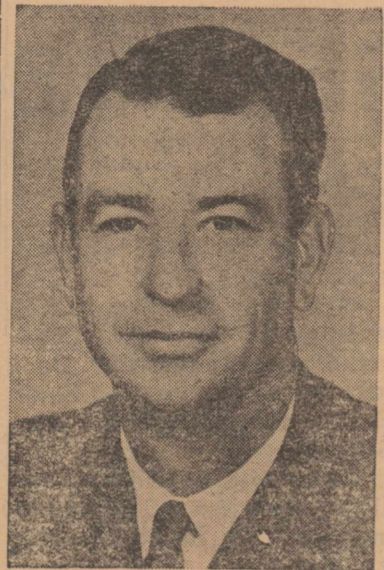
Panthers Are Kayoed In First Round of Play

Basketball for the Quitaque Panthers came to an end at Canyon in the first round of play in the regional tournament, as the Darrouzett Longhorns took an easy 78-48 win over the cold shooting Quitaque team, who had attracted considerable attention in the district race with their scoring exploits.

The Panthers were hampered considerably by the absence of tall Roland Hamilton in the lineup most of the game. He had suffered a sprained ankle in a workout earlier in the week and only played a few minutes during the entire game. Darrouzett led the entire game. The Panthers tied the score at 7-7 and 9-9 midway of the first quarter and that was as close as the Quitaque team managed to be for the remainder of the game.

Darrouzett led 16-9 at the end of the first quarter, 33-19 at half time, 54-38 at the end of three periods, then blew the game wide open in the final quarter, outscoring the Pan-

FARMERS CAUTIONED ABOUT LAND THEY INTEND TO DIVERT

Farmers who participate in the 1967 upland cotton and feed grain program are being cautioned about the kind of land they intend to divert under such programs.

Payments for a farm will be reduced where the county committee determines that the cropland set aside for diverted acreage under the program is substantially less productive than the average cropland normally used to produce the crop.

In such a case, the farm operator will be given an opportunity and urged to designate other land of at least average productivity for diversion under the program. If this is not done, program payments will be reduced in proportion to the lower yields which could reasonably be expected from the acreage diverted.

Any reduction indicated in the payment otherwise earned by the farmer would be subtracted, as applicable, from the farm diversion, the price support, and the certificate payments—in that order. (Diversion payments are available for upland cotton and some feed grain farms; price support payments are available for upland cotton and feed grains; and certificate payments are available in connection with wheat.)

Growers are reminded that the sign up for the cotton, wheat, and feed grain programs will close March 17, 1967. Signing up is a necessary first step in qualifying for any price support or other program benefits.

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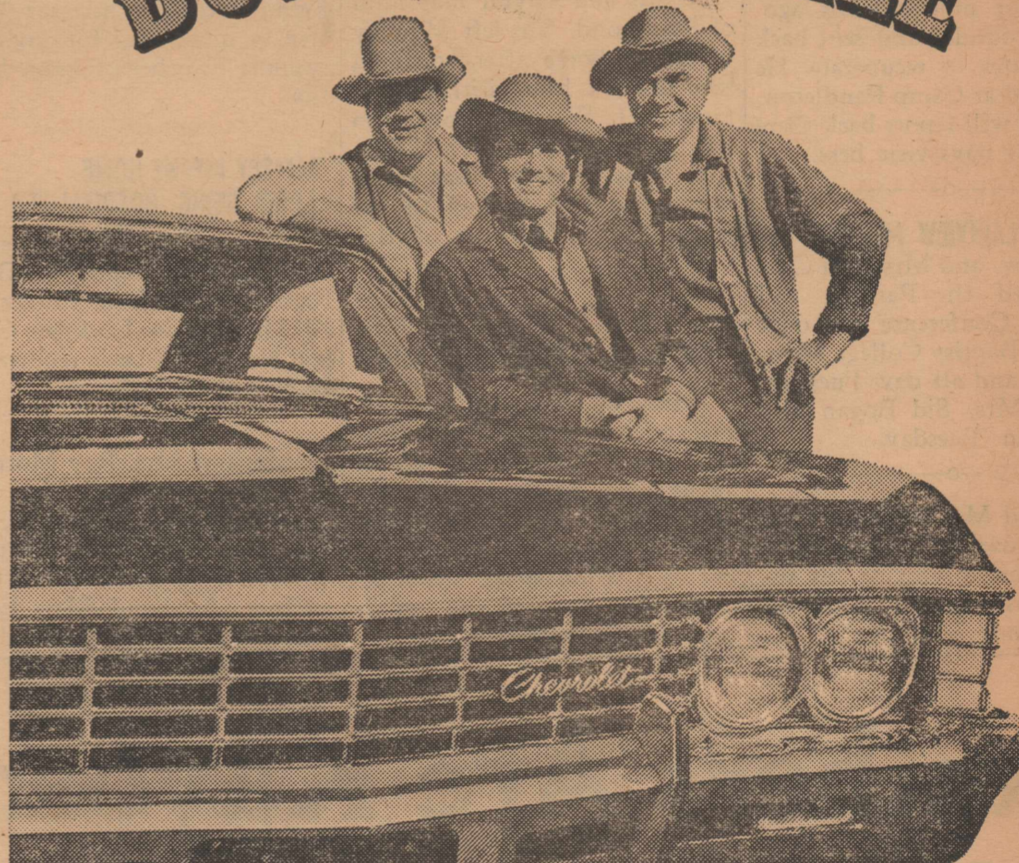

