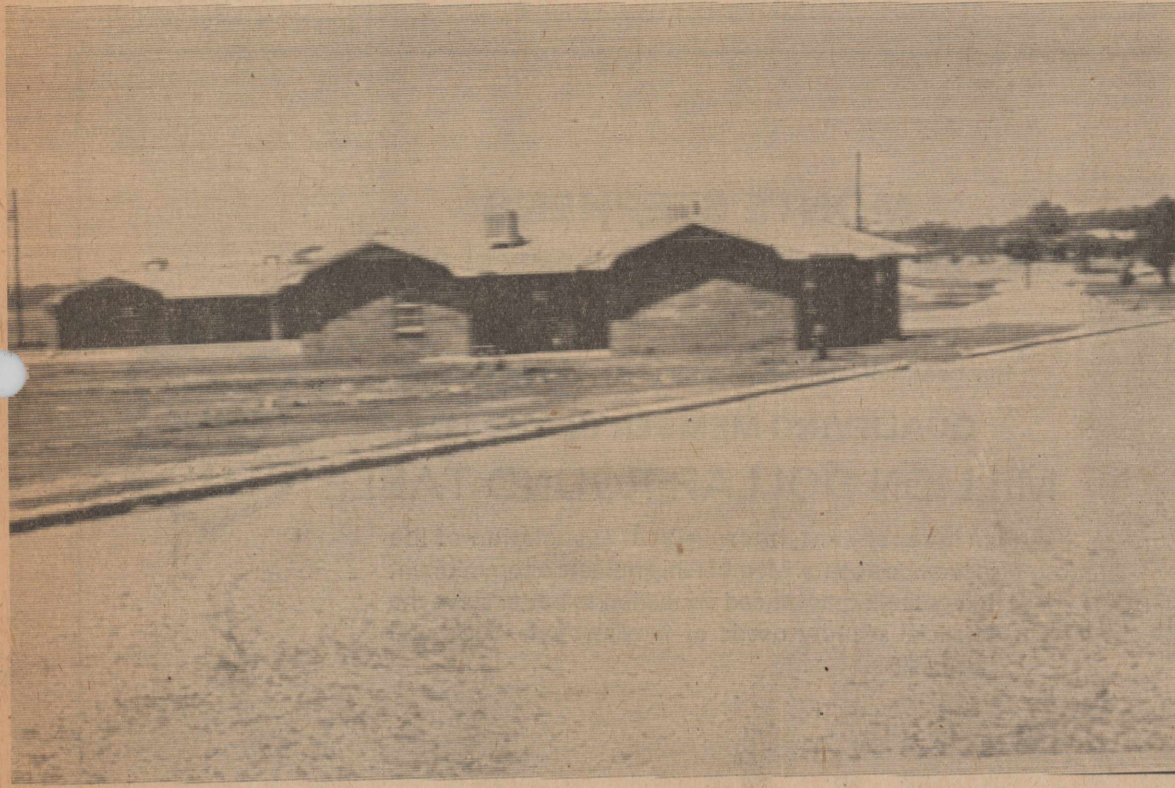

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Valleyview Housing Units Near Completion



F.H.A. officials and other inspectors were in Quitaque Tuesday of this week to inspect the new rental units in the Valleyview Addition, located on Highway 86 on the east edge of Quitaque. The new housing units are a project of the Quitaque Industrial and Development Commission.

The new development consists of five duplexes, each completely private from the other. The front of each family unit is on opposite ends of the building. Each side of the duplex contains two bedrooms, living room, kitchen, a tub-shower bathroom and utility room unit. Each unit in the addition is paneled throughout but each side of a duplex is paneled in a different color. The floors are all covered with tile. Three colors of kitchen appliances are used in the new houses, coppertone, harvest gold and avocado, but different colors are used in the kitchen of each duplex. The back side of each living room opens through glass sliding doors onto a concrete patio, which is enclosed by a wooden fence. The units are all air conditioned.

Each of the duplexes face a street that has been paved and curbed and also has concrete sidewalks to each front door.

Plans are already underway for new homes to be built in the new addition by private individuals. It is reported that Mr. and Mrs. Pete Blankenship plan to build a new home on their property which adjoins the Valleyview Addition.

The inspectors okayed the new addition with a few minor details and Bob Ham, president of the Quitaque Industrial and Development Commission, stated that he hoped that the new addition will be ready for occupancy by June 1. Anyone desiring information concerning the rental of one of the units should contact Bob Ham at the First National Bank in Quitaque.

Light To Moderate Showers Fall in Area

Rev. Raymond Crowder, pastor, invites all the parents to enroll their children in Bible School May 29-June 7, at First Baptist Church, Flomot.

