The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees has acceded to numerous requests and has called an election so that sentiment of the people may be obtained as to the location of the new high school building. The election will be held the coming Saturday.

I believe the Board ought to be considered broad minded because of the attitude of the members in the matter. The board had already settled on a site, but in the interest of harmony readily agreed to an election when opposition developed. Now it is up to each and every one of us to go to the voting places Saturday and inform the trustees of our preference. Considerable expense has been incurred by the board—lets respond and give the board a true picture of the collective community sentiment.

Veterans Office Opens At Lubbock

A new Veterans Administration regional office has been opened at Lubbock, with Robert W. Sisson as regional manager.

The 26 counties comprising the Texas Panhandle, which for four years have been under jurisdiction of The Oklahoma office of the Veterans Administration, have been transferred to the new Lubbock headquarters.

The change was announced last week by P. T. Lunquist, manager of the VA center at Muskogee.

Lunquist stated that it was the policy of General Omar Bradley, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, to bring the services of the VA as closely to the homes of the veterans as possible, and pointed out that much more prompt and efficient service will be available to the veterans of the Panhandle through the Lubbock office.

L. A. Corbell, Jr. Rites At Menard

Funeral services for L. A. Corbell, Jr., 24, who drowned June 8, were held at the Church of Christ, Menard, Texas, and interment was in the Menard cemetery. Menard is the home of the young man's grandfather, C. W. Corbell.

Young Corbell was fishing from a motor boat in Devils Lake near Del Rio, with two other men when the tragedy occurred. Their boat was said to have struck an underwater object of some kind, throwing its occupants into the water.

One of the group, although injured, was rescued. Corbell was given a medical discharge by the Marine Corps in 1942. The last three years he has been manager of the Arrow Supply Co. at Big Lake, Texas.

He leaves a wife and their six-week-old son, Jerry. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Corbell, Sr., of Balleystown. Other survivors are three sisters, LaVerne Jo, Frances, and Anita, all of Balleystown, and one brother, Kenneth, who is serving in the Navy.

Young Corbell attended Bala high school. He was born Nov. 13, 1921, at Eden, Texas.

Social Security Information

John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board, will be in Muleshoe at the U. S. Post Office Thursday, June 27, at 9:00 a. m.

He is in Muleshoe one day each month for the purpose of answering any questions people may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who may be entitled to benefits, and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Mr. Palmer stated the law provides that old-age survivors insurance benefits must be given up for any month in which the worker earns more than \$14.99 in covered employment, but benefits can be stopped and resumed as often as the worker moves in and out of covered jobs.

To prevent confusion and misunderstanding, the following cautions are issued:

1. Increased benefits, once a claim is filed, can result only from additional work in covered employment. Generally this additional employment must be at pay equal to or above the past average monthly wage.

2. Benefits will be recalculated upon request. It is important, therefore, that the beneficiary get in touch with its local Social Security Board field office whenever he quits working in covered employment, or even though he is still working, whenever his total pay begins to go down as a result of reduced working hours, lower pay rate, lost time, or for any other reason.

THE TWIN MEETS—IN RECORD-BREAKING TIME!—A new east-west speed record was set by this new Navy Neptune patrol bomber—a two-motored Lockheed P2V, when it sat down at Burbank Field, Calif., 3 hours 23 minutes and 2 seconds after its take-off from Floyd Bennett Field. This sliced 23 minutes off the previous best speed, despite poor flying conditions that forced the plane 150 miles off course. The Neptune was piloted by Commander Thomas D. Davison, of Chevy Chase, Md., and carried three naval aviators and two civilian passengers.

Ten persons were injured, seven seriously, in a head-on collision of two automobiles late Saturday night two miles east of Larlat.

The only passenger in the car who was not injured was a three-year old boy.

Seriously injured are: Mr. and Mrs. R. O. Aubrey, Progress.

