## 1974 Farm Census To Be Taken By Mail Questionnaire

A crowing rooster on the 1974 Census of Agriculture poster proclaims, "Fill it out—Mail it back." The poster emphasized the need for farmer cooperation in completing the agricultural census, which by federal law is taken once every five years.

Farm operators in Briscoe County can look for their farm census forms in the mail just as soon as the Christmas rush is over. The forms will be mailed directly to farmers by the Bureau of the Census; however, farmers who want explanations or help in completing the census questionnaire can turn to their county ASCS office for assistance.

Farmers are being asked to answer the questionnaires and return them by mail before the end of January if possible.

ASCS is cooperating with the Census Bureau to try to make sure that all farm operators are fully informed about the 1974 Census of Agriculture. The Census Bureau has supplied each county ASCS office with detailed information on the questions farmers most often ask about the census, and employees will be glad to answer telephone queries if they can, or sit down with a farmer in the office and go over

## Tips For Farm And Home

The holiday season is upon us. This is the time of year that we usually look forward to holiday treats and candies. However, this year homemakers are faced with sugar prices which have increased over 200%. Below are some tips to cut down on the use of sugar:

(1) When serving snacks, replace sweets with nutritious snacks such as tangy cheese or raw fresh fruit. Popcorn, crisp crackers and raisins are other sugarless foods you might want to include as snacks for variety.

(2) Serve desserts containing small amounts of sugar such as

the form in detail if asked.

The local ASCS official emphasized that census replies are confidential. In the ASCS office, employees will try to give a hand to anyone wanting a little help filling out the form, but they won't ask any questions about the farm data. That information goes to the Census Bureau and only to the Census Bureau, which takes special precautions to make sure that no information about any individual farm or farm operator goes to anyone inside or outside the government.

The facts and figures gathered in the farm census are processed and published as statistical data, with special publication of county and state reports as well as national agricultural statistics.

rice pudding, coffee cakes, or baked apples with honey.

(3) Substitute honey, molasses, sorghum and other syrups for sugar in your favorite recipes. (Learn to appreciate the characteristic flavor of these sugar substitutes.)

(4) Add sugar to fruits or sauces at the end of the cooking period, thus using less sugar to get the same amount of sweetness.

(5) Use jellies, jams and preserves, gingerbread or molasses cookies for desserts instead of rich cakes and pies.

(6) Learn to appreciate the natural flavor of foods such as coffee, cereals and fruit instead of using excesses of sugar which actually reduces the sensitivity of your tastebuds.

Certain guidelines should be observed in substituting for sugar. To insure a quality product, about half of the sugar should be retained. Molasses, honey, or sorghum can then be substituted for the other half. To substitute for one cup of sugar:

(1) Use one cup of honey and reduce the liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of honey used. Also add one-fourth teaspoon soda for each cup of honey. (This is in addition to whatever baking powder the recipe calls for.)

(2) Use one and one-half cups of molasses or sorghum and reduce the liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of molasses or sorghum used.

(3) Use two cups of corn syrup and reduce the liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of corn syrup used.
