Muleshoe Canning Co. Plans For Big Bean and Pea Pack

Preparations are being made at the plant of the Muleshoe Canning Co. to begin the annual bean pack here, possibly by the end of next week. Carl Case and son, James Case, announce. Already a small batch of beans have been run through the canning line, permitting the management to iron out difficulties and have everything running smooth when the regular season pack begins.

Beans are being grown in small acreage on many farms north and northwest of Muleshoe, however, there is at least one patch of forty acres.

James Case said that the company expects to equal the big pack of last year, when 30,000 cases of No. 2 and No. 10 beans were canned here. Beans mature in about 90 days from planting time. Those planted about May 15 appear to have the best chance at high production this year; some planted earlier were subject to high winds and cutting sand.

Black Eye Peas Pack

For the first time, the local plant has made arrangements to pack blackeye peas and purple hull peas. About a month ago they began to offer contracts to local growers, and now have 500 irrigated acres and 200 dry land acres under contract through a wide territory around Muleshoe.

Peas will be packed for Stokely-Van Camp's, a nationally known canning firm, one of the country's largest. M. P. Tomberlain, field man for Stokely-Van Camp's, has been here advising with farmers about amount of acreage, time of planting, cultivating, and kindred problems.

The Muleshoe plant can handle as many as 100,000 cases of peas. They have the equipment to do the work with.

A large sheller has been lined up outside the plant and inside the plant a new pea line is being arranged and will be ready for operation by August 15. It is expected the peas pack will follow immediately upon completion of the bean pack. Four additional pressure cookers will be installed to handle the peas this season.

Pickers Provided For
Last year, a big hindrance was lack of bean pickers, and it was said some beans were actually wasted because of lack of this sort of labor.

This year it is planned to bring in a number of Mexicans to help with this work. Stokely-Van Camp's representatives have provided four Army pyramid tents to house these workers and their families, and these will be set up near a large house six miles west of town, where plenty of water is available.

The elder Case has been in the canning business for thirty years, and his son, James, has spent practically all his working years at the business.

Many persons are employed inside the local plant, handling and sorting, watching various phases of the work along the line, and handling the canned product.

ARMY LISTS 12 BAILEY CO. MEN AS MISSING OR DEAD

The honor list of dead and missing for Bailey County in World War II, just issued by the War Department, contains the names of 12 men. It is a preliminary list, and the Department plans to publish a complete and final list of deaths at some time in the future; should there be an error in the present list, it will be corrected at the time.

Following are the men officially listed by the Department:

- 1st Lt. Walter A. W. Moeller.
- Pvt. Glen Ogilvie.
- Pvt. Henry G. Pollard, Jr.
- Pfc. W. W. Southerland.

Four of these men were listed as killed in action; one is missing; five died as the result of non-battle action; and one is listed under "finding of death."

The Army report said the State of Texas, which contains 4.78 per cent of the total number who entered the service, contributed 500 per cent of the total number who entered the Army. Of these men and women of Texas who went to war, 2.91 per cent failed to return, and this represents 4.72 of the Army's total dead and missing.

MAHON OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

The members of this 8-man committee were accorded a national recognition for their work in sponsoring the Atomic Bomb project which saved untold American lives, enabling us to outstrip enemy nations that were seeking to perfect the bomb.

Blackeye Peas Suggested As A Fine Cash Crop

Disasters, both large and small have recently visited some farm land in Bailey County leaving the owner and manager wondering what crop would most likely return some cash from the moisture now in the soil. Most land in the county that is not already planted, would respond to the planting of Black Eye peas and there is a certainty that they will have time to produce peas for canning or for harvesting dry before frost. Dawson County farmers learned in 1945 that canneries located in East Texas were so interested in their crop of dry land Black Eye peas that they came six hundred miles in cattle trucks and loaded up the green black eyes as if they were just so much loose hay and haul-d them back to their canneries.

Mr. Case, local cannery operator, has just made a complete new installation of black eye peas canning equipment and has already contracted considerable acreage and could use more. Seed could be bought at Muleshoe, Plainview and Sudan at last reports.

July 20 is considered about the latest planting date for black eye peas consistent with the best of the parties desiring to contract to buy peas in open competition.

Farmers not familiar with details of planting and future marketing

Creation of a special road district of Commissioners' precincts 1, 2 and 3 in Bailey County was ordered Saturday by the Commissioners Court, in session here, after the court had received petitions bearing signatures of 135 property owners.

Petitions are now being circulated asking the court to call an election in the district on the question of issuing bonds to pay for proposed roads.

At a meeting recently held by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, speakers told of the plan to build about 75 miles of paved roads in rural sections of the district. Several men from other sections of the district attended and urged support of the plan.

