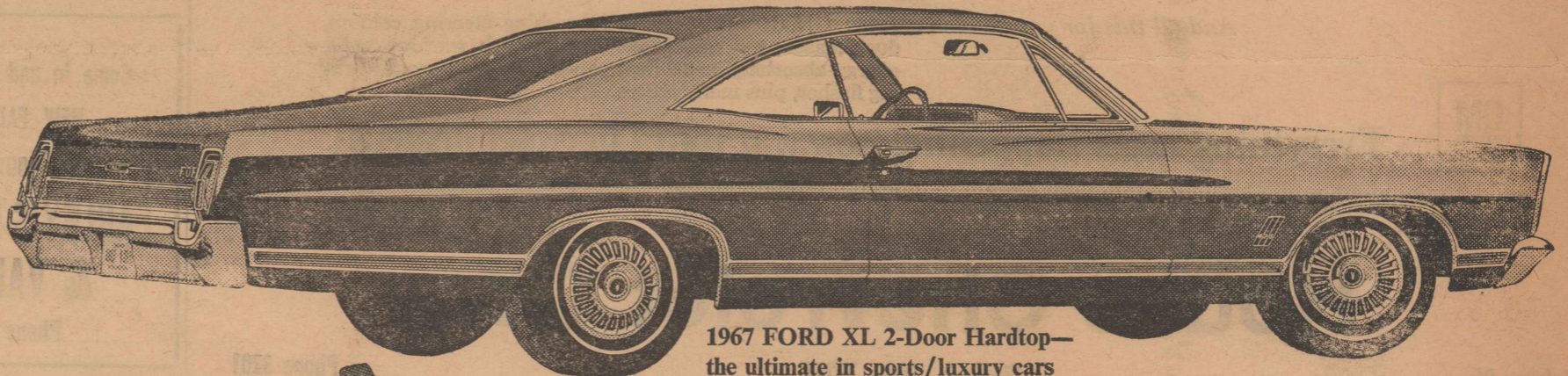

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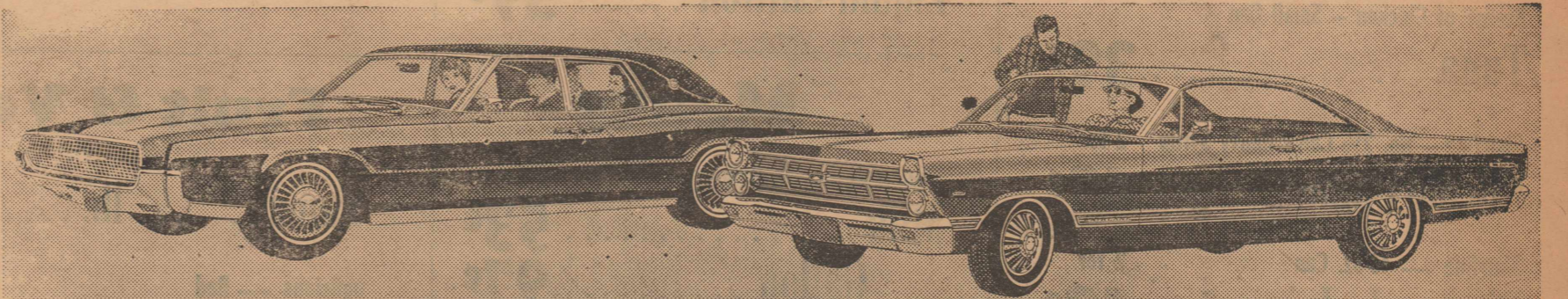
