Cancer Crusade Drive Starts Here Tuesday

Some fifty volunteers in Briscoe County will join more than two million fellow volunteers across the nation on Tuesday evening, April 18, in launching a new attack on cancer.

Locally and nationally, according to Mrs. Dee McWilliams, 1967 Crusade Chairman for the Briscoe County Unit of the American Cancer Society, the attack promises to be the largest ever undertaken against the second most fatal disease in the United States.

The A.C.S. begins its annual educational and fund-raising Crusade with the start of Cancer Control Month as designated by President Johnson.

In Quitaque and Silvertown more volunteers will go into action than in the 1966 Crusade last April. Mrs. McWilliams said reports from the national headquarters of the American Cancer Society indicate similar gains throughout the country. "The build-up for this year's attack on cancer demonstrates the growing public awareness of the urgency of the problem," she said. "We have a strong organization, an enthusiastic and determined group of volunteers.

with life-saving educational material. More funds will be raised—funds greatly needed for expended research, education and service."

Mrs. McWilliams cited funds for research as one of the most urgent needs.

"Great progress has been made," she continued. "Intensified research promises new advances. Yet in the face of this, the Society has been in the position of having to turn its back on research projects that cry for support."

This year's Cancer Society volunteers will not only be leaving leaflets containing the seven warning signals but will also be asking residents to fill in the answers on a questionnaire to be mailed in an envelope to be provided. The district offices across the state will be receiving the completed questionnaires and tabulating the answers to determine the educational needs in Texas. An attempt will be made to determine how many people smoke, what ages they are and how many have quit smoking in the past year. Information will also be requested on frequency of health check-ups.

