Quitaque's Pantherettes took sole possession of first place in the round robin portion of the district championship race by posting a 42-34 win over the defending champion Estelline Bearettes in a game played at Clarendon Monday night.

Monday night's game was made necessary when the two teams wound up in a tie at the end of the regular schedule. A winner must be decided in the round robin portion of the

schedule. The two teams each defeated the other on their own court.

Several Estelline fans were heard to say after the game that "Quitaque came to play" and that just about told the story of the game, as all seven players who saw action in the game played real fine basketball.

The Pantherettes were in front most of the way and deserved to win. Estelline led for a couple of minutes in the first

period, lost the lead in the closing minutes of that period, then went ahead by a single point, 11-10 at the first buzzer. The Pantherettes tied the score at 11-11 shortly after the second period started, then went ahead to stay just seconds later. The two teams traded basket for basket the remainder of the second quarter and the Pantherettes left the floor at halftime with a 3-point lead, 21-18.

The Bearettes narrowed the lead to 20-21 at the start of the third quarter and that was as close as they were ever able to be again in the game. Quitaque led 32-25 at the three-quarter mark, then outscored the Bearettes 10-9 in the fourth period.

Patricia Brunson won scoring honors for the evening with 31 points. Cherri Rapp, with 23 points, was high for the losers.

Sherry Stark tossed in 8 points for the Pantherettes and Carol Myers rounded it out with 3 points. Shirley Dowd, Jill Johnson, Lynette Taylor and Billie Cheatham shared guard duty and did a very fine job in once again holding a potent scoring attack to only 34 points.

Monday's win definitely gives the Pantherettes an edge in the race for the district title for they now must be beaten twice before they are out of the running. The Pantherettes are the best team, but they will be forced to go all out to win for Estelline has a very good team and they like being champions and will not give up their title without a struggle. The Pantherettes must be ready to go all-out to win.

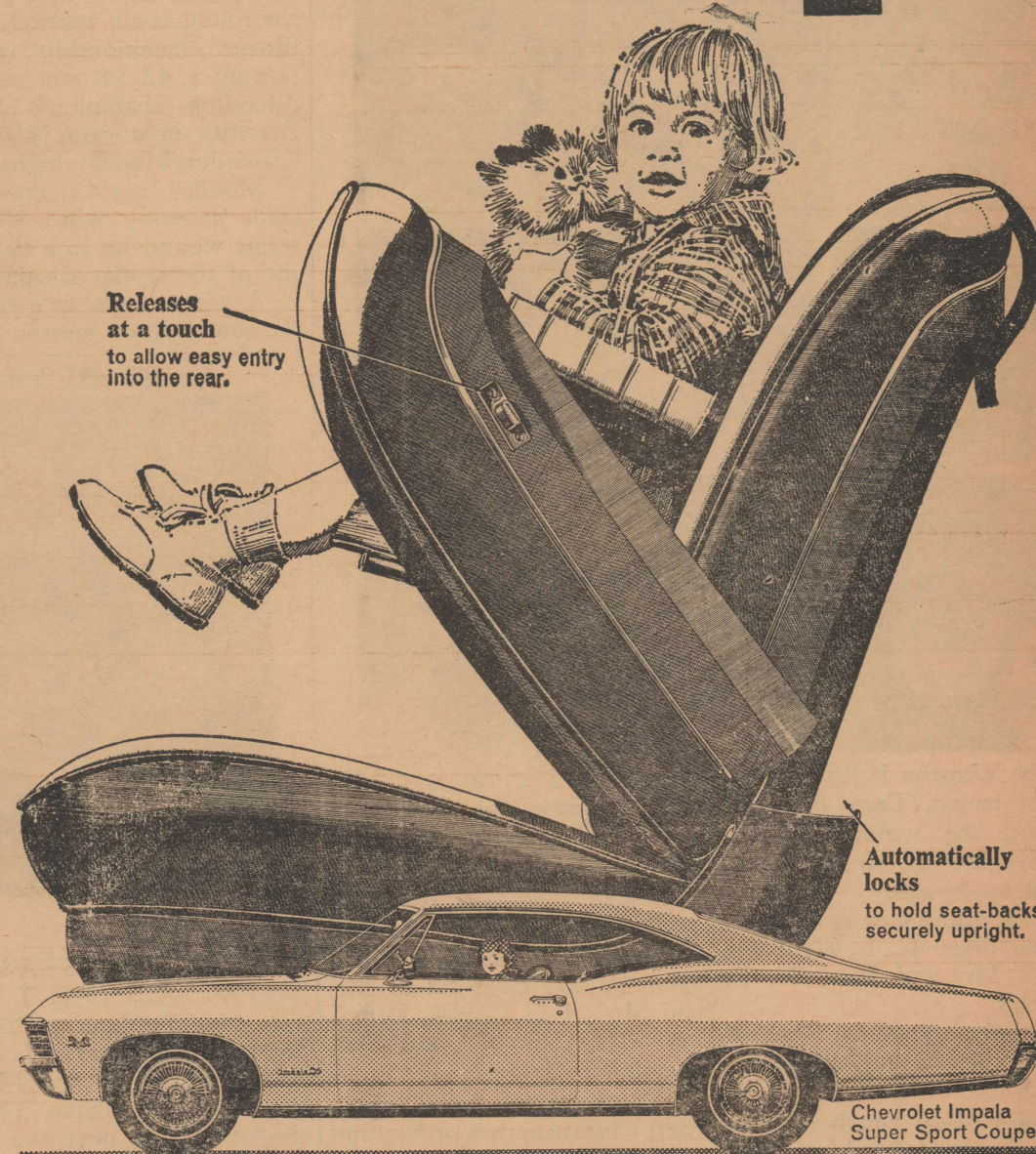
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**ASSEMBLY OF GOD

