Patrick Service Held Wednesday

James Kelly Patrick was born December 12, 1893 in Montague County, son of the late R. W. and Mrs. Patrick.

He was married to Katharine Elizabeth Hawkins on July 17, 1919. He was ordained as a deacon in the Baptist Church here in 1930 and was an active member of this church until his health failed. He was a World War I veteran.

A retired farmer, Mr. Patrick had lived in this area for more than 50 years.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. LaRue Golden of Levelland; six sons, Walter of Farwell, N. M., Earle and Arthur of Quitaque, Olin of Fort Worth, Roy of Amarillo and Dr. Virgil Patrick of Boise City, Okla.; his mother, Mrs. R. W. Patrick of Lockney; a brother, Guy of Tulare, Calif.; and eight grandchildren.

This community, which was mourning the loss of two of its residents, Mrs. Ray Persons and Clarence Barrett, who had died in an auto accident the Sunday before, were saddened again around 3 o'clock last Friday afternoon when word came that Mrs. Geneva Curtis had suffered a serious heart attack in the hospital at Tulia, where she was already a patient. Then at 3:30 p. m. death claimed a very gallant lady who had borne a very serious heart condition for many years.

PANTHERETTES TO PLAY AT WAYLAND CLINIC SATURDAY

More than 1,000 high school girls basketball players and coaches are expected in Plainview Nov. 12 for the Flying Queens cage clinic.

It will be the 9th annual clinic hosted by the Wayland College women's basketball squad. Harley Redin, Wayland athletic director and coach of the Flying Queens, said attendance this year promises to exceed the approximately 1,000 who attended last year. More than 100 coaches are expected Saturday, Redin said.

The clinic will be at the Plainview High School gymnasium starting at 9 a. m. The gym will be open at 8 for visitors arriving ahead of the program start.

In addition to the clinic panel featuring coaches, there will be four games between outstanding high school girls' teams from 4 p. m. until 8:30 p. m.

Opening play will pit the Spearman 1966 AA state champions and the Tulia AAA state champs this year.

Floydada - Quitaque, Friona-Springlake and Dimmitt-Roosevelt teams will be matched in games to follow.

First on the coaches' panel will be a discussion by F. G. Crofford, Claude, on team defense. Ball handling and goal shooting will be the topic of discussion by Kelly Chadwick, Floydada.

The Flying Queens will demonstrate fundamentals of cage play at 10:30 and at 11:30 will scrimmage with the Wayland Queen Bees. Following lunch to be served the visitors, Dean Foshbe, Springlake, will discuss pressing defense.

Single post offense will be the topic of Mel Williams of Friona. Bud Roberts of Tulia, final panel member scheduled to appear, will discuss advancing the ball again, pressing defense.

Matched play will be open to the public at charges of 75 cents for students and \$1 for others.

Quitaque's Fighting Pantherettes are sporting a perfect record after five games, while the Panthers are 4 wins against one loss.

Last Friday night the local teams drove up to Samnorwood for a pair of games and won both of them, then on Tuesday night of this week the locals hosted the teams from Hedley High and won both of them.

The Pantherettes won, 43-35 over the Samnorwood girls and the Panthers won by a 57-42 margin.

Patricia Brunson led the Pantherette attack with 23 points. Sherry Stark, Carol Myers, and Barbara Chandler each dumped in 6 points and Jo Beth Merrell added 2 points.

The Quitaque team was not too sharp in this one, and until Suzie Bently was injured in the second quarter the Eaglettes led most of the way. The Pantherettes quickly caught up and went ahead after Miss Bently hurt her knee.

Although the Panthers won by a 15 point margin, the game was closer than that most of the

way as the Panthers played ragged basketball. Lyn Payne started to hit the basket real good during the last period as the Quitaque lads finally built a comfortable margin and Coach Don Johnson gave his entire squad some game experience in the closing minutes of play.

