Outstanding Patriots Named

Valley coaches have named the following players for their outstanding play at Spur last Friday night:

Back of the Week award goes to James McNary. James carried the ball eight times for 128 yards and scored two touchdowns for an average of 16 yards per carry.

Offensive Lineman of the Week award goes to Kenny Chandler. Kenny "moved 'em on out" as he cleared the way for the ballcarriers. In addition he scored a touchdown when he covered a bad snap by the Spur center that sailed into the end zone. Kenny was honored last week also, and The Tribune called him Gary Chandler. Gary is Kenny's big brother and was quite an ath-

lete in his own right when he was in high school several years ago.

Defensesman of the Week award went to Jon Davidson for his play at the end. Jon was also responsible for the Bulldogs being unable to mount a very effective offense.

The Big Patriot award once again goes to Darrell Dowd. Darrell was selected as Player of the Week last week by the Amarillo Globe-News and he was nosed out for that honor by Wheeler's all-state Grimes. As outstanding as Dowd is on offense, he is no less spectacular on defense, playing linebacker. James McNary was also mentioned in the Amarillo paper for his offensive performance at Spur.

Patriots Roll Past Bulldogs 41-12; Take On Paducah Dragons Friday

Valley High School, the state's fifth rated Class B football team according to the Harris rating system, did nothing to hurt its lofty rating as it rolled past the Spur Bulldogs 41-12, although the Patriots had to come from behind to win after spotting the Dogs an early touchdown.

The Patriots will take on the Paducah Dragons Friday night at Paducah, the fourth consecutive Class A opponent, before taking a week off and then starting district play in quest of making the state playoffs. The Patriots have never won a Zone title and the coaches, players and fans feel that this might be the Year of the Patriots.

At Spur last Friday night the Patriots took the game-opening kickoff and returned it to the 42 yard line only to lose the ball by a fumble. From the 42 the Bulldogs took the ball and marched to a TD with the Bulldogs getting the go-ahead score from the one yard line, then the try for extra point and led 6-0.

Kenneth Helms returned the kickoff to the Valley 35 yard line but the Patriots could not move the ball and had to kick. Kenny Chandler got off a good punt, moving the Dogs back to their own 21. Spur got off a poor kick and Valley set up in business at their own 46. The Patriots headed downfield but saw the first quarter end with Spur ahead 6-0. However the Patriots continued their march downfield with sophomore speedster James McNary going in for the Patriots' first touchdown from 12 yards out. Kirk Proctor booted the point after and Valley was ahead 7-6.

Proctor intercepted a Spur pass at midfield and Valley took the ball in for a second score with Darrell Dowd powering in from 18 yards out. The point after was no good and Valley led 13-6.

The Bulldogs could not move the ball on their next possession and when the Patriots took over possession they started goalward and were deep in Bulldog territory when time ran out in the first half of play.

The Patriots received the second half kickoff and moved into Patriot territory and then stalled and gave up possession. The Patriots again started a march goalward only to fumble the ball away at their own 29 yard line. The Bulldogs then put on their best offensive thrust of the night which ended in a score. After missing a two-point PAT the Bulldogs still trailed Valley 13-12.

Spur kicked off to the Patriots with Bruce Setliff taking the ball on the 30 and returning it 14 yards to the 44. From that point the Patriots went on to score their third TD, Darrell Dowd going seven yards for the score and Kirk Proctor running over for the two points and making the score 35-12.

Spur took the following kickoff and went to work on their own 32. In trying to punt, a bad pass from center allowed the ball to go into the end zone where it was covered by Kenny Chandler for a touchdown. This time the try for extra point was good and Valley led 28-12. Once again the Bulldogs could not move the ball and kicked to Valley on their 35. A couple of plays later James McNary broke another one as he went 58 yards for his second touchdown of the night and the extra point was kicked to make it 35-1.

The two teams traded possessions and late in the final period Kenneth Helms intercepted a Bulldog pass at the Valley 18 yard line. From that point Darrell Dowd ran through and over a bunch of Bulldog defenders on an 82 yard scoring run. The try for

extra point was no good this time and the score was 41-12.

Coach Ted Giddens reports that he was pretty well pleased with the play of the Patriots. The Patriots came out with no apparent injuries, and in addition, Jeff Crump, the Patriots' all-district tackle who has been out all season thus far following knee surgery, saw some action for the first time this year and lifts everyone's hopes for the remainder of the schedule.

At Paducah Friday night Coach Giddens says that the Dragons will probably be as good as the teams the Patriots have met thus far. Since the Patriots are a Class B team, and since they are so highly rated in the state rankings, the Dragons will be trying double hard to knock off Valley so they will be hard to beat and it will take a good effort for Valley to keep its string alive.