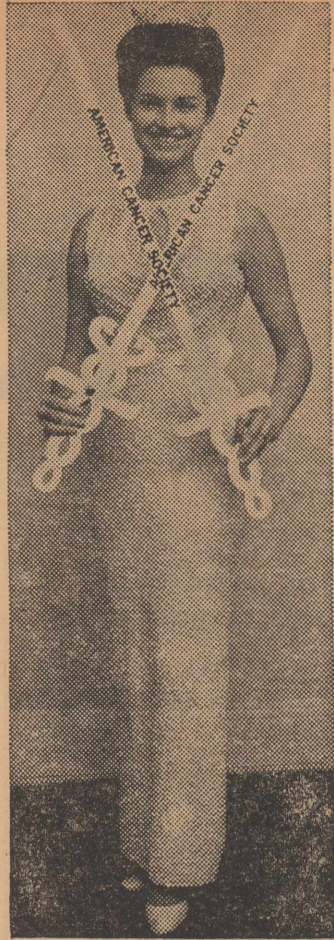

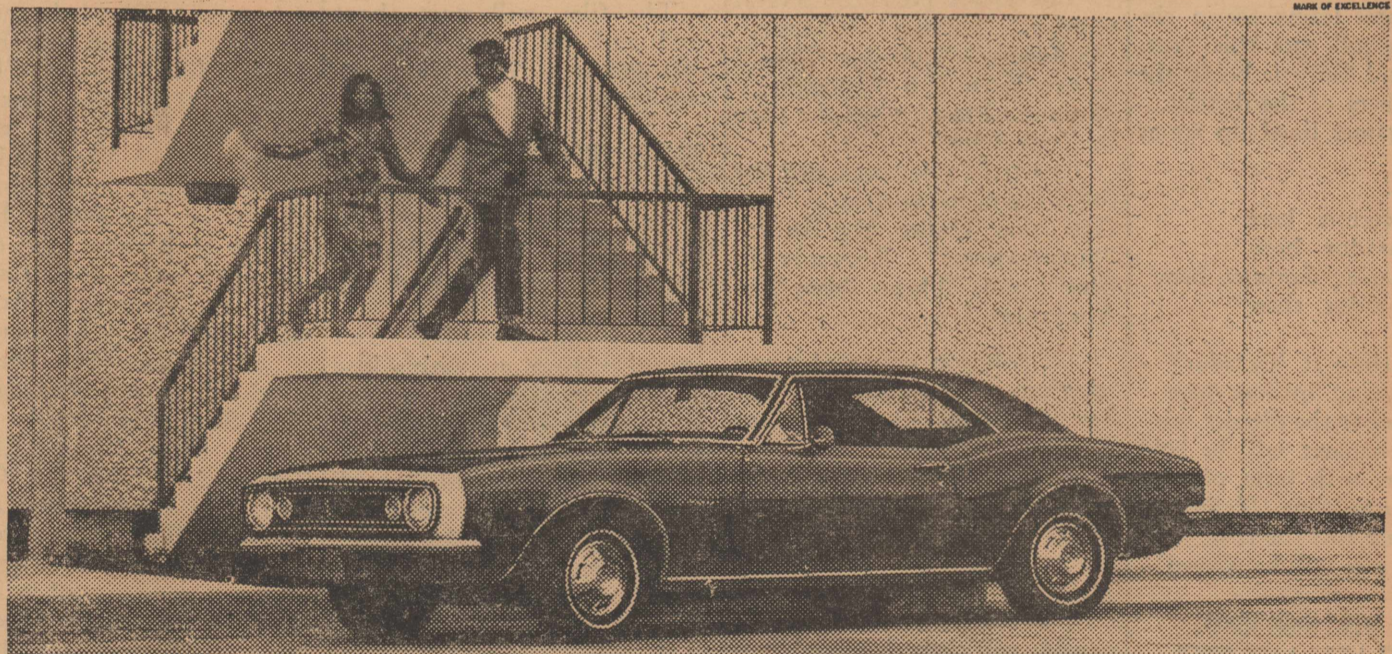

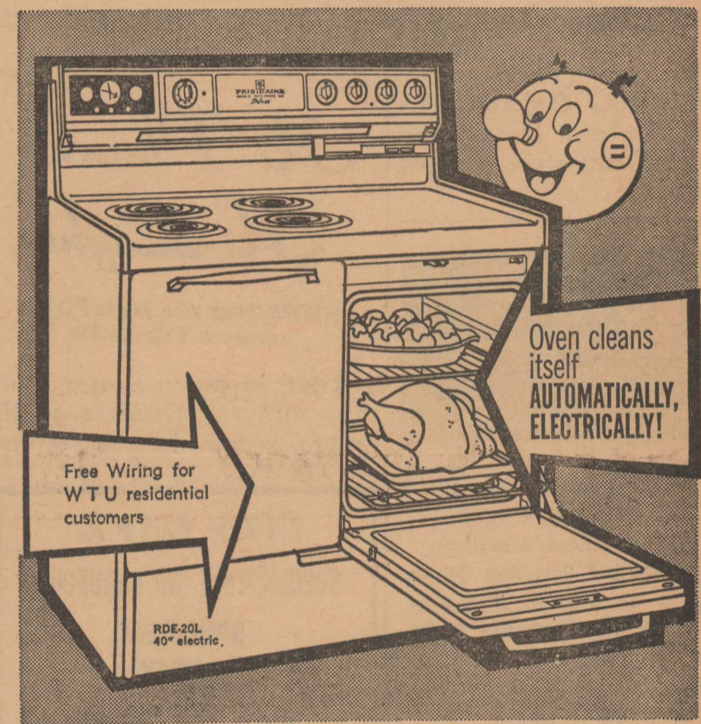

irrigation-fertilizer test conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1966. Eighty pounds of nitrogen produced the highest yields and net dollars returned of the nine fertilizer treatments tested under the three top yielding irrigation methods. The irrigation system of preplant, pre - square, late first bloom produced the highest mean yield. Yield with this system however, were not significantly higher than the same irrigation schedule in which every other row was irrigated after a preplant irrigation of every row.

James Valliant, Soil Scientist, and Loyd Langford, Associate Agronomist on the Foundation staff conducted the studies.

This research project was designed to determine which combination of time of irrigation and fertilizer level will produce the greatest net return. This is based on yield, quality, and the highest irrigation efficiency or "Practical Efficiency."

Preplant, pre - square, late first bloom and peak bloom time of irrigation of every row produced the highest mean yield. The alternate row method at the same schedule resulted in less total irrigation and produced an equal return per acre, with a solid preplant irrigation. This alternate row irrigation was used for the first time in 1966, and will be repeated in the 1967 planting for further study. Studies in the past have shown the preplant, first bloom and peak bloom to be superior to other methods studied prior to 1966.