On Tuesday night of this week the Pantherettes took a 45-28 win over the Hedley Owlettes as Sherry Stark bombed the baskets for 27 points and Pantherette guards Jill Johnson, Lynette Taylor, Billie Sue Cheatham and Shirley Dowd shut the Owlettes off with only 10 points in the first half.

Coach Johnson also let most of his reserves play during the closing minutes of the game. In addition to Sherry Stark's 27 points, Carol Myers notched 9 points, Patricia Brunson 5, Barbara Chandler 3 and Jo Beth Merrell 1 point.

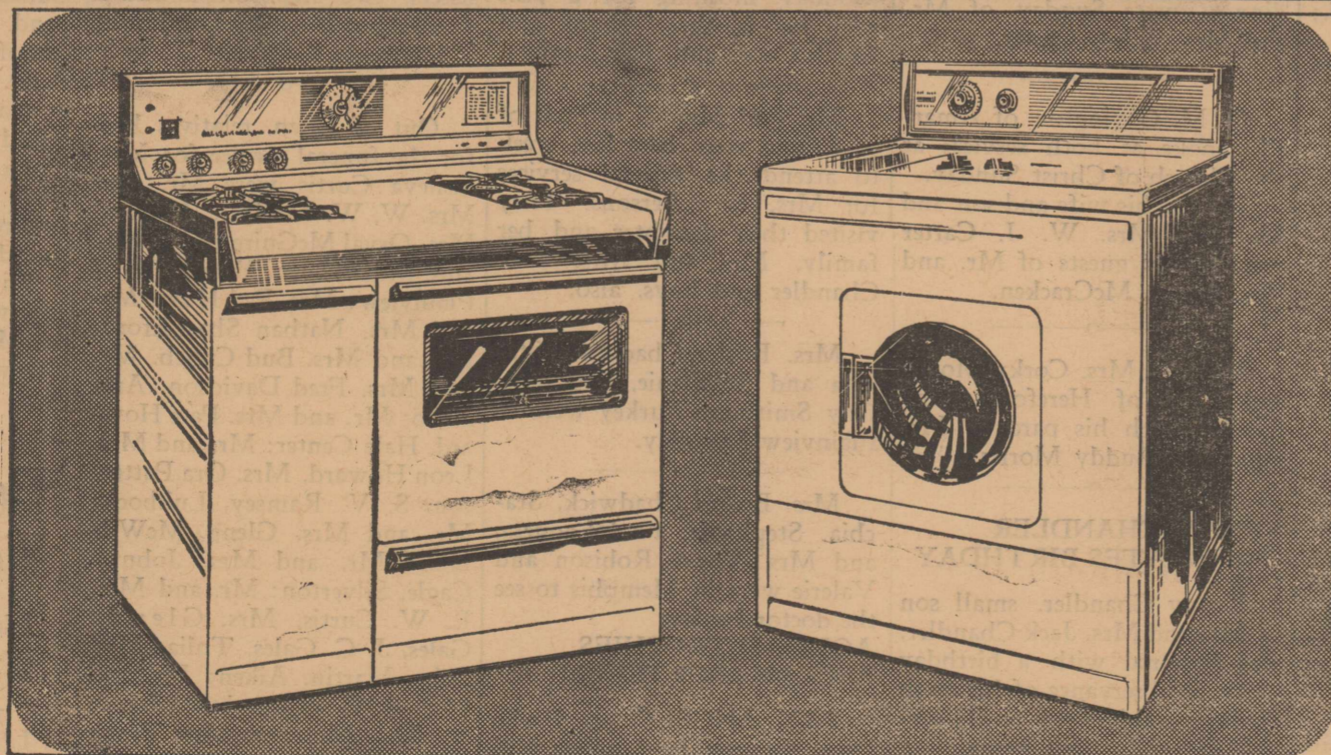

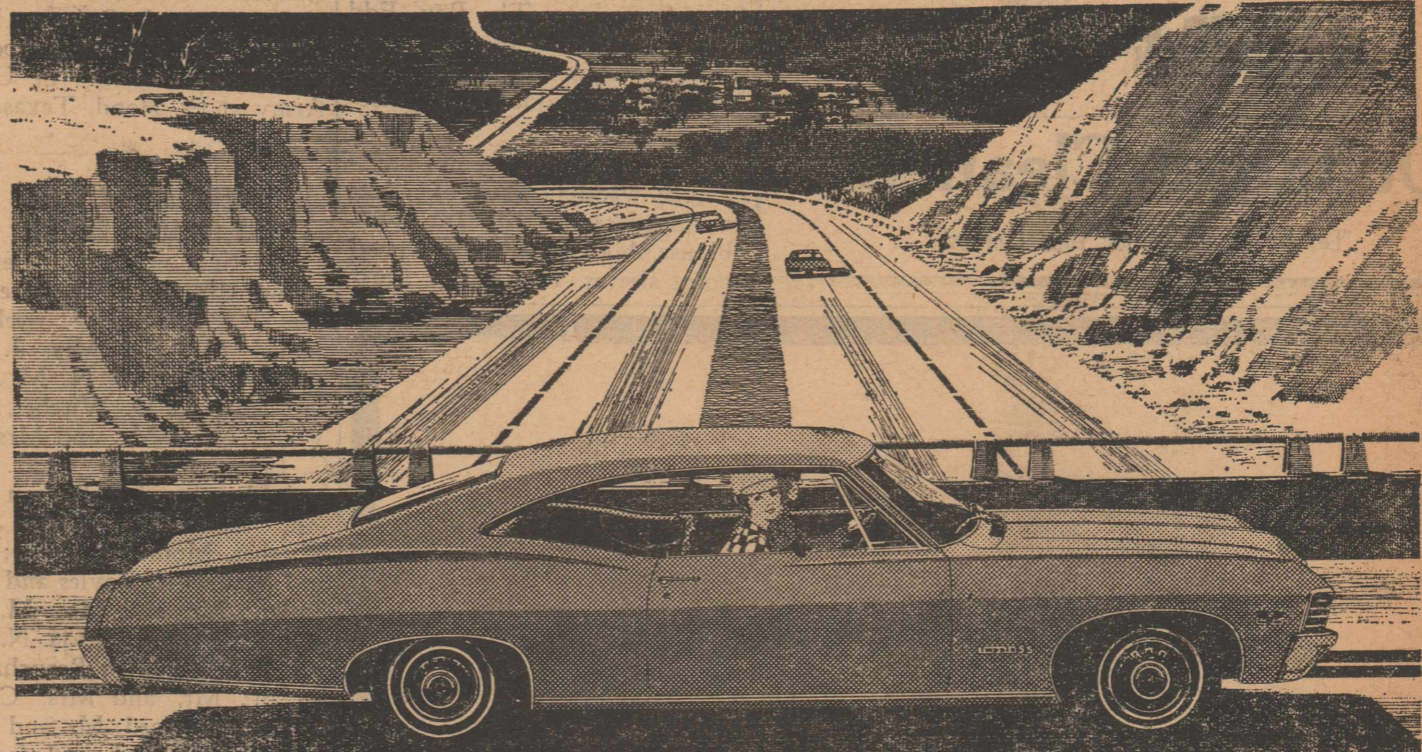

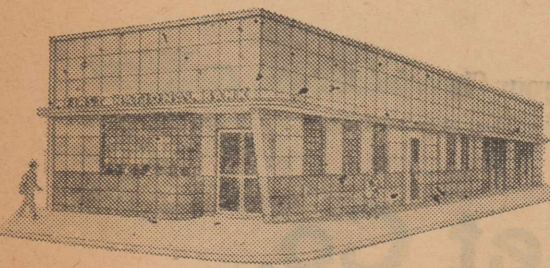
