JUNIOR HIGH TEAMS CLOSED SEASON LAST SATURDAY

Quitaque's Jr. Hi Fighting Panthers ended the season Saturday night with a perfect 21-0 won-loss record. The last win of the season came over a fine Booker T. Washington team from Plainview in the Happy Tournament.

Quitaque won the Happy Tournament, beating Happy "B" 49 to 7 Thursday night. Stanley Price was high point man in that game with 12 points. In the second game Quitaque beat Kress 50 to 37 Saturday morning. Stanley Price was again high point man with 20. In the finals Quitaque took Booker T. Washington 43 to 21. Ysidro Leal was high man with 11 points.

This was the third first place win in a tournament for Quitaque this season, also taking the Matador and Quitaque tournaments. All three trophies were very nice.

The Jr. Hi Fighting Pantherettes ended the season with a 6-15 won-loss record. One of these wins came in the Happy Tournament, beating Booker T. Washington 35-13. Beverly Rogers won scoring honors in the game with 22 points. The girls did not win a tournament this year but represented us well. One loss for the girls in the tournament came from Tulia, who beat Quitaque 21-13. Again Beverly Rogers was high with 11 points. The other loss came from Kress, who won 23-14. Wanda Ramsey was high in the game with 6 points, all on free throws. This was the final game for Junior High and ended with a perfect record for one team and a determined one. Coach Hinton was our coach and we think he did a real good job for us.

Patricia Brunson put up the shot that put the Pantherettes ahead 48-47. The Bearettes stopped the clock with 3 seconds remaining and mapped their strategy, which of course, was to get the ball to Cheri Rapp for one last shot. When time was called back in, the ball was taken by Cheri Rapp who got her shot away and almost caused Quitaque boosters to have heart failure for the ball hit the basket, rolled around and came out! FORMER QUITAQUE EDITOR DIED RECENTLY AT SPEARMAN

William J. ("Honest Bill") Miller, longtime Panhandle newspaperman, died several weeks ago in the Hansford Hospital at Spearman after a long illness. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery at Spearman.

He was a veteran of sixty years in the newspaper business, most of it in the Panhandle of Texas. He was publisher of the Spearman Reporter for thirty-four years, moving to Spearman from Quitaque, where he had been editor of the Quitaque Post during the early 1930's.

Mr. Miller was born July 17, 1895 in Collinsville. He started learning the printing trade there when he was 11 years old. He served in both World War I and World War II and held the permanent rank of Captain in the Army.

He came to the Texas Panhandle in 1926, working for the Nunn-Warren Company. He worked for the Panhandle Herald in 1926-27. In 1927-28 he published newspapers at White Deer, Skellytown and Roxanna, worked briefly for the Roswell, New Mexico, Dispatch, then returned to Nunn-Warren Company as editor of The Quitaque Post in the early 1930's before moving to Spearman.

In 1964 he was one of the Texas publishers honored by the Texas Press Association for 50 years service in the newspaper industry.

He is survived by his wife, Eddie Faye; a daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Hicks of Topeka, Kansas; a son, Billy of Spearman, a brother, Joe T. Miller of Austin and a grandson, Stephen, who lives with his grandparents.

Panthers Win Sixth Bi-District Monday

Quitaque's District 10 - B basketball champions added a sixth consecutive bi-district championship for the school Monday night by taking an 83-60 win over Quail in the brand new Memphis High School gymnasium before a full house of basketball fans from all over the area. The Panthers advance to the regional tournament at Canyon this weekend, and in the opening game of the tournament will be matched with one of the better teams in the tournament, Darrouzzett, and the game is scheduled to start at 7 o'clock Friday evening.

The Quail Quails, who have been the Panthers' opponents in bi-district play three of the last four years, played the winners on even terms for the first 12 minutes of last Monday night's game, being only one point behind the Panthers 27-28 midway of the second period. Quitaque pulled away to lead at halftime by 11 points, 40-29.

The Panthers steadily out-

scored the Quails during the second half of play and Coach Don Johnson let every boy on the squad get in a few licks before the game was over.

Four of the starters for the Panthers scored in double figures, with Monte Stephens getting 25 points for top honors and Bobby Cochran with 19 points was next. Lyn Payne hit for 13 points, Dale Ramsey tallied 12, Roland Hamilton 6, Johnny Pointer 3, David Brunson, Jimmy Monk each hit 2 points and Jimmy Pointer tossed in one free throw.

Neely tossed in 16 points for the Quails for scoring honors, with Fielding getting 15. The Quails are coached by Bill Wilson, brother of Gano Wilson, who coached here last year. They were a well coached bunch of youngsters but no match for the Panthers, who now sport a 35-4 won loss record to take into the regional tournament this weekend.

The Panthers first round op-

ponent went to the finals of last year's regional tournament, losing to Channing. Darrouzzett returns four starters from that team so they are tough again and will be hard to beat.

If the Panthers win their Friday night game they will play again Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The championship game will be at 8:15 Saturday night.

Teams in the regional tournament this year are Darrouzzett, Booker T. Washington of Plainview, Bledsoe, Meadow, McAdoo and Quitaque.

