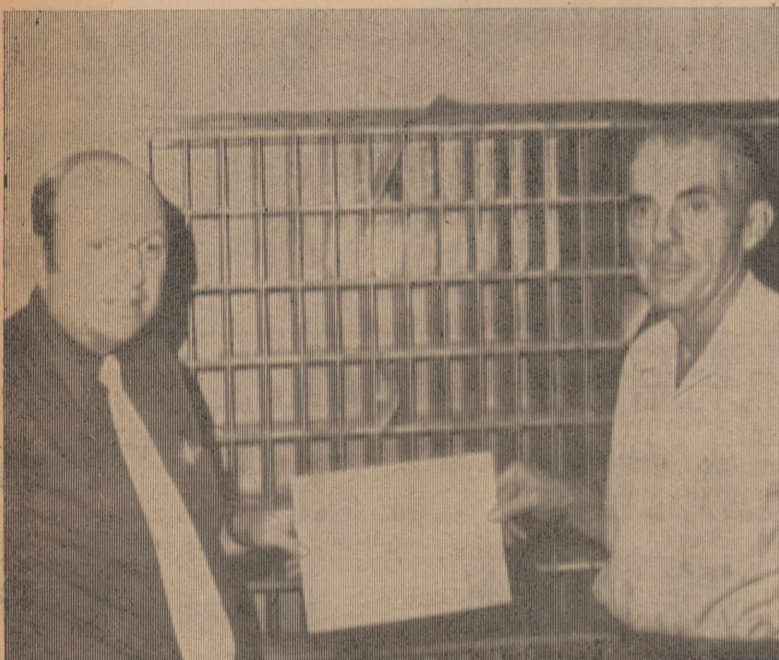

Wilson Receives Safe-Driving Award

Plainview Teacher Seeking Election To State Senate Seat

A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state circles for many years has announced her candidacy for the State Senate, 30th District, running on a "Someone you can trust" platform.

Mrs. Mary Kirchoff, wife of a cattleman-farmer and daughter of an agriculturally oriented family, is presently serving the 30th District as State Committeewoman.

Discussing her candidacy, the 47-year-old candidate commented, "I don't believe party lines make much difference during these days, if the candidate is someone whom the people can trust, who has their confidence, who is interested in our area, who understands its problems, and who will speak effectively for us in Austin."

"There are so many issues coming up which are vital to us in West Texas," she continued. "There is the water problem—there is the matter of fiscal responsibility—there is the need to put our small towns on the map the way they deserve to be."

Mrs. Kirchoff was the only woman to testify in 1966 on the 42 public forums concerning water importation in West Texas. Her work in this area led to service on the Small Towns Task Force. Material which she developed for this assignment was later published in "The Small Community in West Texas." She was the first woman elected to serve on the Executive Board of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

"Another area in which I have strong feelings is in the matter of fiscal responsibility," she continued. "We need to establish priorities to meet the needs of people within the framework of present tax revenues. In other words—we must have economy in government—fiscal responsibility."

She continued, "And speaking of responsibility, we have such a need to develop it on the local level. Our West Texas towns must have a strong voice in working out their local problems free from the shadow of government control. After all, who knows better than the people of a given town what they need and how they need it?"

Mrs. Kirchoff, who has lived in Plainview forty years, has been active in District Girl Scout work, the Parent-Teacher Association, and the Classroom Teachers Association. She is an active mem-

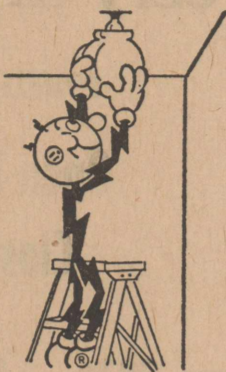

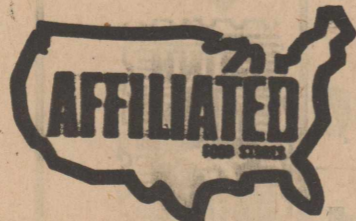
