

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Tom Christian Enters Race For Representative



Tom Christian

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Tom Christian, an Armstrong County farmer and rancher has entered the Republican primary election for the office of State Representative of the 75th Legislative District. The district comprises Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley, and Randall Counties.

Mr. Christian has been chairman of the Armstrong County Republican Executive Committee since 1960, and he was a state delegate at the 1962 convention. He is a strong advocate of state government, sound law enforcement, and is opposed to a state income tax.

"Last year for the first time the Texas Legislature went into one year financing and this will cost the taxpayers \$15,000 per day just to conduct the session," Mr. Christian said. "As a Republican I feel I would be free to work for a more responsible handling of state funds."

Having taught school he realizes the necessity of a strong-edu cational system in the state and favors local control of the schools at the secondary level.


