SENATOR HIGHTOWER APPOINTED TO STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

AUSTIN ... Lieutenant-Governor Preston Smith today announced the appointment of Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to the Texas Legislative Council.

The Legislative Council is a permanent legislative service agency with a full-time professional staff, which conducts studies requested by legislative resolution, provides bill-drafting services during sessions, and is also charged with the statutory revision function. Members of the Council, who determine policy and direct the work of the important agency, are appointed after the adjournment of each regular session by the presiding officers of the two Houses, who also serve on the Council, with the Lieutenant-Governor as chairman and the Speaker of the House of Representatives as vice chairman.

Hightower began his first term in the Senate with the 59th Legislature and was a member of the House of Representatives of the 53rd Legislature in 1953. He is chairman of two important committees of the Senate of the 60th Legislature, Contingent Expense and Game and Fish, and is also a member of the following additional standing committees of the upper house: Agriculture and Livestock; Counties, Cities and Towns; Finance; Insurance; Labor and Management Relations; Legislative, Congressional, and Judicial Districts; Oil and Gas; and Water Conservation.

Briscoe County Jail Is Now A Recorded Texas Landmark

The historic Briscoe County jail in Silverton has been named a recorded Texas Historic Landmark, significant to the history of this community and state, and worthy of preservation, today announced Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

As a result of meeting TSHSC requirements for this high official designation, the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretative plate giving a capsule history of the structure will be affixed to the structure.

Dedication of the marker will be announced by Mrs. C. O. Allard of Silverton, chairman of the Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee.

A certificate signed by Governor John Connally, Charles Woodburn and Chairman Allard will be presented at the dedication.

The inscription on the marker reads:

"Briscoe County Jail"
"Built 1894 of handcut stone hauled here by horse drawn wagons from Tule Canyon.

New Cotton Insect Control Methods

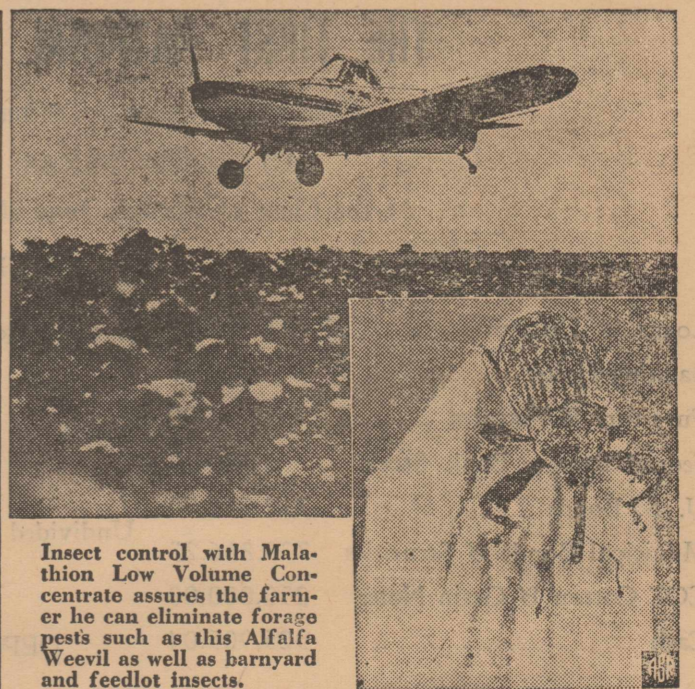
Cotton insects are a constant threat to profitable cotton farming. Back in the 1940's, the normal control program was application of insecticide dusts. HOME NOTES

When you read or hear that the Consumer Price Index has fluctuated, do you often wonder exactly what "Consumer Price Index" means? If this question puzzles you, an understanding of the term will help you be a better informed shopper, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist with Texas A & M University.

Consumer Price Index is a measure in prices of approximately 300 goods and services that a family uses—food, rent,

clothing, transportation, medical services and many other topics that are surveyed in 46 cities each month. They are computed and published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in Washington, D. C. This index tells you what has happened to the average cost of living.

Prices on goods and services are important in family living. Some of the 80 food items that go into the cost of living index are round steak, hamburger, bacon, frying chicken, fresh milk eggs apples, bananas, potatoes, head lettuce, canned tomatoes, frozen orange juice coffee and sugar. Also considered are restaurant meals away from home.

Instead of publishing actual

dollars and cents changes in the price of foods, the Bureau makes up a price "index." This index measures the percentage of change from a previous period. The base period, which is the average for the years 1957-1959, is always equal to 100. Therefore if the index was 114.8, as in February, this signifies that prices were 14.8 percent higher than they were in the average 1957-59 period.

Summer weather calls for something refreshing at mealtime. Why not try cool, tasty melons.

Supplies of cantaloupes are good; the watermelon season is moving into full swing and honeydews are also available.

For a refreshing starter on a summer morning, she suggests wedges of lime, generous spoonfuls of chilled canned fruit cocktail or fresh fruits and cantaloupe half-shell for a delightful breakfast treat. Put the

assorted fruits in chilled cantaloupe and squeeze lime juice over all.