R. E. Williams, 14, Progress. Louis Lucero, Hale Center.

Mrs. and Mrs. Aubrey were the most seriously injured of the group of five brought to the hospital. Mr. Aubrey was in a serious state of shock and suffering from broken ribs, bruised chest, and numerous cuts. Mrs. Aubrey had her arm broken in several places, cuts, and also was a victim of shock, while the Williams, who lived with his younger brothers in his grandparents home had a severe cut on his head and bruises over his body.

Dr. Green stated that he and his brother, Dr. M. F. Green, worked around midnight when the crash victims were brought to them, until five o'clock in the morning administering shock treatments and giving transfusions. The two younger boys suffered from cuts and bruises, but were released from the hospital Sunday.

At Clovis Memorial Hospital, Louis Lucero, driver of one of the cars involved in the accident, had an arm broken in several places and a bruised chest. Most of his teeth were shaken loose in the crash, and he was bruised slightly. Ramona Garcia, 13, has a broken leg and her brother, Frank, aged 7, a broken collarbone. Both are also suffering from severe facial and head cuts.

Willie Lucero, brother of Louis, and also from Hale Center, is being treated at the Santa Fe Hospital for bad cuts on his face.

A Garcia, father of the three children riding in the car Lucero was driving, lost all of his teeth in the crash, but his youngest son, Pat, three years of age, did not receive a scratch.

Sidelights From Washington

This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, June 15th. There is much uncertainty as to just when Congress will recess or adjourn. The best guess seems to be that Congress will recess about July 15th for a period of three months. Such a recess would be

very much in order, as Congress has been in session all or part of practically every month since the war began more than four years ago.

On Thursday of this week I was able to secure passage in the House of my bill involving appropriations and programs for all Government owned corporations—40 in number. Under the bill the Commodity Credit Corporation will have sufficient funds to carry on the support price and loan programs on cotton and

wheat and other basic crops. Partly prices fixed by the Department of Agriculture, unfortunately, do not take into consideration all labor costs, but the approval of the Commodity Credit program will prevent the possibility of a collapse in the price of cotton, grain and other important crops for at least a two-year period. This is the most hopeful thing on the horizon for West Texas farmers. But on account of the continued drought, price guarantees for the present do not mean too much.

On Friday, June 21st we are scheduled to present to the House the bill making appropriations for the Army for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This will be the biggest bill presented to Congress this year. We are providing funds for pay and equipment for a modern Army and occupation force which will average about 1,250,000 men during the year. The sum recommended will be 7 billion dollars—a huge sum—but we have proceeded on the basis that the American people believe in a strong national defense program and are willing to pay whatever may be necessary.

Under the law all appropriation for the regular agencies of the Government must be passed prior to July 1st of each year, and the month of June is always a very busy month in Congress.

During the week we passed by unanimous vote the bill providing terminal leave pay for enlisted men of our armed forces. The bill has now gone to the Senate, where favorable action is expected. The bill is of interest to all enlisted men and their families.

Following the veto by the President of the so-called Case Bill, involving Labor-Industry disputes, a vote was taken in the House on the question of whether the House would override the veto. The vote was 255 to 135 on the motion to override, which was 5 short of the

necessary two-thirds. I voted to override the veto.

In the death of Senator John Bankhead of Alabama, the farmers of America have lost a true and powerful friend. The farmers of the nation did not always agree with Senator Bankhead, but they never questioned his loyalty

to the cause of agriculture. In the post-war years our agricultural producers will be confronted with problems varied and difficult, and will need the best possible leadership.

Prior to the death of the late Senator, the State of Alabama had kept a Bankhead in Congress for 60 consecutive years.

Many Vets Not To Find College Room

LUBBOCK, June 18—Veterans and others enrolled in American colleges now and next fall are fortunate to be so situated, since a half million others will find no college with room for them, officials of Texas Technological College believe.

Statistics from a recent report of John W. Snyder, director of War

Mobilization and Reconversion, to President Truman are cited by T. C. Root, assistant to Pres. W. M. Whyburn to Texas Tech, to support the stand.

The report estimates 970,000 veterans—more than double the 400,000 enrolled this spring—will seek admission to colleges this fall and 700,000 of them will be accepted, leaving 270,000 without a place to secure college work under terms of the GI Bill of Rights. It also is esti-

imated 2,100,000 young men and women will attempt to enroll in college in September and 500,000 of them will be rejected because of inability of colleges to provide instructional services.

