### Soil Blowing Is Serious Problem

Soil blowing is a serious problem in this area. The amount of damage varies greatly from year to year because of irregular rainfall and variable periods of high winds.

Control of soil erosion is one of the most serious soil management problems. Whether erosion results from wind or water, valuable topsoil, organic matter and fertility are lost. This means lower profits for the farmer.

Wind erosion can be reduced significantly by rotating high residue crops with other crops that produce little residues. Strip cropping can also be practiced in this area to help combat wind erosion.

Crop residues are very effective in preventing wind erosion. Residues left on the surface from the previous years' crop is often the only measure which will prevent wind erosion on cropland.

Crops that produce little or no residues can be overseeded with rye in the fall of the year to help reduce wind erosion. If moisture conditions are favorable the cover-crop can be used to furnish grazing or can be harvested for grazing.

If wind erosion still occurs, emergency tillage can be practiced to help fight wind damage. This tillage operation is a temporary measure at best and should be the last resort taken in controlling wind erosion.

Rev. Smith and I were recently invited to assist in a revival to the Navajo Indians. Our trip carried us to the Mountains of New Mexico near Crown Point. There we met the missionaries, Bro. and Sis. Paul Everly. Our tour lasted twenty days.

We enjoyed ministering to the Indians under our big tent, and shared many blessings with the Navajo. Rev. Smith and I were able to take some time and visit the ruins of Pueblo Bonito.

Pueblo Bonito means Beautiful Village. This is where the Pueblos lived eight or nine hundred years ago. Scientists have found much valuable information from these ruins. The Pueblo Indians were great artists. In this city in the mountains, one family lived in the one room which served as kitchen, living room and bedroom. Due to dry conditions the Pueblo Indians were forced to leave this great city and move south. Sometime after that, the Navajo moved in these locations and later to the reservation.

The Navajo are a poor race of people and very humble. We are looking forward to a return trip to continue our visit with the Navajo.

Our tent was located three miles out on the reservation. Crowds were big every night. Souls were saved and healed.

The Indians begged us not to leave, but since we were leaving, would we promise to come back.

The last night of the revival, the Indians treated us to mutton stew with fried bread and Indian cornbread.

We're glad to be home.

The Patriots hosted the Anton Bulldogs last Friday night in their home opener and the Bulldogs defeated the Patriots 20-0, the second straight loss for the Valley team and the first time for the Patriots to be shut out since Sudan handed the Patriots their only defeat last year, 6-0.

picked up three yards on the first play from scrimmage, then Darrell Dowd picked up 14 yards for a first down out to the 47 yard line. Kenneth Helms then picked up another first down on a 12-yard scamper to the Valley 35. Wheeler picked up another five yards but on the next play the Patriots fumbled the ball away to Anton on the 28 yard line. Anton then moved for a first down on the Valley 40 with a pass completion, then got another first down on the Valley 29. On the next play Larry Curry intercepted the Bulldogs on the 5-yard line and returned it to the 15 and the Patriots were back in business. The Patriots then picked up almost a first down on three running plays. On fourth down and inches Valley went for the first down and failed to make it. Anton moved to a first down on the 15 and on the next play scored its first TD with 3:47 left in the first period. The try for extra point was missed and the visitors led 6-0. That was all the scoring for the first period and Anton led 6-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Anton scored its second TD from six yards out with 8:06 left in the second period. The extra point was missed and the Bulldogs led 12-0. Late in the second quarter Anton moved the ball into Valley territory, pushed the ball across from the three yard line, but were offside and the play was called back. Two plays later Anton was caught offside again. Two plays later the Bulldogs were offside again and on fourth down the Patriots broke up a pass play and took over the ball with just four seconds left in the half.

The second half was mostly defense for both teams. The Patriots had a couple of chances to score but couldn't put it across. The Patriots moved to the Anton 25 one time before stalling. On another occasion with Anton trying to kick on fourth down the Patriots tackled the kicker on the 22-yard line of the Bulldogs, giving the Patriots an excellent chance to get on the scoreboard but three pass attempts were broken up and on fourth down Anton intercepted a Valley pass and returned to the 50-yard line. Anton moved to the Valley 13-yard line, then fumbled the ball away. The Patriots picked up a first down, then were again intercepted and the Bulldogs then moved in for the final TD as time was running out. Anton then ran the extra-point attempt over for two points for the final score of 20-0.