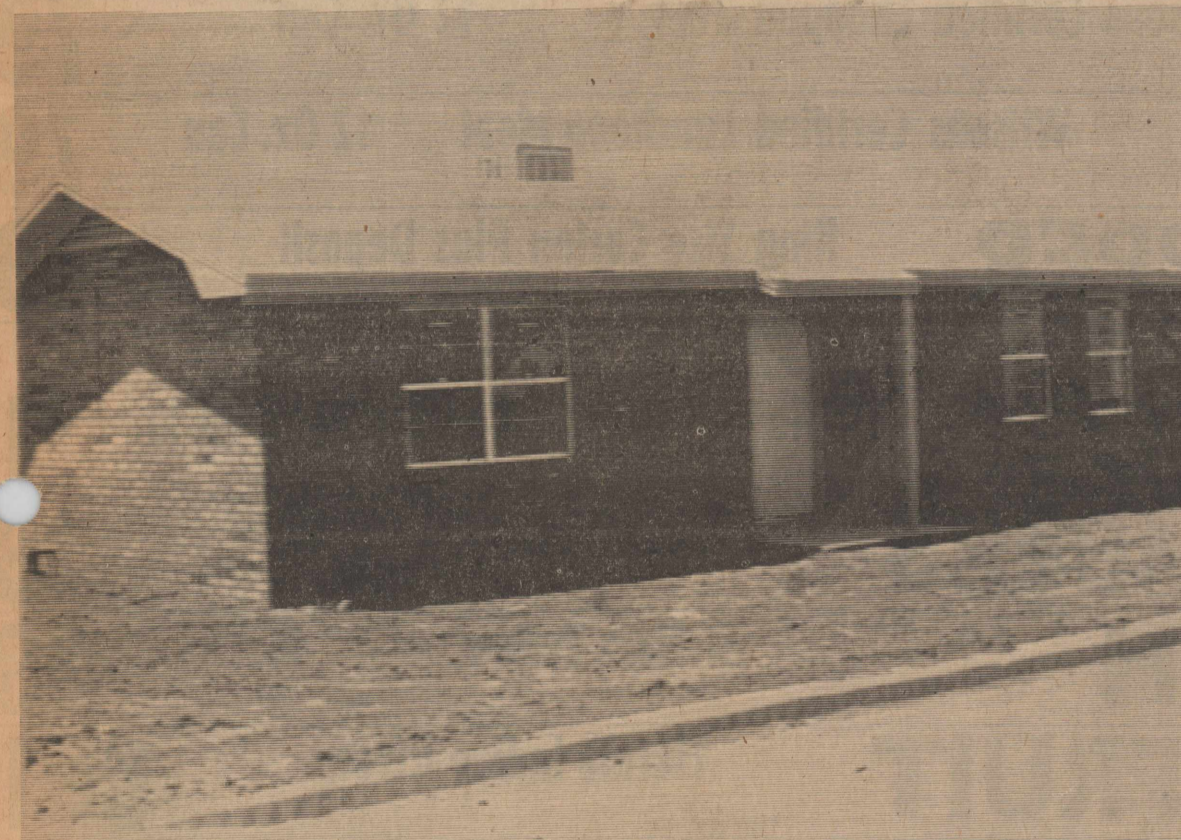

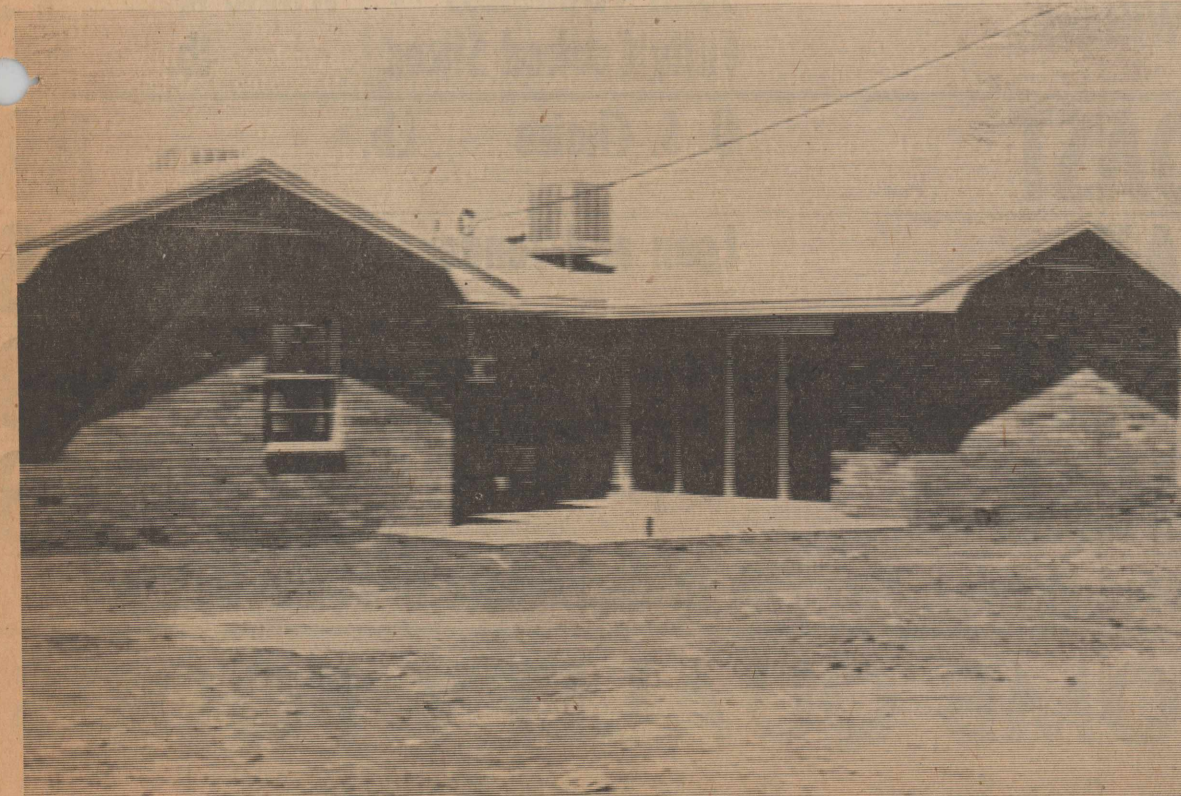

FERTILITY IS ANSWER TO POND - FISH MANAGEMENT

According to Willar Richter of SCS, who was recently in Memphis, landusers that are interested in managing their fishpond to produce the maximum number of large, healthy fish in the shortest time, while at the same time reducing the growth of undesirable submerged water weeds, proper fertility is the answer.

High fertility of pond water accomplishes at least two desirable objectives: (1) Increases fish production and makes it possible to catch more fish, and (2) Helps to reduce the growth of submerged waterweeds.

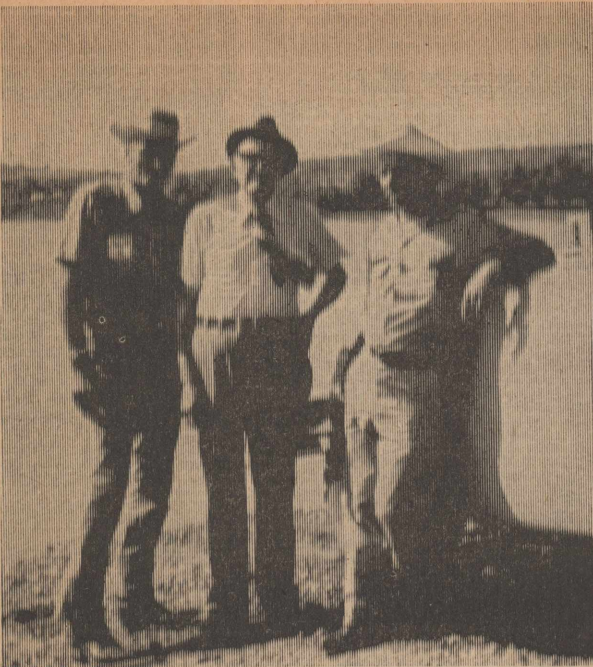
The best time to fertilize is from early spring well into the fall. A mineral fertilizer is best to use. Organic fertilizers, such as cottonseed meal, blood meal, manure, and hay or leaves encourages pond scum. A satisfying analysis is eight pounds of nitrogen, eight pounds of phosphorus, and two pounds of potash per hundred pounds of fertilizer (8-8-2). The average pond requires from 800 to 1200 pounds of 8-8-2 fertilizer per acre each year.

Anyone can fertilize a pond correctly with a simple gadget that is easily made. Nail a 6-inch white disk on the end of a stick. Mark the stick at 12 and 18 inches above the disk. The pond is fertile enough when the disk goes out of sight about 12 inches below the surface. If it can be seen at 18 inches, more fertilizer is needed.

At each application use at least 100 pounds of fertilizer per surface acre, but not more than 200 pounds. The benefits of the fertilizer can be measured with the disk within 3 to 7 days. When the pond begins to clear, test every day or so. When the disk can be seen at 18 inches, add fertilizer to restore the coloration.

Fertilizer can either be poured from a boat or broadcast by hand from the bank of small ponds. One need not scatter the fertilizer over all the pond. In fact, it is better not to place it in water deeper than 5 feet.

Richter stated that a properly fertilized fishpond will support 300 to 500 pounds of bass and sunfish per surface acre each year. The yield to the fisherman will be about half of this amount of 150 to 250 pounds of useable size fish.