They estimated at that time that such a program would cost in the neighborhood of \$600,000.

These speakers estimated that this program, coupled with the state's farm to market paving of 2 1/2 miles, and added to paving already laid in the county, will leave no farm farther than six miles away from an all-weather road.

In last week's Journal it was announced that successful bidders on two farm to market projects in the county had been named by the state highway commission. Work on these two roads was predicted within 60 days.

The Journal will have further news in connection with the proposed paving in the coming weeks, when a definite proposal has been adopted.

Halsey said a song entitled "From Big Spring to Old Muleshoe," conveying the idea of service to a huge territory, is being sung at his rallies by Lee Seary, vocalist of the band, and will be heard here that day.

He said he will set up on Main street. His speech will be about 15 minutes in length, the entire program to run about 30 minutes.

He will visit Shallowater and Anton that morning, broadcast over KPFO from Littlefield at 12:30, and in the afternoon visit Amberst, Sudan, Muleshoe, Earth and Springlake.

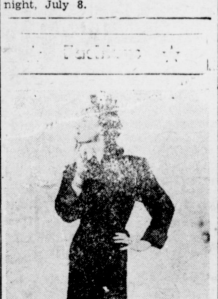

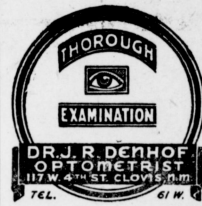

New Highway Map Is Ready

AUSTIN, July 2—Another bid for out-of-state tourists in the making as the Texas Highway Department announces limited quantities of its first post-war color travel map are now rolling off the presses.

The expected bumper crop of summer tourists in the Lone Star State will be guided over Texas highways with the aid of a map that will give visitors a brief introduction to a few of the state's points of interest. In addition it will afford a complete, accurate, easy-to-read map for the use of all.

The de luxe map is expected to be the most popular feature as the Department's information bureaus which have been reopened at strategic points to supply post-war tourists with reliable, up-to-date facts on highways and tourist attractions which support one of the state's largest and fast growing "cash crops."

The post-war edition carries a small scale inset of the state's metropolitan areas, strip maps of the main Texas travel routes and the

Pan American Highway into Mexico it gives mileage between towns and carries a supplementary mileage chart. The highway marking system is explained with illustrations and there is a column of miscellaneous facts about the nation's largest state.

Shown also are the State and National parks, some of the old missions and other points of historical interest. Twenty-six color pictures, which will be changed in each subsequent edition, depict typical Texas scenes.

The outside map, when folded for mailing, bears a picture of the State Capitol and another of Governor Coke Stevenson. Below the Governor's picture is his official greeting "To Motorists Everywhere." In his message Governor Stevenson extends to the people of other states and Nations a cordial invitation to visit Texas and enjoy the hospitality of its people. "The Highways of Texas Are Yours," he says. "Use them freely, for your business and pleasure."

JOB FOR VETS PROBLEM NOW

Unemployed veterans outnumber unemployed civilian workers by 12 to one in Muleshoe. B. H. Thompson, district supervisor for the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, reported today, comparing veteran unemployment with individuals receiving civilian unemployment insurance. He said that the veterans were searching for jobs themselves and that the employment service was aiding but that churches, civic clubs, and merchants associations were needed to help solve this major reconversion problem—the re-employment of war veterans.

In Muleshoe there are 5 unemployed civilian workers and 61 unemployed veterans. The latter are receiving readjustment allowances under the G. I. Bill of Rights, which is administered by the TUCOC in Texas through agreement with the Veterans Administration. Payments under the G. I. Bill of Rights come from monies supplied by the VA out of congressional appropriations for that purpose.

Our economy will be unbalanced until these veterans find jobs, Thompson declared, explaining that this was not only a local problem but nationwide. Everyone has

got to help because our post-war economy is not absorbing them fast enough. These young veterans want the kind of jobs on which they can build a future, get married, raise a family.

Thompson said that in a few instances where the veterans have refused suitable jobs, their allowances have been stopped as provided in the G. I. Bill.

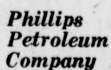

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

Some of our citizens, at least are beginning to be disturbed about flagrant violations of certain laws in the town of Muleshoe and in the surrounding country. One of such violations that seems to be most noticeable in our town at present is the sale of "bootleg liquor." Our county is, according to the voters of most of the citizens, dry. It seems to be common knowledge as to why these "bootleggers" are, and yet nothing seems to be done about it. While this pastor was talking with one of the business men of our town the other day a man drove by and he said, "There goes one of the biggest 'bootleggers' in Muleshoe." Later when the incident was mentioned to another business man he said, "I understand that 'so and so' and 'so and so' is selling it. He called the names of two or three men who are well known in Muleshoe.

