Specifically charging that David Rockefeller and the Rockefeller family controls many of the nathree of the top four, industries and energy companies through interlocking directorships and stock ownership, Lewis quoted a House subcommittee report that said that the Rockefellers are now at a point where they can exert control on the nation's and world's economy.

The Rockefeller - controlled Chase Manhattan Bank, second largest in the nation behind Bank of America, does business in 120 countries and has 50,000 affiliated with \$1 trillion alone, he char-

Lewis also asserted that 70 percent of the top 130 industries in nation have interlocking boards of directors. "That means that competing industries have the same directors and that leads to price fixing." Lewis also feels that unions are "selling their workers down the drain" for cheap foreign labor.

Lewis said many of the nation's corporate leaders are moving the nation toward a totalitarian government by gaining control of education, news media and some type of national police force.

Listing the progress of this control, Lewis said three major foundations have, in a large part, gained control of higher education through major college grants and authoring textbooks in agriculture and economics.

Concerning the control of the news media Lewis said, I'm not talking about the local newspapers, radio and television stations. By and large they are doing an outstanding job. Not so on the national level."

Lewis pointed out that national television networks in many cases have ignored the American Agriculture Movement including in-



We all have moments when we seem to be groping and nothing comes clear. We wonder where we are going and, perhaps, why. We have such moments whether or not we go to church on Sundays-for the Church will not give us spectacles, rose-colored or otherwise, with which to view the world. But . . . the Church does teach us of God's world, it does teach us the meaning of Faith, it does show us life in its proper light.
