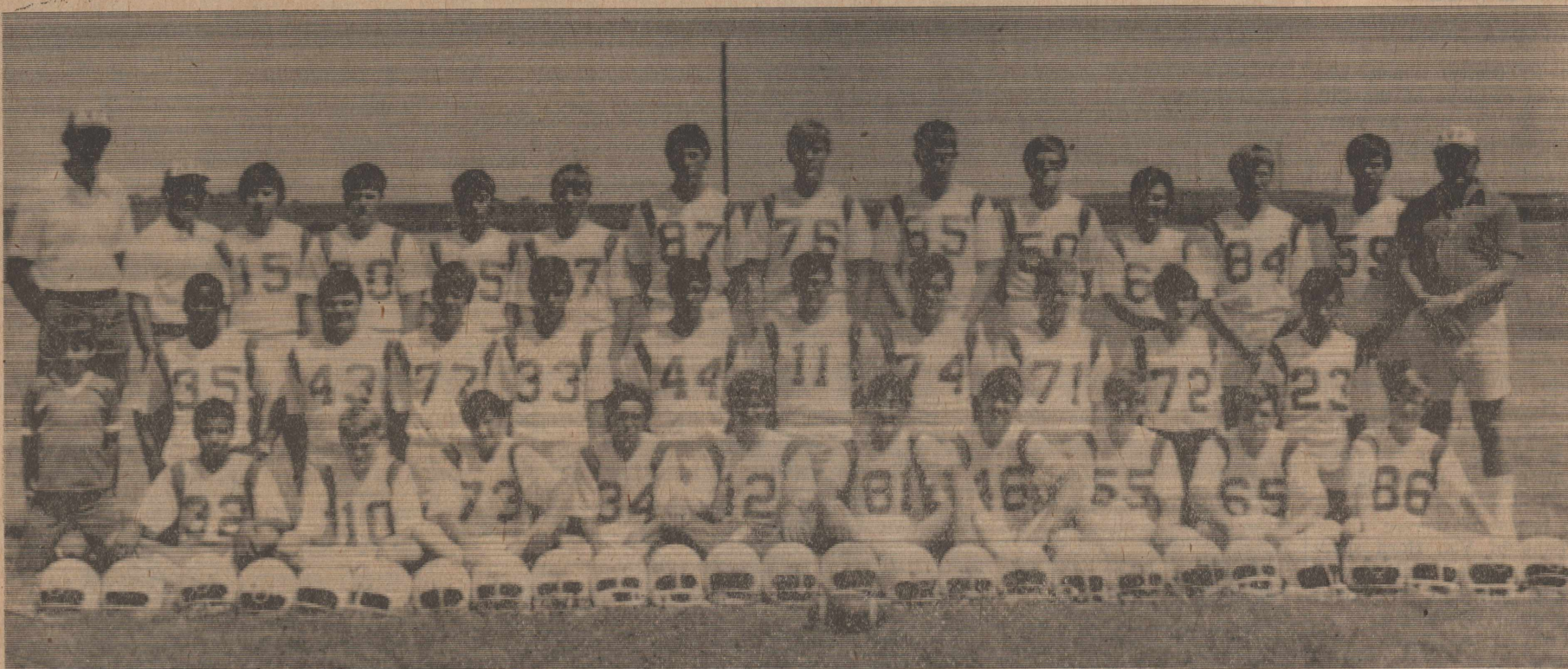

Valley Patriots Open At Chillicothe Friday Night

The Valley High Patriots kick off a new football season Friday night with traditional first game opponent the Chillicothe Eagles. The game will be played at Chillicothe. The Patriots have opened each of the four previous football seasons against Chillicothe and to date the Eagles have won three games and the Patriots captured its first win over the Eagles last year when the Valley team won 19-0 and went on to record a nifty 9-0-1 season, the only loss coming at the hands of Sudan, who was then nosed out in bi-district by Groom. At the end of the regular season the Patriots were rated sixth in the state in Class B. The Patriots have won 15 of the last 16 games.

The 1976-model Patriots will

have a bit of a new look about them since they will be under new head coach Rick Dill, who was assistant coach here at Valley last year. He will have Robert Phelps back as assistant and also Bob Dvorak, who was hired last week as boys basketball and assistant football coach.

Coach Dill and his assistants have eight returning lettermen, seven of them starters last year. Included in the returning squad members are several sophomores who saw some action last year and will be starters this year. Several of these sophomores are destined to become outstanding football players and how well they develop will determine just how tough the Patriots will be. One of the bright spots, too, for the coaches

is the return of all-district quarterback Ron Eudy, who is a senior this year. Coach Dill will also field the heaviest Valley team ever to take the field, this year's group boasting three boys who tip the scales at or above 200

pounds. Dave Patrick, Kenny Chandler and Jeff Crump are the big boys in the lineup, although there are some more who weigh in at around 180. Coach Dill reports that although the Patriots are bigger than ever, they are

not as quick as last year's team. This year's team, however, appears to have that same quality that distinguished the past four Patriot teams: they are a spirited and scrappy bunch and will give it their best effort.