Are Your Tomato Vines at Stake?

Raising a crop of tomatoes in your garden is something like bringing up a family. Children and tomato vines can both be allowed to go their own sweet way, following their natural inclinations; or, you can keep them from having all the freedom they'd like and wield a firm hand in the direction you want them to head. Both ways of thinking have enthusiastic followers.

Take tomatoes. If you have plenty of space and the ground under the vines is not likely to be wet causing the fruit to rot, you can often get a splendid crop with less work by just letting the vines sprawl. On the other hand there are a number of advantages to training tomato vines.

In a small garden there is real economy of space by staking because the plants can be set close together and many more grown in the same area. Getting the vines off the ground allows them more sunshine and often prevents the tangled mass of leaves and stems from shading the fruits and delaying ripening. When the vines are off the ground, the fruits usually ripen more evenly and are easier to gather without breaking or pulling up the vines.

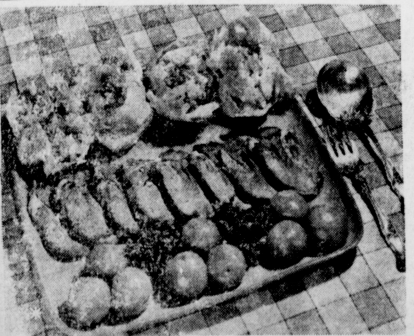
There are several suitable ways of staking tomato vines. One of the customary methods is to use poles about six feet long by one inch square, driving them a foot into the ground, one beside each plant. Some

like to nail two or three short crosspieces to each pole to form a trellis. Tomato plants set along a fence will sometimes form an ornamental as well as useful border, and the fence posts, if slender, will serve as supports to which the vines can be tied.

There's a simple effective way of staking called the "teepee" method. Four poles about five feet in length are set beside four tomato plants equally distant from each other. The stakes need not be driven into the ground but are tied tautly together at the top (see illustration). Each plant is fastened to and supported by its pole.

Whatever method of staking is used, all the side shoots except the trunk and two main branches should usually be nipped off before the plants are tied to their supports. This encourages stronger growth and better fruits. For tying the plants be sure to use soft string or strips of rag. Hard twine may cut or break the branches, especially when the wind blows.

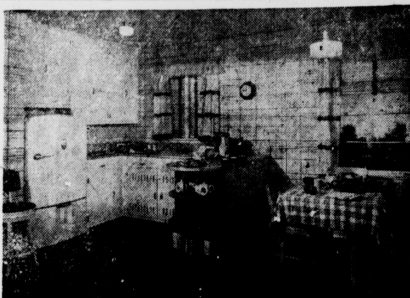

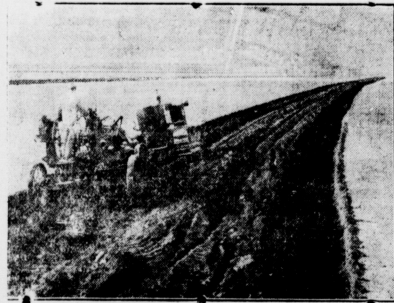

CONNALLY STATEMENT

Senator Tom Connally, just before boarding the plane with Secretary of State Byrnes, to attend the conference on Italy and Balkan countries in Paris, made the following statement:

"Today I am accompanying Secretary of State Byrnes and Secretary Vandenberg on a trip to Paris to attend the adjourned conference of Foreign Ministers on the subject of Italian and Balkan treaties. It is my hope that we may have more success than was achieved at the recent conference.

"It is my view that unless a quick and definite agreement can be reached, the conference should adjourn and call a peace conference of the 21 nations interested in these treaties. The nations who fought the war and made the necessary sacrifices to win it constitute the only legal authority for making peace with Italy and the other defeated countries. To my mind it is unsound for the four Foreign Ministers to undertake this task themselves. I make this contention not-

withstanding the Moscow Agreement reached by the Foreign Ministers in December, 1945.