Fresh peaches are more plentiful and flavor is improved. Oranges and grapefruit are still available as are fresh strawberries. A wider variety of soft fruits are now available including grapes, plums, cherries and nectarines but quality and price vary considerably. Pineapples, bananas and avocados are also suggested as worthy of consideration.

As a result of the weather, vegetable prices vary and quality is not always up to standard. Among the best choices are eggplant, blackeye, purple hull and crowder peas, okra, bell peppers squash, corn, tomatoes, carrots, cucumbers, collards, mustard and turnip tops. Head lettuce quality is some better but prices are relatively high.

Frying chickens are wearing reasonable price tags and in addition chicken hens and turkeys represent good values. Turkey rolls and roasts in foil pans

are gaining favor as tempting convenience items. Eggs are a bargain.

Fabric softeners, one of the newer laundry products, have proved to be a valuable wash-day aid. When added to the final rinse, fabric softeners impart a delightfully soft touch to clothing and household articles, reduce static electricity, and make ironing easier.

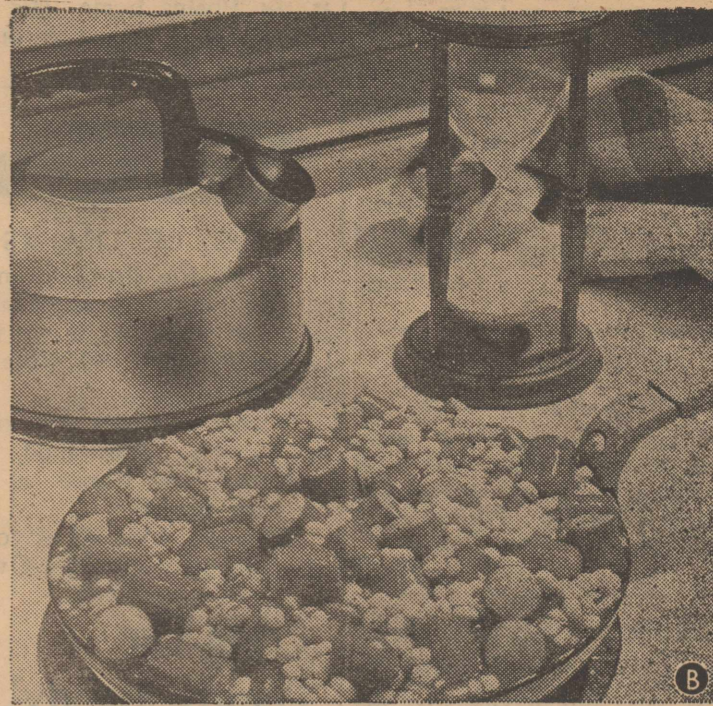

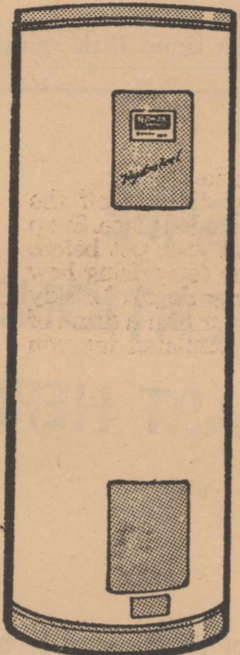

From The County Agents' Desk

From the County Agent's Desk
Many ornamental plants, particularly roses, in Briscoe County are heavily infested with aphids, County Agent Ken Cook reports.

Cook adds if large numbers of aphids are feeding on a plant its beauty is greatly marred—it becomes devitalized, and may die.

Aphids, commonly known as plant lice, are small, soft-bodied, pear-shaped insects. Cornicles, a pair of small tubes projecting from the back

of the body, provides positive identification. Aphids are usually 1/25 to 1/8 of an inch long and vary in color from light yellow to green or black.

The plant lice are destructive in that they insert their short stout beak into the plant and suck up vital plant juices. When large numbers are present, the plants are greatly devitalized, and the leaves become curled, cupped, or distorted.

When the flower buds of roses fail to develop properly, the aphids are feeding on the growing tips and flower tubes of the plant.

Aphids can be controlled by treating the affected plants with Sevin, diazinon, Cygon, lindane, malathion, nicotine sulfate, or with a new granular systemic, disulfoton. Disulfoton is being marketed under various trade names.

In using any insecticide be sure to read the label carefully and follow directions. Cook warns.

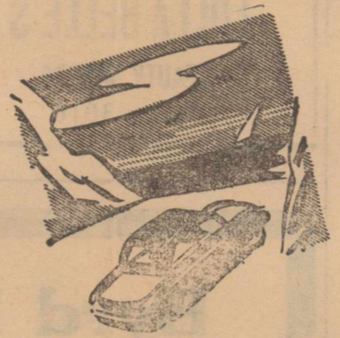
