"GOOD OLD DAYS"—AND AFTERWARD

In connection with the 60th anniversary of The Progressive Farmer, Managing Editor Alexander Nunn takes this look in retrospect of farming in our century. We reprint from their editorial page.

"What changes agriculture has seen since the early 1900's! Even those of us who came along early in the century find it hard to realize that we were born into a farm world without cars, airplanes,

screen doors, radios, electric lights, good roads, tractors, or even canned goods as we know it now. It was a world of "grain" sold by its grain and full of sand. How we watched the difference in color of the cotton from the first nitrate of soda ever tried on the farm (in 1910, I think it was).

"Our children today find it impossible to realize that we went to the county seat once a year in the fall in a wagon or surrey; now that once a year all day trip is made in an hour or so and sometimes twice a week. Four-H Clubs, P. F. A. and Future Homemakers are all new, the earliest of the three, 4-H, was hardly known until after 1907-1911. Present day agencies serving farm families came along after 1900.

"A fortunate few paid cash; most farm families did without or paid high 'time-prices' for credit; credit to meet farm needs is hardly more than 30 years old. A pasture was a piece of land with a rail fence around it, maybe extended in spots with a little barbed wire.

"Carrying ticks off the milk cows and animals with tails high in the air leaping wildly into the dipping vat are still vivid memories of boyhood. The bull would be still a past talked about when occasional news came from Texas; San Jose seals was just beginning to be serious. Fresh vegetables in the stores were unknown; in winter, few grocers had any fruit except perhaps a few apples. RFD routes were slowly spreading but boys and girls got to school the best way they could and when they could. Cotton was about the only source of cash.

There were few market outlets for other crops except cattle and hogs. "Many still talk about those good old days" but few would go back to them if they could. Farming was a simple vocation then; it is a highly complex business now. Even so, it seems to us, farm folks have gained both relatively and absolutely. A decent living is easier for common folks now than it was then, and even with all its complexities, farm life today offers more security, more opportunities, and more satisfactions than it did 45 years ago.

"We've learned how to build back our mind-out soils, and we're about to learn that we've got to work together. Science offers us better plants and animals, better equipment, better markets. The effects of science when used for direct action are slowly bringing us all to realize that man does not live by bread alone; that social progress must catch up with and keep step with material progress."

RAISIN PINWHEELS

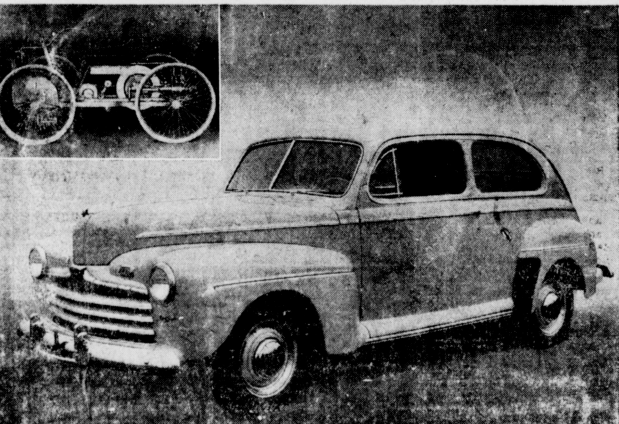
1 C. flour
1/2 C. sugar
1/2 C. milk
1/2 C. shortening
1/2 C. salt
1/2 C. yeast
1/2 C. corn syrup
1/2 C. raisins
1/2 C. cloves
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening. Add enough of the milk to make a soft dough. Divide dough into 7 or 8 pieces; shape each piece into a strip. Roll strips into pinwheels and place them in a greased pan. Mix together raisins, corn syrup and cloves. Sprinkle mixture on biscuits, pressing raisins etc. dough. Bake biscuits in hot oven (425° F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 7 or 8 large biscuits.

