Joe talked to Weldon Griffin and reported that he was pretty badly bruised from the actios, but suffered no broken bones.

Joe enlisted in the Marines at the same time as Ron Hall, who was wounded in action himself several weeks ago. The two are stationed near each other, although Joe reported that he had not seen Ron in quite awhile.

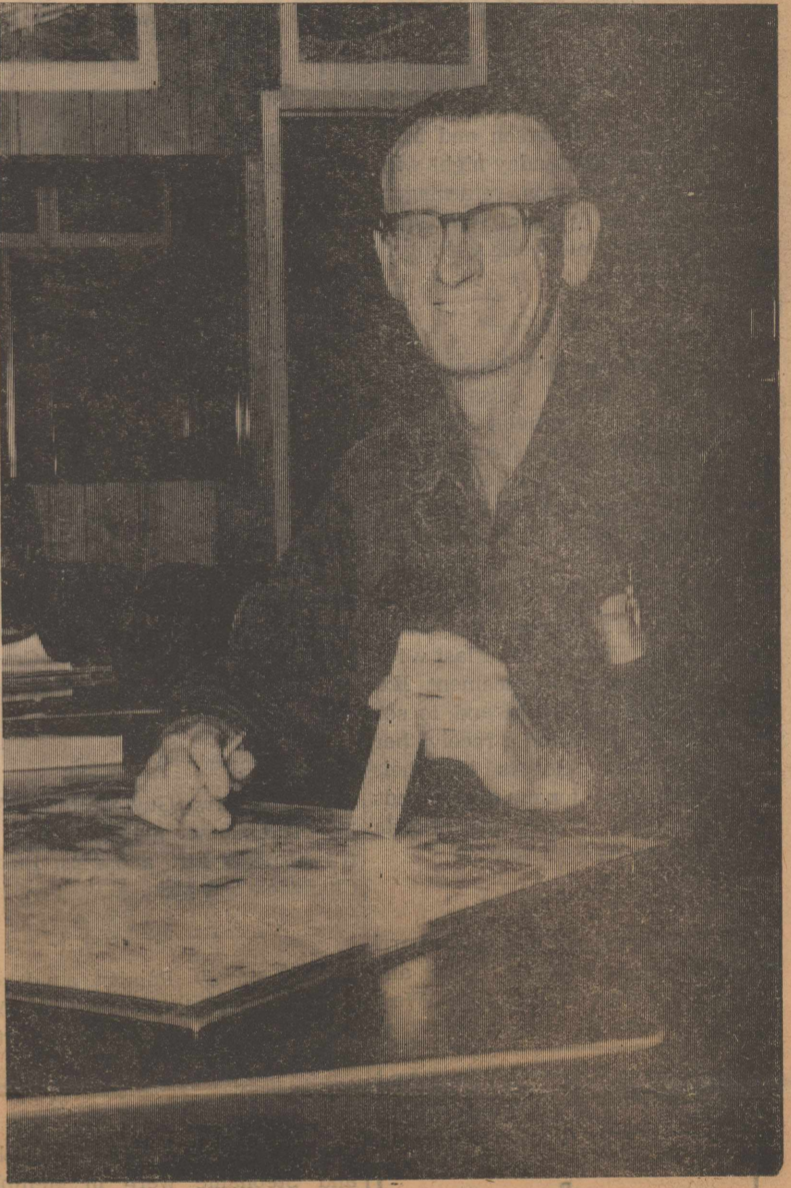
Flomot V.B.S Set For Next Week

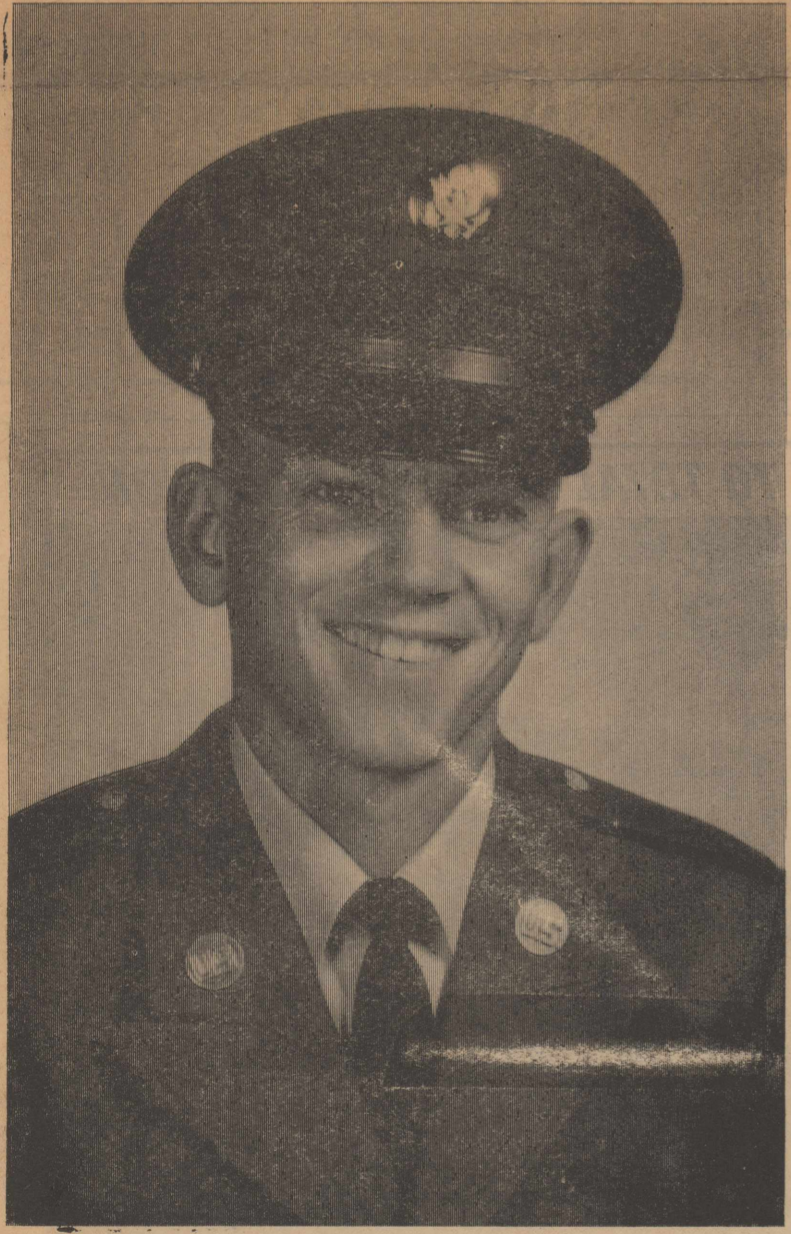

Sergeant Allen R Buckelew Decorated For Heroism In Vietnam

Announcement has been made that Sgt. Allen R. Buckelew, grandson of Mrs. J. M. Buckelew, has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) with "V" device action on 1 February 1968 in Vietnam.

Reason for the award is contained in the general orders and reads as follows:

"For heroism: On this date, Sgt. Buckelew was serving as a radio operator with his unit while it was engaged in an intense firefight with a large Viet Cong force. Sergeant Buckelew continuously assisted his platoon leader by maintaining radio communications. He braved the hail of incoming enemy rounds while moving from one position to another along the platoon's sector of the perimeter. Sergeant

Bucklew used professional skill at all times in maintaining command communications despite his hazardous position in the battle zone. Through his courage and outstanding devotion to duty, Sergeant Buckelew contributed immeasurably toward the successful outcome of the encounter. Sergeant Buckelew's actions are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the 1st Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

From The County Agent's Desk

OILING HERBICIDES GIVE BETTER WEED KILL
Field tests on the Texas High Plains show that non-toxic oils used as oil-water emulsion carriers enhance the performance of herbicides for better weed kill. These tests have been underway since 1964 under the direction of Dr. Allen F. Wiese, agronomist in charge of weed control at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains

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1968 RECOMMENDATIONS LISTED

Oil-water emulsion sprays for applying atrazine to grain sorghums this season should be considered. On small weeds one to two pounds of atrazine in one to two gallons of a non-toxic oil should give good weed control. The oil should contain an adequate amount of emulsifier for 20 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are large and the sorghum is more than six inches tall, higher rates of water, oil and atrazine should be used. For aerial spraying, use of 5 to 10 percent of a non-toxic oil with sufficient emulsifier and one to two pounds of atrazine per acre. If the spray drop size is in the range of 200 to 400 microns, application can be made with as little as two gallons of carrier per acre. **EARLY FIELD STUDIES CITED**
