## Valley Splits Games With Happy; Go To Silverton Friday

### Wayland To Host Delta State Saturday

The five young ladies who made Cleveland, Mississippi the capitol of women's basketball, will be in Plainview in less than a week.

When they arrive Saturday, January 22, cage fans will be blessed with the opportunity of viewing what could be one of the biggest collegiate women's basketball encounters in 1977—the battle of the "biggies."

The site—Hutcherson Physical Education Center on the Wayland College campus. The time—8 p.m. The matchup—Delta State's two-time defending national champion Lady Statesmen and Wayland's number-one ranked Flying Queens.

The game sends the Lady Statesmen, winners of 64 of their last 67 games, against the Flying Queens, a longtime women's basketball power but somehow never a national AIAW collegiate champion. The Queens have, however, captured NWIT and AAU titles. Not only does the game bring together two of the finest teams anywhere, it also carries with it a strong note of reprisal.

Still fresh in the minds of players and fans alike is that last confrontation between the two schools in March 1976, when the Lucy Harris Company came from behind to take a thrilling 61-60 victory in the semifinals of the AIAW National Tournament in University Park, Pennsylvania. A day later, the victors had successfully defended their national title while the Queens settled for third.

But that's all history now; all that remains is the memory that lingers—and the fact that the trophy sits in Cleveland, Mississippi, and not in Plainview, Texas.

The team that visits Hutcherson Center one week from Saturday will be the same one that put together back-to-back national titles and compiled a won-loss record of 61-1 in the process. Leading the Delta charge is Miss Harris, who also answers to the name of "Miss Everything."

The 6-3 Mississippi star was not only the leader for both national title holders she was also the top scorer and leading rebounder for the U. S. women's basketball team which brought home the silver medal from the Montreal Olympics last summer.

But the young lady which did more damage to the Flying Queens in that semi-final match just happened to be the smallest girl on the court—and in the entire tournament for that matter. She's 4-11 Debbie Brock, and she saved a total of four games last year with her clutch play.

It was the 85-pound Miss Brock who calmly sank a pair of free throws with just five seconds remaining in the contest to seal the Lady Statesmen's one-point victory. She compounded that with five steals, including two late in the game, and sank a total of three charity tosses in the final 24 seconds. She finished with 17 points, 12 above her season average.

While Delta State will send the same team against the Queens as it did almost 10 months ago, they will face a Wayland crew which superficially appears similar in nature to last year's third place finishers. But close followers say that the teams are as different as night and day.

Leading the Wayland charge against the Lady Statesmen is another pair of All-Americans, senior Leann Shieldknight and junior Breena Caldwell. Miss Shieldknight is averaging better than eight points per game while shooting 50 percent from the field, and

### Stop Erosion Before It Begins

Terrace maintenance done now will stop erosion damage this Spring and Summer. Level closed end terraces like those on most local farms are designed to contain the run-off from the biggest rainstorm expected in a ten-year period, until it is absorbed by the soil. These terraces cannot function properly unless they are high enough and if the endblocks are in.

Old terrace systems not feasible to restore could be replaced by parallel terraces. Usually this can be done with ACP funds or cost-share under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The SCS staff will be glad to assist with terraces with or without assistance from cost-share programs.

District warfare in 5-B got underway Tuesday night with all four members of the district seeing action.

Valley was host to Happy and Silverton at Nazareth on opening night and after the first night about the only thing coming out of the opening games might be a couple of indications as to the eventual district winners. About the only team that can apparently be counted out of the running for a chance at a district title is the Happy Cowgirls for the Valley girls won easily here Tuesday night, 81-43. The Happy Cowboys won over the Patriots, 29-28. The other game involving members of the district's teams ended with the Nazareth girls winning and the Silverton boys squeezing out a win in double overtime.

The Valley-Happy girls game was no contest as the winners led 43-16 at the half-way point, then saw the winners score 40 points in the second half. The visitors won the third quarter, 14-9, when play became a bit sloppy. In the final period, however, the Valley girls settled down and scored 30 points to the visitors' 13.