**SENATOR HIGHTOWER OPPOSES  
LIQUOR BY DRINK PROPOSAL**

AUSTIN — Senator Jack Hightower, of Vernon, said Thursday that Governor John Connally's proposed liquor-by-the-drink tax revenue measure "would create more problems than it would solve."

The Senator also questioned the advisability of the Governor's proposed repeal of the Colson-Briscoe Act under which state funds are allotted for construction of farm-to-market roads.

"I do not think that there will be any tangible benefits for the state under the liquor-by-the-drink proposal, even though it was proposed as a revenue measure," Senator Hightower said.

In his address to the legislature, the Governor said that the proposed tax on liquor sales would add \$15 million to the state's revenue during the next biennium.

I am in agreement with Governor Connally's statement that increased effectiveness in enforcement of laws relating to private clubs and the sale of liquor are essential," the senator said.

"However, I do not believe that the legislation of liquor by the drink is necessary to accomplish this. Such legislation would, in my opinion, create more problems than it would solve."

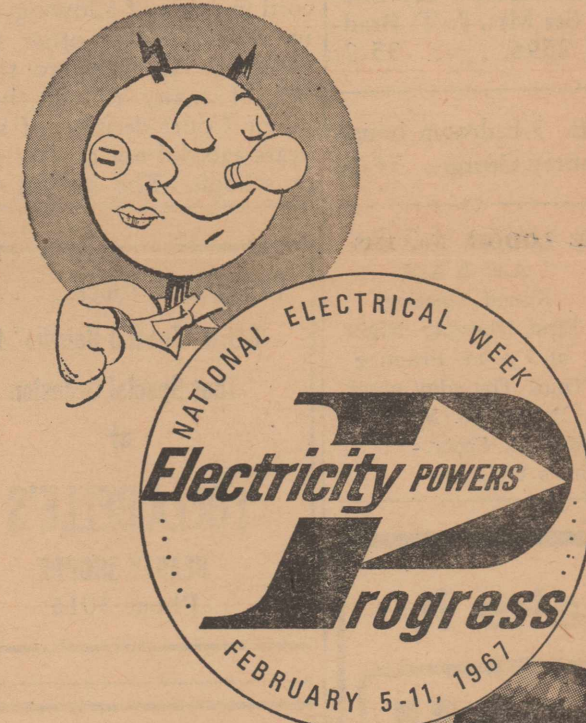

**CONGRESSMAN BOB PRICE'S WASHINGTON REPORT**

The office has been very busy since my last report. I introduced two pieces of legislation on January 26 and have been preparing other bills for introduction in the near future.

My House Joint Resolution 224 proposed an amendment to our Constitution which would put the American people on record in favor of allowing prayer in schools and other public buildings. Contrary to the belief of many people the Supreme Court decision of several years ago did not outlaw prayer in schools. The justices stated

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that school officials could not give the students a prepared prayer to recite.

As I stated in my last newsletter, however, I will fight for passage of this amendment to make sure that some future court does not prohibit all prayer in public buildings.