The Sudan Hornets will have most of last year's team members back for action against the Patriots Friday night. The only one missing will be the big fullback, Williams, who scored the only TD of the game last year. However the Hornets will have Kyle Martin back, one of the better all-around football players in these parts and he will cause the Patriots plenty of trouble, both on offense and defense.

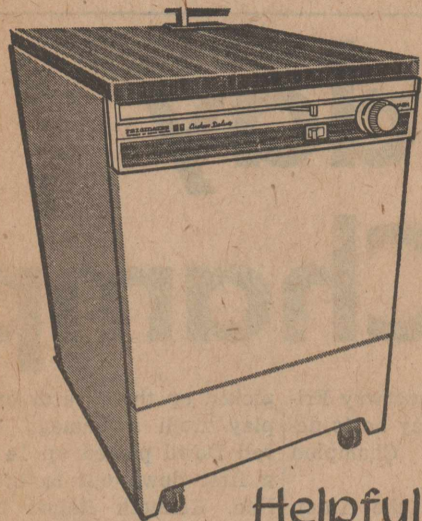

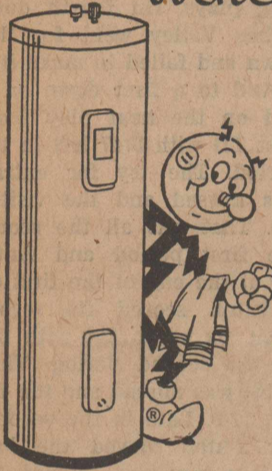

**Helpful Tips For your Dishwasher**

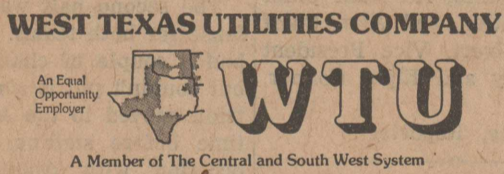

- ★ Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.

- ★ To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.
- ★ A water heater that's old, or too small for your family needs, can be wasteful, because it's working too hard and using too much energy to keep up with your hot water demands.

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**Postal Rate Hikes Affect Newspapers**

The postal rate hike which went into effect in July increased by about 25 per cent, the mailing cost of smaller daily and weekly newspapers. The new rates affected newspapers and magazines (second-class mail) as well as non-profit bulk third-class mail and special fourth-class rates for books, records and other material. Letters and other first-class mail were not affected.

This notice to subscribers will serve a threefold purpose: A request for cooperation in sending us, direct, any change in address; to remind of delinquent subscriptions, and to notify of a possible advance in subscription rates.

First, we will repeat to our of town subscribers, a request made many times previously. Please send us your change of address. Just leaving a forwarding address at the post office will not suffice for second-class mailings of newspapers or magazines. Newspapers that cannot be delivered as addressed, are discarded, and the label is returned to the newspaper, in a 25 cents-due envelope. The Tribune received three such envelopes the past week. Since this charge was first started by the Postal Service, it has advanced from 5 cents, to 10 cents, to 13 cents, and now to 25 cents. Some publishers are adding this penalty to the subscription cost.

As stated by Ben Ezzell in The Canadian Record: "Since the Postal Service has a quaint habit of letting these undeliverable publications accumulate sometimes for two or three weeks before mailing us the first change of address notice, it is easily possible for the cost to the publisher to become 50 cents or even 75 cents before correction can be made or the mailing stopped on a single subscription. . . . We are already facing the sky-rocketing costs of mailing our publications and are still trying to hold the line on current subscription rates outside our immediate area. We may have to raise that rate anyway, but rather than make a blanket increase to take care of this expensive postage-due problem, we are simply going to announce a new policy: postage-due charges (for subscribers who have moved without notifying us in time of changes of address) will simply be added to the subscription renewal price when it comes due again. You won't have to pay it if you don't want to continue the subscription, but you will have to pay it if you want to keep the newspaper coming. We'd prefer, of course, that you let us know that you're planning to move before you do it, so we can make the address correction at the proper time."