Ford Honored in Auto Golden Jubilee



Contrasts between 1896-1916 are shown in this photograph of the first and most recent Ford cars. Dearborn, Mich.—Henry Ford, working in his machine shop at 58 Bagley avenue, Detroit, in 1893, dreamed of liberating the world from a slow, horse-drawn kind of civilization. Three years later, on June 4, 1896, he rolled his first gasoline driven buggy into the street, and the celebration at Detroit this year of the automotive industry's Golden Jubilee is a tribute to his vision. Today, more than 31,000,000 Ford cars and trucks have been built and Ford Motor Company plants span the earth. The present Ford Motor Company was formed in 1903, and success was immediate. At the end of four months a dividend was paid to the original 12 stockholders. In 1905, the company moved from the two-story Mack avenue plant to a new four-story building at Piquette and Beaubien, Detroit. Production soared as models A, B, C, F, K, S and R were introduced in quick succession, and five months later the first of the famous model T's was introduced. In December 1909, the company moved again, this time to its new 61-acre Highland Park plant. Here the first endless chain conveyor was installed. It was the birth of low-cost production and the beginning of the liberation of labor. In 1914 Henry Ford startled the world by announcing Ford employes would work only eight hours a day and receive a minimum daily wage of \$5. Again the Ford Motor Company needed breathing space, so in 1915 a thousand acres of land were acquired on the Rouge river in Dearborn. Henry Ford had purchased the stock held by Alex Malcolmson in 1906 and had become president and controlling owner, and in 1919 the Ford family acquired the interest of the minority stockholders for \$75,000,000 and became sole owners. Eagle boats were built in the Rouge plant during World War I, and after the war many activities were transferred to the new plant from Highland Park. On Oct. 21, 1925, an all-time production record was set with 10,000 Model T cars built in a single day. In December 1927, the new model A was introduced and the next year Henry Ford announced a minimum \$7-a-day wage. In 1932 the Ford Motor Company paid \$3,000,000 to Henry M. Leland and his son, Willard, for the assets of the Lincoln Motor Car Co. It was not until 16 years later that the Mercury was introduced. The miracle of Ford production continued to pour automobiles from assembly lines across the nation, and the need for more space still plagues the company. Today more than \$225,000,000 has been earned for expansion. On May 26, 1943, Edsel Ford, president of the company, died suddenly, and Henry Ford, then past 80, again took over the presidency. Soon after this, Henry Ford II, Edsel's eldest son, was released from the U. S. Navy to assume the duties that had been his father's for so many years. Recently, his brother Benson, after three years in the armed forces, has returned to take up duties in the company and help his brother carry on the great Ford tradition in the automobile industry.

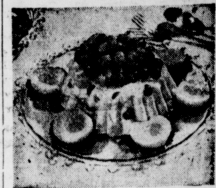

Crown Fruit Salad

1 lb. unflavored gelatin
2 tbsp. cold water
1/2 lb. fruit juice, sliced (peach, cherry, apple, etc.)
1/2 lb. marshmallows
1/2 lb. cherries
1/2 lb. light cream
1/2 lb. mayonnaise
2 canned peaches or pears, sliced
1 orange, sliced
1/2 lb. marshmallows
Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. This molded fruit salad is lovely to serve at a buffet supper.

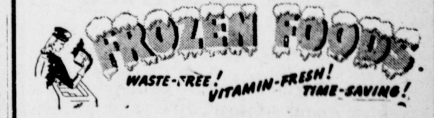

Traveling Libraries Enrich Rural Community Life

HOW traveling libraries are bringing education and recreation to farm folks living in rural areas surrounding small towns is described in an article in nationally circulated Capper's Farmer. Typical of the development of these mobile libraries is the experience of Nebraska. Five years ago an active county library didn't exist in the state. Now there are three—in Adams, Grant and Phelps counties. And in other states rural library service is also expanding.

Five years ago an active county library didn't exist in the state, according to Mrs. Alfred L. Anderson. Now there are three—in Adams, Grant and Phelps counties. And in other states rural library service is expanding.

In 1940, Phelps county got a bookmobile. The city library board and the librarian in Holdrege, the county seat, were co-operative, the Capper's Farmer article points out. Subsequently the joint Holdrege Carnegie Phelps County Library was formed with headquarters in the city library building.

The bookmobile is a complete library built on a truck chassis. It serves more than half the county's population. It holds about 1,000 books and makes three or four trips every two weeks at 39 stations. Teachers find better teaching methods are possible with the library. Farm youths have more chance to wisely chosen books for the joy of it. Many adults use the library too.

Examples of how the rural traveling libraries operate in other states are cited by the magazine.

