## TECHNICAL INSTITUTE NGU ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

The Texas State Technical In-  
 stitute at Amarillo is now accept-  
 ing applications for enrollment in  
 the school's beginning classes  
 scheduled to start at 8:00 a.m. on  
 September 2, 1970.

Initial classes to be taught at  
 the school include courses in air-  
 frame mechanics, technical com-  
 munications, commercial art and  
 advertising, building construction  
 craftsman and technology, graph-  
 ics and design technology, farm  
 and ranch operations and farm  
 and industrial equipment mechan-  
 ics. All courses are approved for  
 VA assistance.

For complete information on the  
 courses, plus facts in regard to  
 housing, financial assistance, work  
 study programs, contact the man-  
 ager of the school's student activi-  
 ties, Mr. J. W. Sollis, in care of  
 Post Office Box 4228, Amarillo,  
 Texas 79105.

Sollis, a native of Crowell, is a  
 former high school principal and  
 math and science teacher. He was  
 principal of high schools in Dim-  
 mitt, Abernathy and Springlake-  
 Earth.

Present plans call for all clas-  
 ses to be conducted in a 65,000  
 square-foot, brick, air-conditioned  
 building during the first trimester  
 of the school year. Students will  
 live in dormitories a short dis-  
 tance from the classrooms, and a  
 cafeteria and student union build-  
 ing is located adjacent to the  
 building. Dr. J. N. Baker, general  
 manager of State Tech at Amaril-  
 lo, extends a special invitation to  
 all interested persons to contact  
 the school for any information  
 they might desire. "We want to  
 offer whatever courses are need-  
 ed in this area to as many stud-  
 ents as possible, regardless of  
 their race, color or creed," said  
 Dr. Baker.

"Our goal is to teach every  
 person possible how to earn a liv-  
 ing at a vocational or technical  
 skill of their choice. We invite ev-  
 eryone to come and 'Learn to  
 Earn' with us," he concluded.

## GRAZING AND HAYING PROGRAMS OFFERED IN SIX TEXAS COUNTIES

U. S. Department of Agricul-  
 ture advised Congressman Bob  
 Price Friday that haying and gra-  
 zing privileges on crop lands tak-  
 en out of production under the  
 Cropland Adjustment Program in  
 the Panhandle counties of Col-  
 lingsworth, Donley, Hall, Hemp-  
 hill, Lipscomb and Wheeler have  
 been approved.

Severe drought in these coun-  
 ties has sharply reduced pasture  
 and forage on lands normally gra-  
 zed or harvested for hay. Haying  
 and grazing privileges on the re-  
 tired acreage set-aside under the  
 CAP program are offered under  
 emergency conditions in designat-  
 ed counties to help prevent liqui-  
 dation of livestock herds. Friday's  
 action gives the ASCS County  
 Committees authority to permit  
 livestock grazing and harvesting  
 of hay on land diverted from crop  
 production, under CAP, in the  
 counties named.

Downward adjustment will be  
 made in payments to farmers if  
 these lands are grazed or harvest-  
 ed for hay.

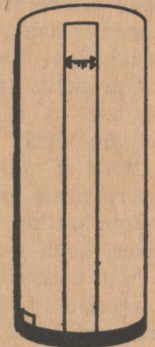

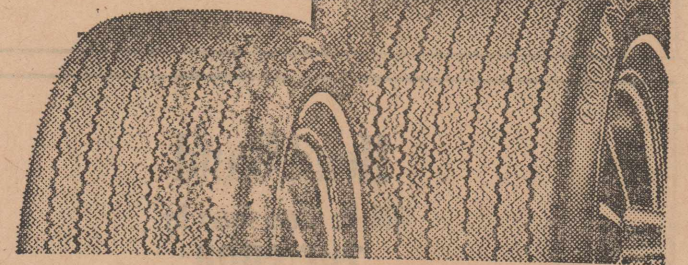

wide efforts of that organization to search out and train new people interested in Bible study.

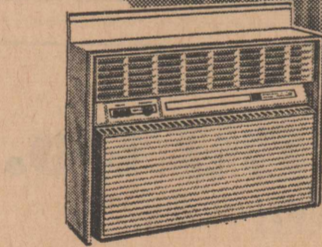