The Panthers have set dead aim on the regional championship this year and they are going to be hard to beat. A lot of Quitaque fans, including this reporter, believe the Panthers will win it. Plans are being made for a banquet for the high school students of Flomot. The date of

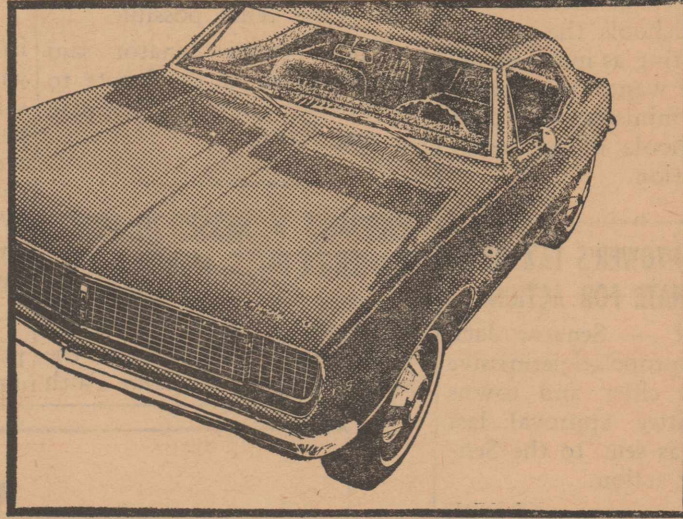
the banquet is Thursday evening, March 16, and it will be at the Flomot school cafeteria.

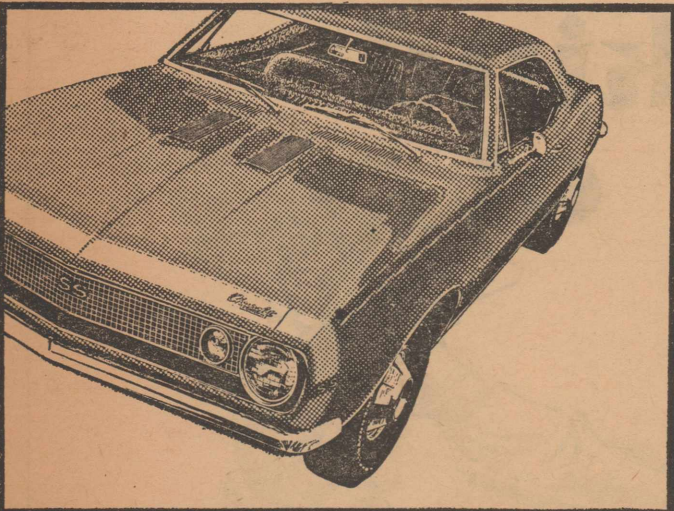

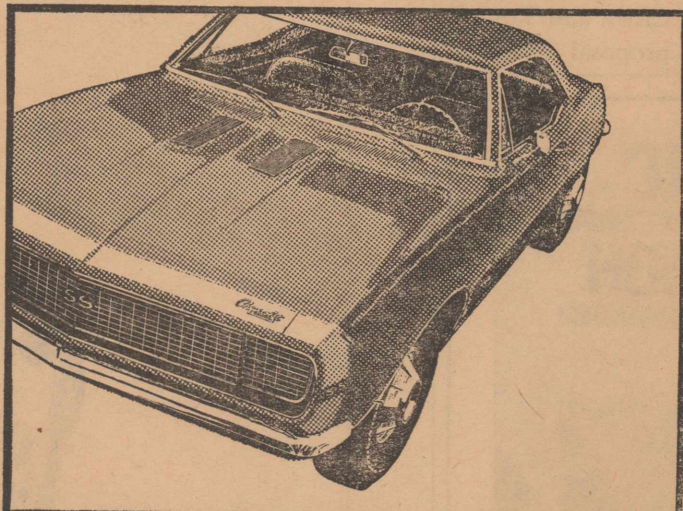

SENATOR HIGHTOWER'S TAX BILL GOES TO SENATE FOR ACTION

AUSTIN — Senator Jack Hightower's proposed permissive tax bill for cities and towns won committee approval last week and was sent to the Senate floor for action.

The bill, co-sponsored with Senator Joe Christie, was approved 10-1 in the Committee on Counties, Cities, and Towns. Under the proposal, cities and

towns would be authorized to submit to their voters a proposal for a one per cent sales tax. The tax would go into effect only with the voters' approval.

"I am aware that should this bill be passed by the legislature all of the cities and towns of the state will not secure benefits," Senator Hightower said. "Some will pass the required ordinance but others will be unable or unwilling to do so."

"I wish that we could find a way to relieve the economic distress of all the municipalities. This proposal, however, may make some relief possible."

The Vernon Senator said that he expected the Senate to begin debate on the proposal in the near future.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES TO MEET IN WICHITA FALLS, MARCH 3 - 5

Texas Circuit of Jehovah's Witnesses will meet in Wichita Falls, March 3-5, to discuss the theme, "Supply to Your Faith

Endurance."

V. D. Tiffin, presiding minister of the Quitaque Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses said, "When Faith in God is being tested from top to bottom, we are concentrating on an accurate knowledge of God's Word for strengthening us to endure this refining test on religion."

Tiffin said the primary purpose of the 15 - congregation meet, with more than 500 asso-

ciate ministers in approximately 25 counties from Wichita Falls to Muleshoe is to advance the house-to-house ministry with a faith enduring message to be shared with all.

The highlight of the assembly will come on the last day, at 3 p. m., when the film will be shown on the subject, "God Cannot Lie."

The last such assembly was held in Lubbock six months ago.
