program during the past four years and will also discuss the use of sex attractants and sterile males as new techniques in controlling the boll weevils.

Sex attractants and sterile male boll weevils will be used in isolated tests this year to further develop means of eventually eradicating boll weevil populations. says the agent. These new techniques are designed to reduce populations by reducing the number of native weevils available for mating by mating these weevils to sterile males.

Cook emphasizes that these techniques can be effective only after a program of conventional spraying has been followed to reduce populations. They act as a "mop-up" operation.

Timely spraying is still the key to boll weevil control, stresses the county agent. And since the advent of the spray program, boll