"If such a peace conference cannot agree, I see no other alternative except the making of separate treaties with the nations affected. It is unreasonable to allow a veto by one foreign minister to upset the whole program. We should not tolerate such a situation.

"Many of the questions involved in the Italian and Balkan treaties are not of primary importance to the United States. So far as our strictly national interests are concerned, they are secondary. Our interests lie in the general subject of peace and the hope that we can preserve peace in Europe and prevent involvement in war or having the peoples of Europe involved. We oppose leaving quarrels over territory and other matters like festering sores to be irritated until they become causes of war. We do not want another Danzig nor a Polish corridor in the Mediterranean area or elsewhere. The United States is

unselfishly exerting itself to compensate the differences among the nations involved.

The United States is not in alliance with Great Britain or any other European nation. We are not only not a member of any bloc, but we are opposed to the formation of blocs by other states. We believe that in a strong United Nations lies our best hope of world peace.

"We are opposed to economic, political or military monopolies by any nation or power on earth. Hitler with his National Socialism dreamed that he could rule the world. Mussolini and his Fascism toyed with a similar ambition.

"Let me warn any nation or power that now plans to subjugate the rest of the world (economically or politically or militarily, to look for Hitler's glory in the depths of his bomb-proof shelter. Let them look to the bones of Mussolini resting in disgrace an infamy. World dominion is a fatuous dream. The peoples of the world will not stand for it."

HOME DYING WITH COMMERCIAL DYES

You probably won't have to think too long before you'll be ready to guess, and if it's cotton bags you're thinking of, you're absolutely right. Many faded garments and household materials, the fabrics of which are still good, along with the cotton bags can be made usable by re-dyeing. Much expense can be saved by re-dyeing them at home. The process is not complicated, although it requires time and patience.

DDT RECOMMENDATION STATED

COLLEGE STATION—Texas county agricultural agents have advised that for the present, the only treatment recommended by the Texas A and M College Extension

Service for the control of horn flies, lice and mosquitoes on livestock is wettable DDT powder.

DDT for this purpose is now on the market in two very different forms. (1) dry, in wettable powder and (2) liquid, in oil or xylene solutions or emulsions. Both forms may be diluted with water for use as a spray or dip.

The decision to recommend only DDT in wettable powder form for use on livestock was made by a committee of entomologists and animal husbandry who checked all known sources of information. The group will make further recommendations as research on DDT goes on.

The committee pointed out that DDT in wettable powder goes into suspension when diluted with water for use as a spray or dip. There was no evidence that it was harmful to animals even if used at strength somewhat greater than that recommended by the manufacturer. It was further reported that "DDT in oil solution or emulsion form does not remain in suspension but goes into a true solution. When applied to animals in this form it can be absorbed through the animal's skin. If the solution is used as a spray or dip at less than the manufacturer's recommended strength, it may not give effective or lasting control. If it is used at more than the recom-

mended strength and if the precautions listed by the manufacturer are not exactly followed, it may have toxic results.

CULL INEFFICIENT HENS

COLLEGE STATION—Any hen laying less than a dozen eggs a month is losing money for her owner, considering prevailing prices of feed and eggs. These inefficient hens should be culled from the laying flocks, the Texas A and M College Extension Service is telling its farm families and backyard poultry raisers of the state.

A hen consumes about five lbs. of feed per month even though she is not laying, so further reduction of laying flocks is being sought by the government in view of the current feed shortage. For the nation as a whole, the reduction asked is one of every seven hens.

According to Sam Moore, Extension poultry specialist, most Texans flocks could lose one of every seven hens, and with proper culling profits would increase. Until recently it was said, Texas egg production this year has exceeded last year's for the same period, although the state has reduced its poultry population to or below pre-war numbers. This indicates a rise in production per bird.

While duck production this spring was 20 per cent less than last year with good management an average number of pullets should go into production on Texas farms this fall, Moore says. He indicates that there are large amounts of shell eggs and poultry in at in storage and the demand for fresh eggs has been good this spring.

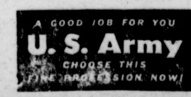