The other resolution was introduced in connection with my assignment to House Agriculture Committee on January 25. House Concurrent Resolution 105, "expresses the sense of Congress that in the public interest the administration should (1) cease and desist in its efforts to enforce selective economic discrimination against American farmers and ranchers by deliberately depressing farm prices, and (2) use the various legislative authorities at its disposal to improve and enhance farm prices."

In regard to my appointment to the Agriculture Committee, I have requested assignment to three subcommittees. The subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, which handles legislation involving meat production and wheat, maize, and soybeans, was my first choice.

I will be announcing the members of my advisory committees on agriculture in the near future. I expect to have about 60 Panhandle farmers, ranchers, and businessmen on several committees.

My other choices included Cotton, which is a major crop in our 18th District. There are more than 600,000 bales annually produced in our area. My other choice is Conservation and Credit, which involves small watershed programs as well as dealing with Farmers Home Administration and Federal Land Bank problems.

I have received numerous letters in regard to the war in Vietnam and the United Nations economic sanctions against Rhodesia.

I am still in favor of blocking the Port of Haiphong and bombing air fields and industrial plants in North Viet Nam in order to bring this conflict to a speedy and successful conclusion.

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Also, I am opposed to the United States' honoring any economic sanctions against Rhodesia as long as our so-called allies continue to trade with North Viet Nam.

Congressman Bob Price Fared well in Agriculture Subcommittee assignments announced today by Representative Page Belcher of Oklahoma, ranking Republican member of the committee.

Price had asked for subcommittees on livestock and grains, cotton and got both. In addition, he was named to a third, the subcommittee on departmental oversight which looks after implementation of Agriculture bills passed before the Congress.

Two former subcommittees, wheat and the subcommittee on livestock and grains, were combined into one with eight democratic and six republican members. Chairman of the combined committee will be Representative Graham Purcell of Texas.

"These are the most important subcommittees of the Agriculture Committee, especially to the 18th District of Texas," Price stated.

"The cotton export situation is in deplorable shape as this country continues to lose its world market," Price declared. "The cost of the cotton program is rising but cotton farmers not sharing in the benefits as they should."

"Actually, I believe the decline of the cotton export markets is largely the result of State Department policies that have forced the American taxpayer to assume heavy losses by the Commodity Credit Corporation for carrying a huge and growing surplus of unwanted cotton," Price added.

"This is one of the problems I will be working on as a mem-

ber of the cotton subcommittee," he stated.  
"I intend to ask for early hearings on the question of whether the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 has been properly administered and also what can be done about State Department policies that have crippled our cotton export program," the Panhandle Congressman concluded.

You need to refuel at breakfast! Even though you've been resting or sleeping all night, your body wasn't completely at rest. It was at work breathing, circulating blood, and contracting and relaxing muscles while you were asleep.

When bodies work at night, they use up calories and make use of nutrients already eaten, notes Miss Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at Texas A&M University. By morning some of the essential nutrients are depleted. If these aren't replenished, you feel tired, grumpy, and irritable. Your job efficiency lessens and accidents are more frequent. An adequate breakfast is a must if you are to be alert and peppy for school or work.

An adequate breakfast supplies between one-fourth and one-third of the daily nutritive needs. Include some foods from each of the four food groups.

Use fresh, canned, or frozen juice. Serve it with or on cereal.

It's easier to get enough ascorbic acid daily if you serve a citrus fruit.

From the bread and cereal group, choose toast, pancakes, waffles, fruit bread, rolls, or cereal.

The protein food most frequently eaten is the traditional breakfast egg. But for variety try ham, hamburgers, hotdogs, steaks, chops, Canadian bacon, fish, or poultry.

Milk should always be a part of a teen's breakfast. Rather than a glass of milk, serve a cheese omelet, eggs baked in milk and sprinkled with grated cheese, milk nogs, buttermilk, or perhaps cheese on a hamburger.

My mother had a new pound cake recipe from the file of Mrs. Hill Rodgers, Littlefield. I'd like to share it with you.

**7-UP POUND CAKE**  
1 1/2 cups margarine. Cream well  
3 cups sugar. Add sugar slowly  
5 large eggs—add one at a time  
1 t. lemon or vanilla extract  
3 cups sifted flour—alternate  
1 bottle 7-Up

Beat well and bake in greased and floured tube pan at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. This cake has a fine moist grain and good volume.