Valley pretty well dominated the stats over Spur last Friday. The closest number in the records was in first downs. Valley recorded 16 first downs to 14 for Spur. Valley ran up 397 yards in total yardage while Spur managed only 164 yards of offense. Darrell Dowd carried the ball 27 times for 215 yards. James McNary carried the ball eight times for 128 total yards. Kirk Proctor carried for a total of 29 yards. Mike Dowd carried twice for 10 yards and Kenneth Helms carried four times for seven yards. Dowd scored three touchdowns, McNary ran for two touchdowns and Chandler accounted for one TD.

The junior high and junior varsity teams played here Thursday night. The junior high team lost 8-6 with David Landry playing well for Valley.

The Valley JV team won 6-0. Randy Clay, Kevin Hendrix and Brum Pinkerton looked good for Valley.

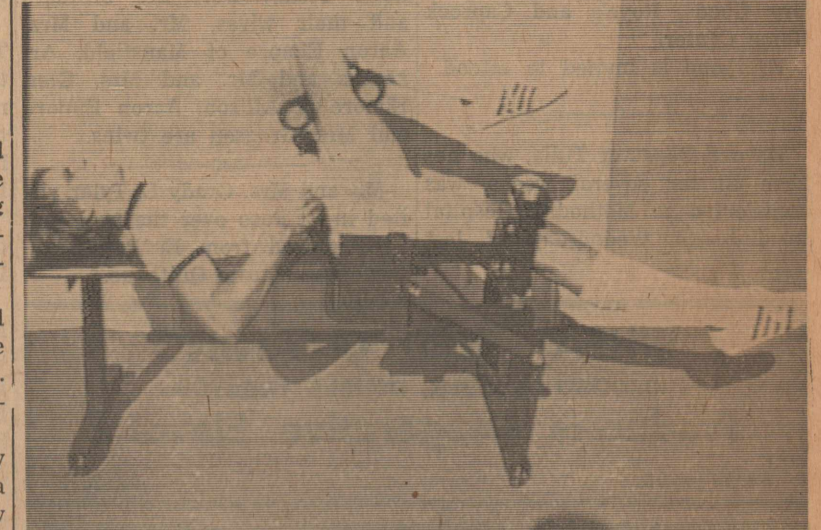

Valley School Budget Set

The Board of Trustees of the Turkey-Quitaque School adopted a school budget and tax rate for the 1978-79 school year. The tax rate will remain the same as last year at 1.14 per \$100.00 valuation; 99c will go to maintenance and 15c for bonded indebtedness. Property will be valued at 50% of market value. Total school district assessed value is \$21,953,493.00 and represents a 9% increase from the previous year.

Valley Booster Club To Promote Purchase Of Exercise Equipment

The Valley Booster Club met Tuesday, September 26, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. The meeting was called to order by the president, Jimmy Davidson. Jack Cheatham led the invocation. Mrs. Janelle Smith read the minutes of the previous meeting.

A more detailed discussion of the Exercise Equipment needed by the Valley Athletic Department was the main topic for the club Tuesday night. They voted to promote the purchase of the equipment which will be done primarily by donations.

The machines considered most needed in the school are the neck machine, the knee machine, the hip machine and the running machine. The club thinks the purchase of these machines will help prevent accidents and serious injuries to our players. The machine will also be available to adults for use.

These machines are designed to give maximum resistance through full range of motion with perfect accommodating resistance. It can work out 24 athletes with two sets of 15 repetitions in 15 minutes. It increases the size and strength of the neck in a few days. It motivates athletic work. The hip machine can isolate one leg at a time and exercise each one in many different positions.

The running machine is the only one designed around the true rotary action. These multi-joint exercises relate to the explosive moves of football.

AMY E. DAVIS BURIED AT TURKEY MONDAY

Amy Elizabeth Davis, 79, of Turkey passed away Saturday evening, September 23, in a Plainview hospital after a lengthy illness.

Services were conducted Monday, September 25, in the First United Methodist Church at Turkey with the pastor, the Rev. Elroy Wisian, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. James Wilborn, pastor of the Kress Methodist Church, and the Rev. Davis Borden Price, pastor of a Presbyterian Church in Lubbock. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery at Turkey, with arrangements under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Miss Davis was born in Umpire, Arkansas, July 21, 1899, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Davis. She had been a school teacher for most of her life, having taught at Maude, Oklahoma for a number of years before coming to teach at Turkey for about 42 years before retiring.

Miss Amy was Teacher of the Year in 1965 and she retired from teaching in 1966. She was a member of the Nuevo Study Club, and had served in several offices of the Women's Guild of the Methodist Church. She had served as treasurer of the United Methodist Women ever since the organization of that group.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Turkey.