This is being airmailed from Washington Saturday afternoon, May 18th. An 8c stamp is required for this purpose today, but the odds are very heavy in favor of a 5c airmail rate within a few weeks. The House passed unanimously this week a bill establishing a 5c airmail rate—a program which some of us have favored since V-J Day. The 8c spread between the

regular mail rate and the airmail rate has retarded airmail. There is little doubt but that the Government will make more revenue out of the 5c rate than the higher rate, on account of the increased volume.

The more mail that goes by air the more our aviation industry is supported and the greater backlog of experienced pilots in this country.

At present we have a large number of armen who have been discharged from the service and who would like each month to have a way to get in a little flying time in order not to lose their ability to pilot an airplane.

The Army has a lot of surplus planes and there are many available filds. General Carl Spaatz, who took Gen. Hap Arnold's place as head of the U. S. Army Air Forces, will be before our Military Appropriations Committee Monday to ask us to put through an appropriation of one billion two hundred million dollars for the Air Forces for the coming fiscal year. I am going to ask him to expedite the Army program for reserve pilots so that these discharged veterans under a well-supervised plan may have an opportunity to continue to fly. I would like to see a National Guard Unit in aviation established in West Texas.

The National Guard will have a bigger and better program in the future than it has ever had in the past. The Guard was a great factor in the victory which we won in the war and it will represent a large reserve force for national defense in the future.

The Reserve Officer Training Corps in the schools is thus for expansion. Texas Tech stated for a bigger ROTC program than ever be-

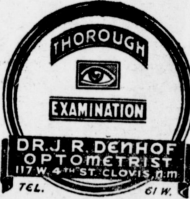

fore, which will include, if desired, when appropriate plans are completed under a ROTC unit in aviation.

The Military Appropriations Bill is scheduled to pass the House in June. Indications are now that the bill, for the first time in years, will include no money for the purchase of horses and mules. The General Staff of the Army has decided to abandon the Horse Cavalry.

The Army is asking for forage for the 2000 horses and 1347 mules it still has on hand in Continental U. S. The prize horses of the Army now are the horses that were cap-

tured in Germany and brought to the United States last October. These 152 animals are valued at more than one million dollars, and the Army is besieged with offers of purchase.

We approved in the House of Representatives this week a \$75,000 fund to be used in the investigation of un-American activities by one of the Committees of the House. This is the committee of the House, supported by many patriotic organizations, which investigates and gives publicity to the un-American activities of individuals and groups

within our country. The measure was bitterly contested, but the final vote was 240 for the 81 against.

Desperate Jap's Saipan Message Is Uncovered

Omer Kelton, who has recently returned from service has furnished The Journal with a copy of the late Lt. General Saito's last message to Japanese officers and men defending Saipan. It is a translation by the G-2 Section 4th Marine division, the intelligence officer of the Japanese 43rd division, captured July 9, 1944, stated that this message was delivered by Saito at approximately 0600 the morning of Ju-

ly 8, just prior to the general's death at 10:00 that day.
Message to the officers and men defending Saipan:
I am addressing the officers and men of the Imperial Army on Saipan.
For more than twenty days since the American devils attacked the officers, men, and civilian employees of the imperial forces, I expected that every man would do his duty.
Heaven has not given us an opportunity; we have not been able to utilize fully the terrain. We have fought in unison up to the present time, but now we have no material with which to fight and our artillery for attack has been completely destroyed. Our comrades have fall-

ed one after another despite the bitterness of defeat, we pledge seven lives to repay our country.

The barbarous attack of the enemy is being continued. Even though the enemy has occupied only a corner of Saipan, we are dying without avail under the violent shelling and bombing whether we attack or whether we stay where we are, there is only death. However, in death there is life. We must utilize this opportunity to exact true Japanese manhood. I will advance with those who remain to deliver still another blow to the American devils, and leave my bones on Saipan as a bulwark of the Pacific.

As it says in the Sinjinkura (Battle Ethics), I will offer up the courage of my soul and calmly rejoice in living by the eternal principle.

Here I pray with you for the eternal life of the Emperor and the welfare of the country and I advance to seek out the enemy.

"Follow me!"
"Seven lives to repay our country" was the password designated by the battalion order June 26 setting the attack that resulted in a breakthrough from Nafetcon point.