In 1964, field tests first indicated that oil emulsions improved the effectiveness of atrazine. Four-inch pigweed growing in 6-inch sorghum was controlled better with atrazine

applied in an oil-water emulsion than with water and surfactant. A year later, good control of 6-inch pigweed was obtained with atrazine at one pound per acre applied in an oil-water emulsion. Results in 1966 again proved the effectiveness of oil-water emulsions, this time by aerial applications, notes Wiese. One pound of atrazine per acre with an oil-water emulsion of only two and one-half gallons of total carrier per acre eliminated six-inch pigweed growing in a field. In one replication of this study, atrazine at two pounds per acre in five gallons of oil-water emulsion carrier was the only treatment that gave some control of barnyard grass. **WEED SIZE IMPORTANT**
Trials during the past year were conducted to determine the proper amounts of oil to apply per acre in oil-water emulsions for both ground and air applications. Tests showed that the amount of oil, total carrier and rate of atrazine should be regulated to the sorghum and weed size. Large weeds were best controlled with ground applications with a mixture of three gallons of oil, 40 gallons of total carrier and two pounds of atrazine per acre. Small


weeds were controlled with a pound of atrazine in one gallon of oil and ten gallons of total carrier. High rates of oil and atrazine injured small sorghum but can be applied safely if both the sorghum and weeds are large. The amount of emulsifier was also checked in oil-water mixtures. Tests showed that enough of this material should be present to completely emulsify the oil with the water and atrazine. Results indicated that two percent of an emulsifier gave optimum weed control. Improper emulsification caused a heavy precipitate which was difficult to remove from sprayers.

Results were outstanding last year with atrazine applied in an oil-water emulsion spray carrier on sorghum. Prospects are also good for using oil-water emulsion spray carriers with post-emergence herbicides on soybeans and cotton.
