Agriculture in the developed countries has advanced more in the last half century than in all previous time. This advancement has largely taken place due to mechanization.

During the past half century the output of the worker has increased five times whereas the output of animal and acre unit have increased only two-times. The machanization of agriculture has many benefits and is best reflected by the fact that it took 85% to 90% of the workers in our country in colonial days to produce the food and fibre needed for this country alone.

In the past half century it took only about 10 to 15% of the population to feed and clothe our nation. The result on the general population of this country is that mechanization and the efficiency of the farm has brought about a decrease in the price of food and clothing in comparision to the hours worked.