Coach Dill stated that he will probably start the following on offense: Ron Eudy, QB; Barry Wheeler, B; Kenneth Helms, B; Kirk Proctor, B; Kenny Chandler, E; Dowd, E; Rex Fuston, C; Jeff Tiffin and Doyle Proctor, G; Dave Patrick and Jeff Crump, T. On defense he will start Fuston, Tiffin, Doyle Proctor, Barry Wheeler, Randy Woods, Larry Curry, Kirk Proctor, Dowd, Helms, Crump and Jesse Ferguson.

The Patriots drove over to Crosbyton last Friday for a scrimmage and the coaches were pleased with the team in that one. Coach Dill stated that the Patriots manhandled the Chiefs in spots and outscored them three touchdowns to two.

It is hoped that a good crowd will drive to Chillicothe Friday night and help the Patriots get off to a rousing start. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Friday night of next week the Patriots go to Claude to take on the Mustangs.

ACTIVITIES UNDERWAY FOR FALL TREATMENT OF BOLL WEEVIL

Officials of the Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program say they are gearing up for fall spraying operations and that intensive mapping and scouting procedures already are underway.

Administered by Plains Cotton Growers and USDA's Plant Protection and Quarantine Service, the program was set up in 1964 to thwart the westward migration of the boll weevil from its overwintering habitat in the Rolling Plains. Cotton producers in a 15-county control zone area along the Caprock voluntarily participate in the program.

Plains Cotton Growers Executive Director Ed Dean, who is helping PPQ officials coordinate the control effort, says that each year, every field in the infested areas throughout the control zone must be individually mapped as near to scale, shape and acreage as possible, then colored and numbered.

"Such maps are used extensive-

ly by surveyors who enter each field on a weekly basis to determine the presence or absence and degree of infestation of boll weevils and bollworms," Dean says. "They are also used by ground personnel directing the aerial applicators and by the aerial applicators themselves as they apply insecticides throughout the area."

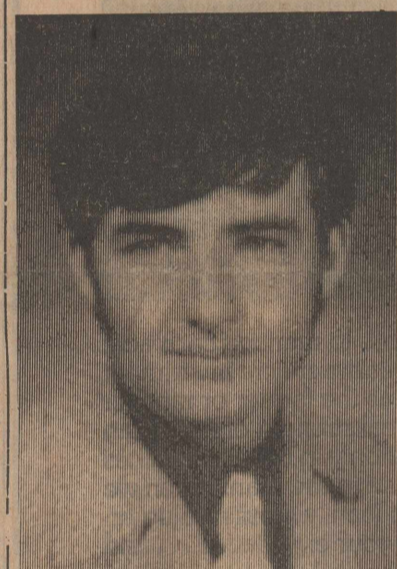
Dean says the general survey which will be carried out by as many as 30 to 40 survey teams got underway above the Caprock on August 9. These teams provide the information on a weekly basis which serves as the basis for decisions in programming fields for treatment.

Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program officials emphasize that bollworm counts will be made right along with the weevil counts as the surveyors work each field. Every consideration will be given to bollworm problems or potential bollworm problems when treatment decisions are made. Surveys to verify infestations began below the Caprock August 16.

"With the possible exception of some selected fields above the Caprock, the target date for the beginning of insecticide applications is September 6," Dean adds. "This delayed starting date should greatly reduce the threat of bollworm infestations which have been a concern to many producers when treatments were starting on August 25, and should make possible more intensive treatments for diapausing weevils late in the operation which are actually the target of the Diapause Control Program in the first place."

Dean says that if it appears that substantial acreage can be saved from infestation and treatment by treating some early infested fields above the Caprock before this date, then such treatments may be carried out. Otherwise, treatments in such fields will begin September 6, the general beginning date.

"It should be recognized that all fields cannot be treated on the beginning date; but if weather permits, all infested fields should be treated within a three to four day period thereafter," he adds.

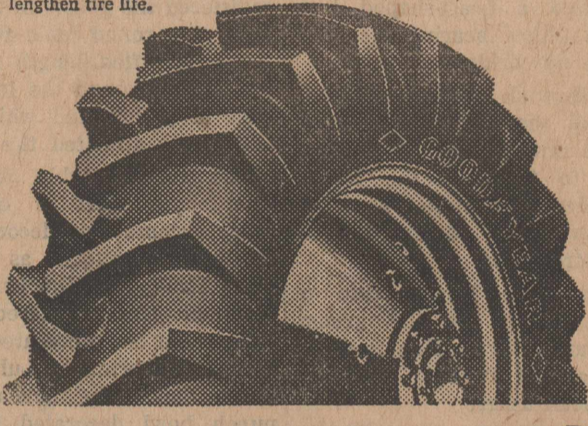
