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DEMOCRATIC PARTY PLATFORM PASSED AT CONVENTION

The state Democratic and Republican Conventions are history. The Texas farmers and ranchers and all rural people have made quantum leaps, on the political scene in the past three weeks of conventions. Our number one priority now should be to get every living person over the age of 18 to go to the polls in November to vote. Why? Because the number of people who vote in the November election will be the measuring stick by which the rural areas will choose the number of delegates to the 1980 convention. So please go vote and take 10 friends with you.

Here is the platform that was passed by the State Democratic Convention:

AGRICULTURE

Our economy is built on a strong agricultural foundation. Agriculture is the largest industry in Texas. Family farmers and ranchers play a vital role in the economic well-being of all Texans. We want it to stay that way. The worldwide demand for greater supplies of food and fiber provides new opportunities for Texas agriculture. To address the needs of Texas farmers and ranchers, we support and will actively work for:

- (1) taxation of agricultural land on the basis of productivity, not market value;
- (2) development of new water

- (3) development of new state policies to assist farmers and ranchers to find and create new markets for their products;
- (4) development of new energy sources;
- (5) state funding for agricultural research on pest control, dryland farming, farm-produced fuels, and new methods of improving yield.

We support the efforts of Texas farmers and ranchers to promote federal legislation to:

- (1) guarantee agricultural prices at levels equal to 100% parity;
- (2) eliminate unfair competition to Texas farm products from cheap foreign imports;
- (3) establish producer representation within the Department of Agriculture;
- (4) curtail foreign ownership of agricultural land;
- (5) We support development of interstate compacts to address specific agriculture problems common to several states. We urge that the State of Texas take the lead in establishing such compacts.

Whereas, the Democratic Party has always been the party of all the people and the only party representing the interests of agricultural and rural America, and has always worked to draft and adopt a party platform to operate as a contract with our party, its leaders and our people; and

Whereas, the 1976 Democratic National platform contained the following we must assure parity returns to farmers based on costs of production plus a reasonable profit; and

Whereas the National Administration has failed to use the discretionary powers given them by Congress; and has not fulfilled its contract and obligation to rural and agricultural America by failing to pass parity legislation for the American farmer against the overwhelming direction of the party and the people;

Now therefore be it resolved that the Democratic Party of Texas expresses disappointment in the National Administration for failure to take appropriate action and in the spirit of party loyalty and unity respectfully requests all elected Democratic officials to honor and abide by the platform duly adopted.

Be it resolved that this delegation demand that all elected officials adhere to the platform or step aside for the betterment of the National Democratic Party, Texas agriculture and our nation as a whole.

Whereas, the Democratic Party is the party of all people, and our leader, John Hill, has offered a policy statement for the Democratic Party of the State of Texas, that represents the broad views and positions of rural and agricultural America.

Be it resolved that the Democratic Party of Texas thank John Hill for his stand on farm, minority, and other issues.

Be it resolved that all meat be labeled as to country of origin, and the resolution was amended to include all imported agricultural products.
