A reception followed the ceremony at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bogan.

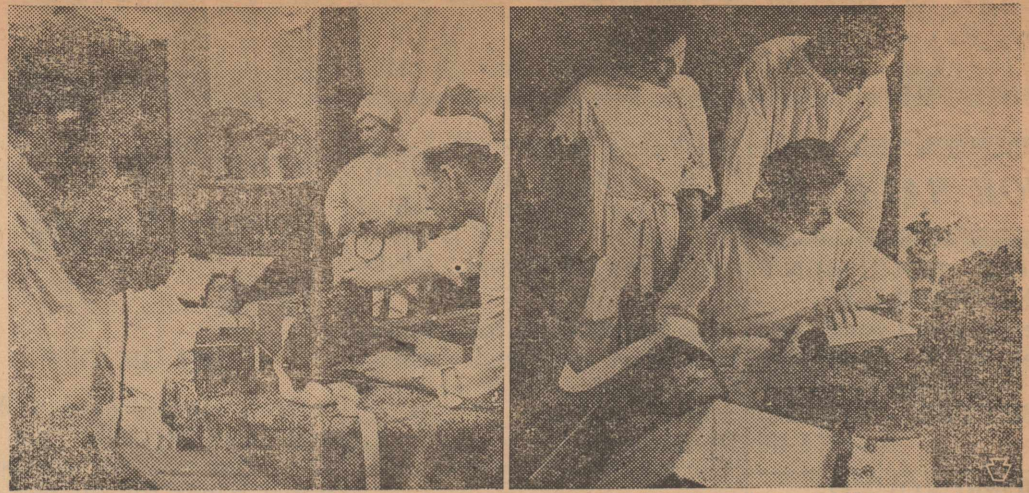
For travel to New Orleans on her wedding trip the bride wore a lime green silk suit with matching green cloche. She also wore a white orchid corsage.

Partners In Health



For second opinion on diagnosis and emergency treatment, first-aid team at bedside sends patient's heart tracings to hospital experts in cardiology, through 'phone.

It takes partnership to win for health. Here an emergency team at bedside and a team of heart specialists in a European hospital are the partners.

In this case, the bedside team seeks a second opinion on both diagnosis and emergency treatment for its patient, suspect of serious thrombosis. An on-the-spot consultation is made possible through a 2-lb. apparatus connected to both a portable electrocardiogram and a telephone.

The device, the small, boxy object on the table, transmits the cardiogram to receiver units in the hospital. This permits a double-checking of the emergency

diagnosis, rapidly made through necessity, by a team of cardiologists, seen at right poring over duplicate heart tracing.

To make the point that it takes all kinds of medical skills to save lives, the World Health Organization has selected "Partners in Health," as the 1967 World Health Theme.

The aim throughout the year is to make better known to young people career opportunities in health, and to call attention to the world's medical manpower shortage — not just of physicians, but of all members of the allied health profession.

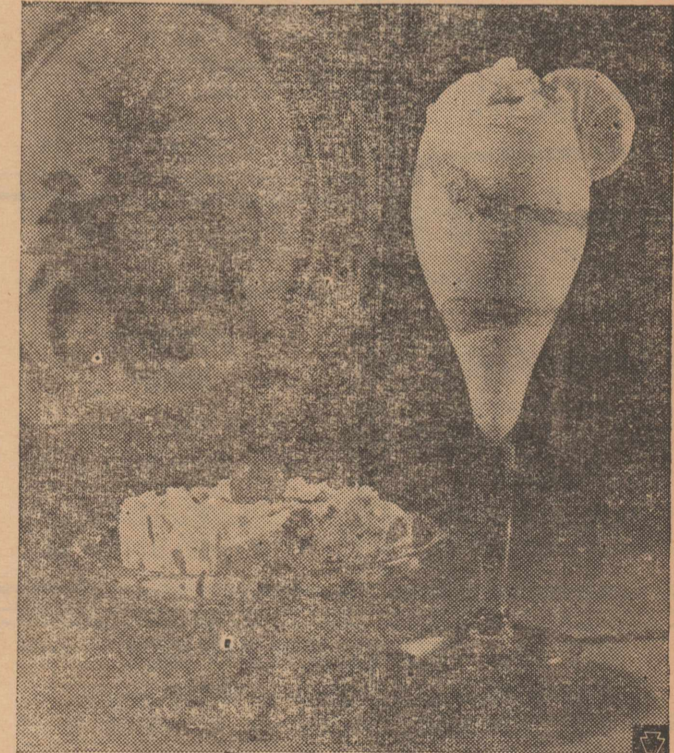

FROZEN TUTTI FRUTTI

- 1/2 cup PET Evaporated Milk
- 1 cup mashed bananas
- 3-oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1/2 cup cut-up pecans
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup cut-up maraschino cherries, drained
- 1 Tablesp. lemon juice

Chill evaporated milk in ice tray until almost frozen at edges. Mix bananas, pineapple, pecans, sugar, cherries and lemon juice in a 1-quart bowl. Put ice-cold milk into cold small bowl of electric mixer (or 1 1/2-quart bowl). Using cold beaters, whip with electric mixer at high speed or with rotary hand beater until stiff. FISH DIE-OFF

Hot, windless days of August and September are the times when pond owners should watch ponds for summer die-off of fish.

Oxygen depletion, due to dying and rapid decaying of water weeds and other organic substances when the weather is hot and still, usually is the cause of fish die-off.

All animal life in the pond

use oxygen 23 hours a day, but oxygen is replaced by surface absorption from air and by release from microscopic plants only during sunlight.

Oxygen is lowest in ponds at daybreak. If it is dangerously low, fish will come to the surface and gasp for air early in the morning.

To relieve the oxygen shortage, broadcast from 50 to 100 pounds of superphosphate per surface acre over the pond. This buffers toxic effects of carbon dioxide and ammonia and stimulates microscopic plants to produce more oxygen. If treated soon after fish show distress, the situation is usually relieved within an hour.

Using outboard motors to stir up the water and replenish the oxygen supply is often recommended for small ponds. If a pump is available, water can be pumped from the bottom

and sprayed back on the surface. Suffocation from oxygen depletion is not the only cause of fish die-off. Careless use of insecticides when spraying crops or animals can also cause fish deaths.

Briscoe County horse owners, including 4-H club members should be interested in a new publication just released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The publication MP - 833 "Insect, Mite and Tick Parasites of Texas Horses", is available at my office.

It is designed to furnish handy reference information on the common parasites which attack horses in the state.

Included are discussions on the life history, habits and

damage done by horse bot flies, horse lice, mange mites, ticks and biting flies.

Because of the frequent changes in control recommendations, no control measures are given in the publication.

These are available in another publication, MP - 691, which are also available at the office.

Horse owners are invited by for a copy of the new publication as well as the one on control recommendations.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which shall be prescribed by law, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."
