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
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

WEIGHT CONTROL SERIES Been looking at spring fashions and wondering if your winter figure will fit the styles? Get your body in shape by enrolling in a free "Nutrition Today-Weight Control Tomorrow" letter series offered by the County Extension Office.

Thirty million Americans are overweight and 15 million are obese to a degree that actually shortens their lives. There is significant correlation between obesity and ill health including cardiovascular disease, hypertension, diabetes and arthritis,

Many people turn to fad diets or pills to take off unwanted pounds. These efforts may lead to poor nutrition, bad health and wasted money.

It takes a steady balanced diet and regular exercise to take weight off and keep it off.

The purpose of this series is to help people analyze their eating behavior; learn how to determine overweight, normal and underweight; how to plan nutritional adequate meals with low calories; and learn why people overeat and how to change eating behavior to lose weight and maintain normal weight.

As with all weight control efforts you should have a physical examination before attempting any diet or exercise program.

The "Nutrition Today-Weight Control Tomorrow" series will be mailed every two weeks to the first 50 to enroll. Call the Extension Office, 823-2343, or come by and put your name on the list. 
Perhaps we are socking too hard. Perhaps tranquility is not to be sought. Rather, isn't it what happens when you are at peace with yourself, no matter the circum-

Collect Soil Samples Now

Winter and early spring are good times for collecting soil samples, says Buddy C. Logsdon, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

At present, Extension Service laboratories are processing samples as soon as they arrive, and reports are mailed within one

Prompt service is an important requirement for an effective soil but this is not necessary. testing service, says Logsdon.

Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advantage of allowing time to obtain needed fertilizers. Early sampling is also advised to avoid wet soil later in the season. If soils are muddy and sticky, it is difficult to obtain a good sample. And, excess moisture adds to shipping costs. To reduce shipping weight, samples can be air-dried for a day or two. Heating should be avoided, however, since it fixes potassium in some soils so it cannot be removed by laboratory procedures

One of the keys to a good soil test is collecting a representative soil sample of a field. From 10 to 15 samples should be collected from an area as large as 40 acres. These should then be mixed together for a composite sample. Also, the area tested should be divided according to soil type as well as past and future cropping practices.

Take time to collect representative soil samples and carefully complete the information sheet that must accompany each sample, advises Logsdon.

Collection and mailing instructions, mailing cartons and information sheets are available at the County Extension Office.

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

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Farmers Union Delegates Adopt National Policy

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Blakney of Turkey, Mrs. Ike Reed, Mrs. Jay Gowin and E. G. Reed of Quitaque were among 1,500 delegates and visitors at the 77th annual National Farmers Union Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, where the organization's policy for 1979 was adopted.

Farmers income dominated the policy discussions, as delegates wrestled with methods of improving economic health of rur-

The organization went on record as strongly endorsing the concept of initiating wheat price agreements between the four major exporting nations, as an alternative to the unsuccessful Geneva Wheat Talks.

The policy adopted in this section read in part, "Farmers Union urgently requests the Congress and the Administration to appoint a Commission to reach an agreement with Canada, Australia and Argentina on the World Market share of wheat for each country and on a minimum price. This price must be high enough to return to farmers a reasonable profit above the cost of production."

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland told the convention audience Monday night that government farm programs actually benefit large producers more than family farmers, and said he failed to support government guaranteed parity prices for this

The convention delegates responded by adopting a policy reading that farm program benefits must be graduated to benefit family farmers.

Other speakers at the convention addressed cooperative and marketing challenges facing agri-

Rep. Neal Smith (D-Iowa) told the agriculture audience that the livestock and grain marketing companies have been using inside and misleading information to gain an advantage over farmers in the marketplace.

After a Tuesday afternoon program dedicated to cooperative marketing, the delegates adopted a program to fight anti-co-op legislation now being considered in Washington. Such legislation would alter current anti-trust laws, and weaken the cooperatime marketing strength of far mers and ranchers.