Residual Effect of Herbicide on Grain Sorghum

Residual effects of herbicide applications on crops in rotation is included in the research program of the High Plains Foundation.

Cotton received applications of three rates of Treflan and two of Dacthal in 1965. Grain sorghum was planted on the same ground in 1966. Scientists at the Foundation found no significant increase or decrease in grain sorghum yields from the carry over of these herbicides.

Cotton received a heavy application of Treflan in 1964. Grain sorghum was planted on the same plots in 1965. The previous year's heavy application of Treflan resulted in a delay in growth. Plants under this heavy treatment were shorter until fully headed. They headed ten days later than those with lighter applications of

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Treflan. Plants under the heavy Treflan treatment wilted sooner than other applications after each application after each irrigation. There was no significant decrease in yield of grain sorghum in 1965. Farmers report similar effects in the 1966 season.

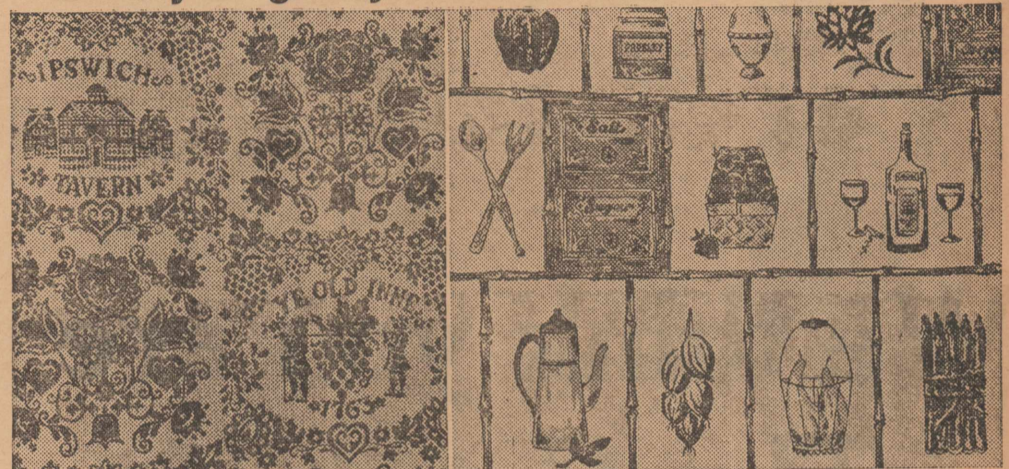
James Valliant, Soil Scientist, who completed the 1966 herbicide test said, "This study will have to be continued for

some time before a definite conclusion can be given as to the residual effects of these toxic herbicides on grain sorghum production."

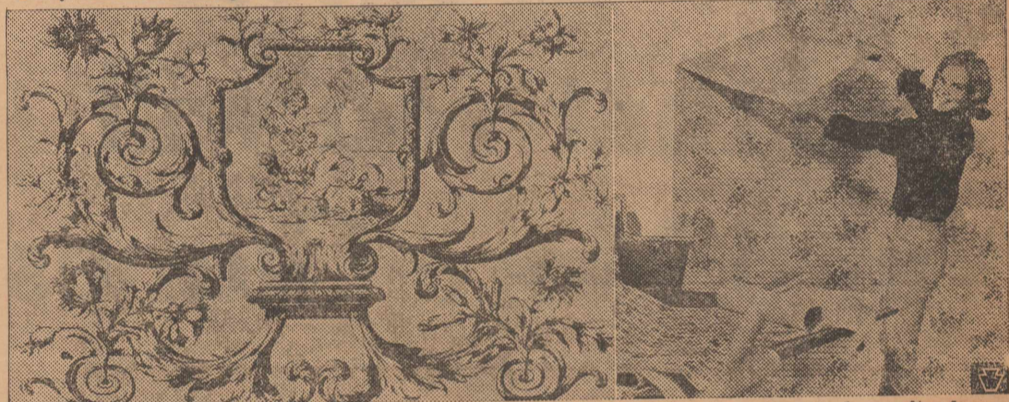