Such practices in dry territory give the decent upright, law-abiding citizens a right to ask "WHY?" and they ought to keep on asking why until something is done about it. There are three groups responsible for this state of affairs. (1) Those who are too sorry to make an honest living and are unscrupulous enough to be willing to ruin the lives of others in order to secure money. (2) Those who are sworn to uphold the law and are charged with the responsibility of arresting and trying the violators. (3) The citizens of Bailey County.

Our greatest problem in Muleshoe is not juvenile delinquency, but on the contrary it is adult delinquency. In order to make the stream pure we will have to clean up the spring at its source. Let us begin by removing that which is causing the disorder. We will not gain much by treating the symptoms, but we must get at the cause of the trouble.

JIM PEACE, 47, DIES AFTER TAKING POISON CAPSULE

James Dewey Peace, 47, died at his home in the east part of Muleshoe at 8:30 Wednesday night, after having swallowed a poison capsule at 7:05, members of the family told The Journal.

They said that members of the family attempted to prevent his taking the capsule; and that until the poison began to take effect they were not sure that he had swallowed it. Before he died he told Sheriff Buchanan that he had taken a strychnine capsule. Mr. Peace, a carpenter by trade, acted as dog killer here, and it is presumed he came into possession of the deadly poison in this way.

The family said Mr. Peace had worked on a house in Littlefield early in the day, quitting to go in search of needed lumber. They said that he had not appeared especially despondent, but that he suffered a nervous attack on Friday night preceding his death.

The family came here from Oklahoma 9 years ago and Mr. Peace has followed his trade here. He was erecting several houses in Littlefield at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Grace Lee Peace, and their eight children: Mrs. Hollis Thorne, Muleshoe; James Homer Peace of the Navy, Philadelphia; Mrs. W. B. Morris, Muleshoe; Bobby Gene, Mary Maxine, Ailine, LeHoma, Charles William, and Thomas David, all of the home; Mr. Peace's daughter by a former marriage is Mrs. Dorothy Bonin, Beaumont. Other survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Peace, Fletcher, Okla., three brothers and four sisters.

Mr. Peace was a member of the Methodist church. Funeral services will be held after arrival of relatives. Steed Funeral Home has charge of arrangements.

CROP PROSPECTS BRIGHTEN AS ADDITIONAL RAIN FALLS

Muleshoe received 2.82 inches of rainfall during June, and as the result of two heavy showers, crop conditions in the immediate vicinity, and in fact all over the territory, appear considerably brighter than they did only a few days ago.

Heaviest fall occurred on June 24, .96 inch, and on June 28, .86. Other showers were received as follows: June 9, .14; 10th, .05; 12th, .07; 18th, .48; 19th, .02; 27th, .24.

This is the record of the weather recorder, R. J. Klump, in Muleshoe, but it is a fact that the weather man has a habit of varying the amount falling in various parts of the territory, hence some sections received considerably more, some less than was recorded here.

Particularly was this true of the rain last Friday night, when .86 was registered here. Very heavy rains fell in some parts of the county, particularly in the western parts, and crops were considerably damaged by washing and some seed just planted were covered up, necessitating replanting.

A heavy electrical display accompanied the rain Friday night, and in at least one case wrought property damage. The barn at the Buddy Jones farm northwest of Muleshoe was hit by lightning, and it and contents were destroyed. He lost no wheat or machinery, but it is reported that a fine boat he kept there was destroyed.

Wind was very strong that night, some in the south part of the county saying it was the hardest they had seen. The Journal has not had any report of wind damage, although it did no good to young plants.

Clements Wins Highway Honors

LUBBOCK, July 2.—William H. Clements, maintenance foreman for the state highway at Muleshoe, was one of nine veteran road builders honored here in recognition of more than 20 years meritorious service with the department.

Representing the State Highway Commission, District Engineer S. C. McCarty presented a gold lapel pin and scroll to the old timers. A special ceremony was held for the occasion during a special assemblage of district highway employees at Mackenzie park.

Commission Chairman John S. Redditt announced from Austin that more than 200 employees had previously been honored by the commission for more than 25 years service with the department.

Clements is a native of Comanche County, Texas. He began work for the department at Amarillo in 1925. After two years in District 4, he transferred to District 5 and became foreman at Dimmitt, center of operations for Castro and Farmer counties. In 1939, when there was a general shift of foremen into new territory, Clements was assigned Bailey and Lamb counties, with Muleshoe as headquarters where he is now located. two men in the House of Representatives charged with handling all appropriations for Veterans and public roads. He was able to cooperate with Veterans' organizations to secure a regional office of the Veterans Administration at Lubbock to serve West Texas. The only other such office in Texas are at Dallas, Waco, San Antonio, and Houston.
