Congressman Hightower Cited For Antispending Votes During 95th Congress

Congressman Jack Hightower (Texas 13th District) has received the "Watchdog of the Treasury" Award from National Associated Businessmen, Inc.

Congressman Hightower qualified to receive NAB's gold bulldog symbolizing the "Watchdog" Award by voting 67% of the time to reduce wasteful government spending during the 95th Congress.

In special ceremonies honoring Rep. Hightower on Capitol Hill, NAB Chairman Arthur Roth said,

"The people of the State of Texas are extremely fortunate to be represented in Washington by a legislator whose concern with the inflationary impact of excessive government spending is so clearly reflected in his voting record."

NAB has been rating members of the House and Senate on their votes for fiscal responsibility since 1964, Roth said. The "Watchdog of the Treasury" Award is presented each Congressional session to those members who vote at least two-thirds of the time

A group entitled "L.I.F.E." played at the dance. Thanks to everyone who came and supported the Patriots in any way.

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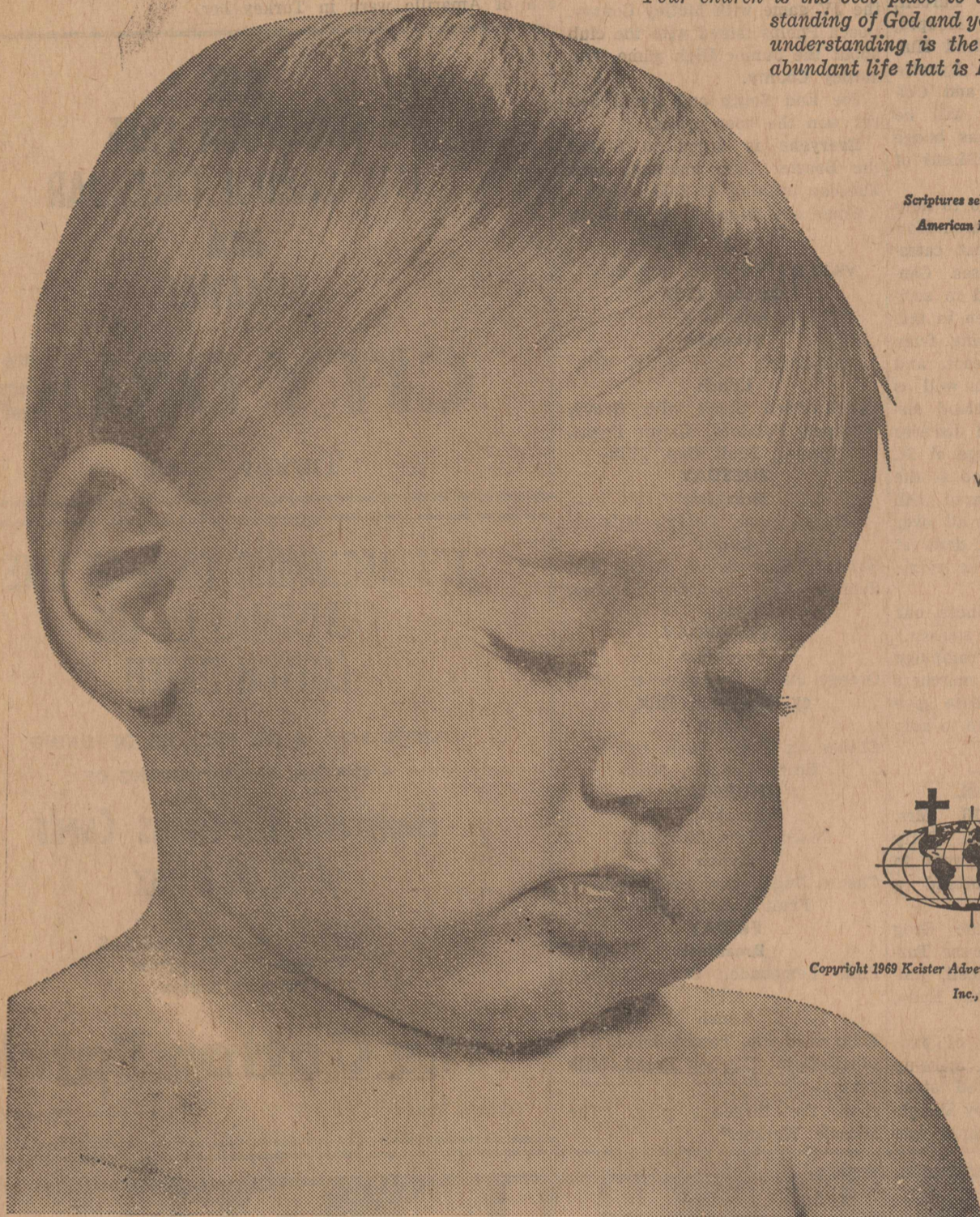
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Mark sat in the middle of the hospital ward, looking scared and lonely. All around, other babies were being hugged and cooed at by their visitors.

They came from Missouri to Gober, Texas in 1888 and he hauled rock from a quarry at Gober to Bonham to build the first courthouse in Fannin County.

Each family was able to find its own branch and trace its own line to other family branches through the old records in the heritage book.

Texan Finds Home On Iowa Beef Farm

Mike Mullin, 25, is a city-bred, tall Texan who came to Iowa two years ago to start farming.

The closest Mullin had come to a farm before that was working on his uncles' places during the summer. Then he worked out a deal with his father, B. J. Mullin, to do custom harvest work in Texas.

That's when he decided to switch from the cattle and cotton area of Texas to the cattle and corn and soybeans of Iowa. He moved to Iowa in 1976 to farm for his aunt, Audrey Martin of Van Horne.

Mike's experience encouraged his father to start farming. For 17 years, B. J. was a Ford mechanic in Turkey, the Mullins' hometown, and he recently went into farming there at age 46.

"I worked a few summers here in Iowa for my uncle, Ray Martin," Mike recalled. "I always wanted to come up, but unfortunately Ray had died when I started farming on my own."

Mullin said farming in Iowa is "everything I thought it would be and more. I like all of it. I have wonderful neighbors. I exchange work with one neighbor. When one of us goes on vacation, the other does the chores."

Mullin is now going on the fair circuit. He exhibited one heifer at the All-Iowa Fair and another at the National Western in Denver.

One heifer was named the futurity grand champion last year at the Iowa Expo in the Angus breed.

He artificially breeds all his Angus cattle to top bloodlines. He owns 30 head of sows and 55 head of registered Angus cattle on his 330-acre farm a mile south of Van Horne.

Mullin and his wife, Patricia, are parents of two children: Amy, 6, and Lisa, 3. He's a Farm Bureau member.

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