All three of the Valley starting forwards scored in double figures with Sherice Price leading the way with 33 points, Joanie Turner bombing for 28 points and Jena Mullin adding 14 points. Paula Lipscomb added six points to the total. Valley's guards did a fine job on the Cowgirls, too. Martha Reed, one of the usual starting guards for Valley, was held out of Tuesday night's contest because of a possible fracture suffered on one of her fingers in the Clarendon game last Friday night. Coach Robert Phelps said that the x-ray pictures did not show a fracture, and that the finger was only jammed. Marlene Cawley started in Martha's spot and filled in very capably.

The Valley-Happy boys game was a hotly-contested game all the way. The opening minutes saw the two teams score shot for shot and the score was tied at 2, 4, 6 and 8, then the Patriots started to pull away from the Cowboys and led 16-10 at the end of the first period. The Patriots upped their lead to 19-10 in the first minute of play of the second period. At this point, just when everything was going pretty well, the Patriots sort of "came unglued" and the Cowboys went on to score 18 unanswered points. Valley managed to score a basket just before the halftime buzzer sounded and Happy owned a 28-21 lead at that point.

The Patriots tallied 14 points in the third period but still lost two more points to the Cowboys, trailing 33-44 at the three-quarter mark. With Kenny Chandler hitting pretty good in the fourth quarter the Patriots pulled to within five points a couple of times but couldn't get any closer. This was definitely not one of the Patriots' better games. Kenny Chandler scored 23 points for the Patriots, Jesse Ferguson hit eight points, Ron Eudy, seven (far below his average), Darrell Dowd scored six and Larry Curry, five points.

Friday night of last week the Valley teams hosted Clarendon and won both of them, the Valley girls winning 38-30 with Jena Mullin sparking the winners with 15 points.

The Valley boys defeated the Bronchos 49-38 with Chandler hitting 18 points in that one.

Friday night the Valley teams drive up to Silverton for a pair of big ones. There will also be a pair of JV games, the first one starting at 3:30.

The Owlettes lost only their third game of the season Tuesday

night, that one to Nazareth by 19 points. The Owlettes defeated the Swiftettes by a single point earlier in the season at the Kress Tournament. At that same tournament, Nazareth won over the Valley girls by 20 points. However Valley battled the Swiftettes on even terms for three quarters before losing two starting guards via fouls. So that game figures to be a good one. The Owlettes will have a definite height advantage but the Patriots figure to offset that with their quickness. It should be a fine basketball game.

The boys game also figures to be a good one. The Patriots have a better overall season record (14-5) than do the Owls (11-8) but when these two schools get together, past records can usually be forgotten. A full house is expected to be on hand for the games so it might be a good idea to arrive at the Silverton gym a bit early to assure a good seat for the game.

Next Tuesday night the Valley teams will host the Nazareth teams for four games with the first one to begin at 3:30. All the games now are very important and the teams will need your support. See you there!

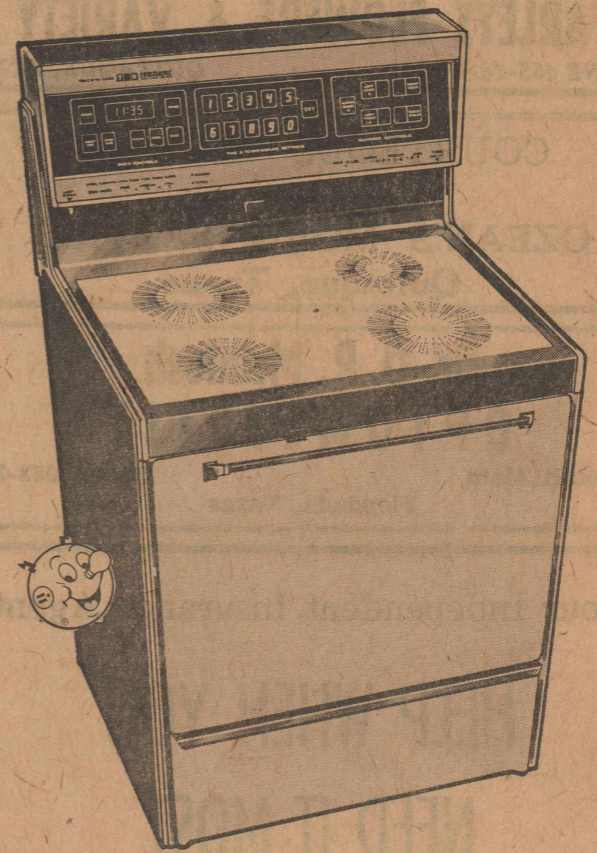
