

A continuous supply of nitrogen through the growing season is the key to maintaining a healthy, dark green lawn.

This calls for applying fertilizer in the early spring at six- to eight-week intervals. If "slow release" nitrogen materials are in the fertilizer, use higher application rates to extend the interval between uses.

Each application of fertilizer should supply one to two pounds of nitrogen for every 1,000 square feet. The amount of fertilizer needed depends on the analysis shown on the bag. For example, 21-0-0 is ammonium sulfate which contains 21 percent nitrogen (N) and no potassium (K) or phosphorus (P). To get the needed two pounds of nitrogen, apply 10 pounds of am-

monium sulfate. (10 x .21 = 2.1) Use fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in the spring or spring and fall. The P and K levels in soil build up after such fertilizers are used for several years. Therefore, only annual maintenance amounts are

Lack of nitrogen reduces leaf chlorophyll, resulting in light green or yellow grass. However, other causes of this condition include disease or insect damage, iron chlorosis or acidity.

Iron chlorosis is common on St. Augustine grass growing on alkaline soils.

Adults and children over the age of six months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of six months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water, such as bottled water, for their infants under six months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. Caution: DO NOT BOIL YOUR WATER. Boiling the water will increase the concentration of Ni-

The City of Turkey has applied to the Texas Department of Health for an exemption from the Nitrate requirement while we search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques which would lower the Nitrate to an acceptable level.
