## Patriots Win Over Happy, 23-8; Claude Comes Here Friday Night

The Valley High Patriots won 23-8 over the Happy Cowboys here last Friday night in a hard-fought battle and in the process the Patriots won themselves a Zone 2-B North championship, their first ever in the short history of Valley High, and the right to continue in the playoffs for a state championship. However, there is one game left on the regular schedule, that one the Valley-Claude game here Friday night, and the Patriots will not be satisfied unless they win over the Mustangs and Amherst will meet Wednesday night to determine time and place for the game next week.

Just as predicted, Happy and former Valley Coach Bill Hulsey came to play and although the Cowboys do not have a very impressive record for the year, they played the Patriots tough, in fact about as tough as anyone has played them on defense.

Valley took the game-opening kickoff and returned it to the Happy 48. The Patriots could not move and kicked short to the Cowboy 30. The Patriots, very tough on defense, did not give the Cowboys anything; in fact, held the Cowboys to a minus two yards in three tries and the Cowboys had to kick to the Patriots on a about the 35. From there with Kenneth Helms and Mike Dowd carrying, the Patriots moved to the Valley 47 yard line where James McNary blasted 53 yards for a TD romp and Proctor kicked the point after. Then, after almost five minutes of play, Valley led 7-0.

Happy brought the kickoff out to their own 30 yard line. The Cowboys ran one play and then fumbled away on the second down at the Valley 36. Helms carried the ball twice to the 17. On the first play at that point the Patriots fumbled the ball back to the Cowboys on the 12 yard line. The Cowboys ran one play good for about nine yards, then on the next play Helms intercepted a Cowboy pass on the 19. Two plays later, Valley received one of five holding penalties and on fourth down Valley failed by two yards to pick up a first down, and Happy took over on their own 17 yard line. On third down Joe Kirk Smith sacked the Cowboy quarterback for a 10 yard loss. On fourth down Greg Ramsey blocked the attempted Cowboy kick and the ball sailed out of the end-zone, giving the Patriots a safety and a 9-0 lead.

The second period was a frustrating one for the Patriots, for they were charged three times with costly holding penalties that cost the Patriots possible scoring drives.

Also midway of the second quarter, after forcing the Cowboys to punt, the Patriots fumbled the ball away inside the 10 yard line. The Patriots proved how stingy they are on defense as they stopped the Cowboys at about the two yard line. At this point, Darrell Dowd, who had not played a down on offense, was called upon to run the ball from inside the end zone. The Cowboys, sensing what would happen, stopped Dowd in the end zone for a safety and the Cowboys were on the scoreboard with two points and Valley led at halftime 9-2.

The third quarter was scoreless

for Valley despite the fact that Darrell Dowd returned to action on offense. Darrell was injured in the Silverton game in the second quarter and missed the Motley County contest and played only one down on offense in this game. The Patriots moved the ball pretty well on offense but again penalties hurt and stopped a couple of drives. Valley was shocked a bit in the third period when the 'Cowboys' fine athlete, Vincent Venhaus, took a short pass in the left flat and ran all the way for a touchdown on a play that covered 83 yards. The try for extra point missed and Valley led 9-8. Since the first game of the season when Valley and Crosbyton played to a tie, this was the only time the Patriots had been pressed this much. Evidently this push put a bit of life into the Patriots' offense for early in the final period the Patriots put on a drive that saw Darrell Dowd run four yards for a TD that put Valley out front 15-8 and Proctor kicked the point after to make it 16-8.

Valley controlled the tempo of the game thereafter and just minutes later Helms ran 12 yards for another score and Proctor kicked the point after to complete the scoring at 23-8.

The statistics show how much Valley dominated the game. Valley made 21 first downs to five for the Cowboys. The Patriots rushed for 401 yards to 18 for Happy whose rushing game was very ineffective against the defense thrown up by the Patriots. Valley had only 33 yards passing, as they completed two out of two passes thrown. Happy's passing yardage of 151 yards appeared to have been a pretty good night but most of those yards were gained on two plays, one an 83 yard scoring play by Venhaus and another long gainer by Venhaus which accounted for no points.

James McNary ran for 173 yards on 21 carries for an average of 8.2 yards per carry. Darrell Dowd carried 24 times, all but one carry in the second half, for 111 yards and an average of 8.2 per carry. Helms picked up 69 yards on 15 carries for a 4.6 average per carry. Michael Dowd carried four times and picked up 31 yards and a 7.5 average. McNary, Darrell Dowd and Helms each scored six points, Proctor scored three points after TD and Joe Kirk Smith scored a safety and two points.

The coaches selected the following for honors:

**OFFENSIVE LINEMAN of the Week:** Kenny Chandler who "moves 'em on out" giving the ball carriers a chance to get that step on the defense and really go.

**DEFENSIVE PLAYERS of the Week:** Dennis Farley and Darrell Dowd. These two were all over the field in stopping the Cowboys cold. The Patriots were very effective and Farley and Dowd had a big hand in that defense.

**OFFENSIVE BACK of the Week:** Kirk Proctor at quarterback directed the offense well, executed well and threw two passes, both complete. A good game for Kirk.

**BIG PATRIOT of the Week:** Greg Ramsey had one of his better games all around, doing what he was supposed to do, being where he was supposed to be. In addition, Greg blocked a Cowboy punt.

Friday night's game is the last home game of the regular season and the last chance to see the Patriots in action at home. It is hoped that a large crowd will be on hand for this game to show them the fans are truly backing them in this "Year of the Patriots." See you there.

## Valley Meets Amherst In Plainview Thurs.

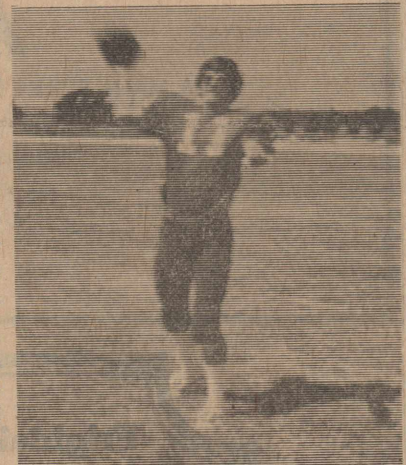

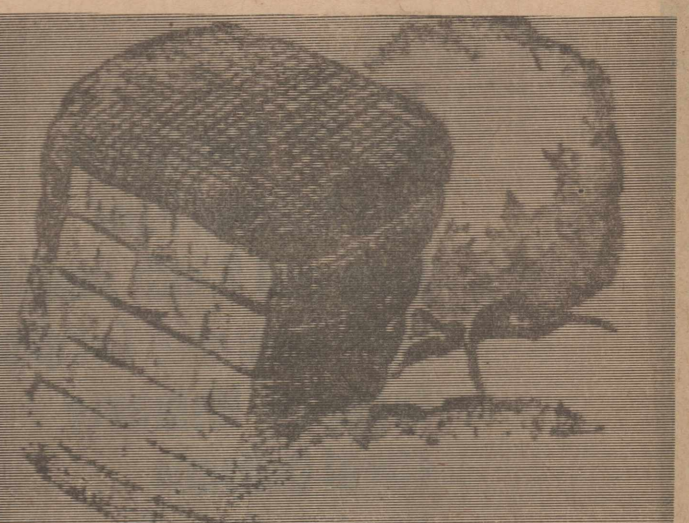