Valliant says, "Timing of irrigation on cotton is being investigated for the following reasons: 1. A larger stalk was desired and this could be obtained by an early irrigation. The pre-square irrigation was selected to promote a larger stalk and would be applied at a time which would not cause square shed. (Past studies indicated that an irrigation at squaring time causes the squares to drop). 2. Fiber length development is most critical 16 to 20 days after bloom and is controlled by the availability of moisture during this period. By applying an irrigation at late first bloom, adequate moisture was available during this critical time. 3. Fiber strength is developed 35 to 45 days after first bloom. An irrigation at

this time supplied the necessary amounts of water during this development period. 4. The late first bloom and the peak bloom irrigation increased the amount

of available moisture during the boll development because of the closeness of the irrigation dates."

America's Rough Rider

Sportsman Of The Century



Theodore Roosevelt, 26th President of the United States, big game hunter and father of conservation in America, was named Sportsman of the Century by the Winchester Centennial Commission of the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation.

The designation was made on the 108th anniversary of his birth at a gathering of 100 prominent conservationists, political leaders, sportsmen, industrialists and journalists.

Archibald Roosevelt, sole surviving son of T. R., accepted from the late N. Harvey Collison, Olin's board chairman, a gold plated custom-engraved Centennial '66 Winchester rifle, which he in turn presented to the Boone & Crockett Club's gun museum in the former Roosevelt home, Sagamore Hill, at Oyster Bay, Long Island, now a national monument. President Roosevelt was one of the organizers of the club which has become the arbiter and record-keeper of North American big game trophies.

In hailing T. R. as the 20th Century's exemplary sportsman, William L. Wallace, Winchester-Western's vice president and general manager, said: "There could be no other man so designated. The virtues he exemplified, the values

he cherished, the morality he espoused, the active life he advanced represent what we have always considered to be the very best qualities of America's people. The principles and beliefs are as valid today as they were in his lifetime."

Wallace recalled that Theodore Roosevelt began his determined drive for conservation legislation as soon as he reached the White House. His administration established the first Federal Wildlife Refuge; the Reclamation Act; the First National Monuments Act; the U. S. Reclamation Service and created the National Conservation Commission.

Wallace said: "It is enough to say that every time a citizen visits Yellowstone or the Grand Canyon, he should offer a silent tribute for the eternal gift which one man's foresight and determination made possible."

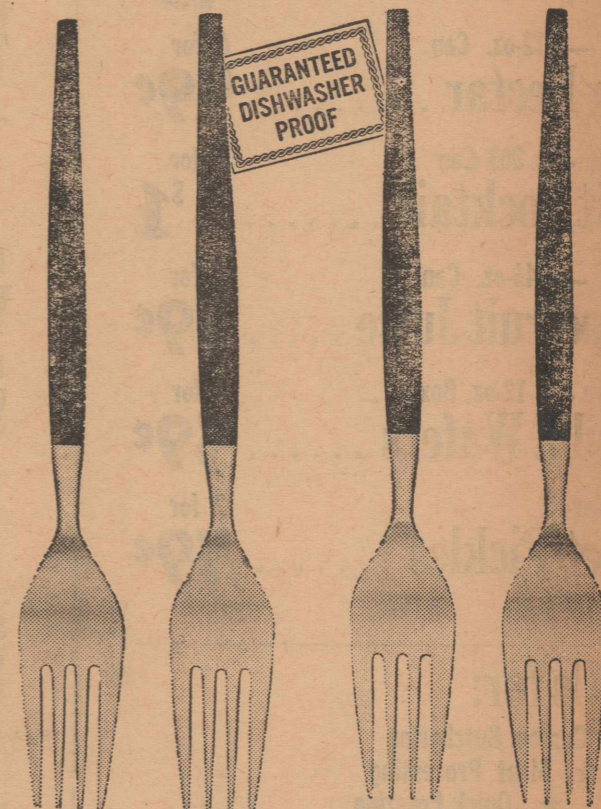
