Valley School Enrollment Is Slated August 23

Valley Principal Jerry Maupin announces that school enrollment begins Thursday, August 23.

The Elementary School will enroll from 9:00 until 11:00; Junior High from 9:00 until 10:30; High School grade 12 from 9:00 until 9:30; grade 11 from 9:30

until 10:00; grade 10 from 10:00 until 10:30; and grade nine from 10:30 until 11:00.

All students entering kindergarten are required to bring a birth certificate or a baptismal record and a vaccination record.

First day of classes will be Monday, August 27, at 8:30 a.m.

Conditioning Drills In Progress For Valley's Prospective Gridders

Coach Ted Giddens reports that some 34 prospective gridders reported Monday morning to start conditioning drills in preparation for the upcoming football season.

Valley High's first game of the 1979 season will be Friday, September 7, when the Patriots go to Crosbyton to play the Chiefs starting at 8:00 p.m.

This year's edition of the Valley High Patriots are faced with a rebuilding year following last year's team which went through the regular season without defeat, winning Zone and District championships. The Patriots played Crosbyton to a 6-6 tie to

start last year's schedule, then went undefeated until they met Wheeler in the Bi-District game.

The Patriots lost eight members off the team which won District, and they all were starters on either offense or defense or both. Despite losing these starters, Coach Giddens has some fine prospects returning for this year's team, including some experience, both in the line and in the backfield. Included in the returning players are two of the speedier of the backs in the district who have already proved they will go all the way every time they touch the ball. They are James McNary and Mike Dowd.

The Patriots first four opponents are Class A teams, and Coach Giddens states that by the time District play gets underway, he believes the Patriots will be competitive in the district.

Valley School Board Accepts Bids For Supplies

Supt. Wilburn Leeper announced decisions made by the Valley School Board in its regular meeting Monday night.

A bid was accepted from Peery & Dugan for gasoline at 74.5 cents. Another bid was accepted from Lipscomb Grocery for lunchroom food at 5.75 percent above cost for any amount less than \$1,000.00 per month, and if purchases are more than \$1,000.00, the purchases will be 4.75 percent above cost.

The school employed Mrs. George (Karen) Price as special education teacher. Gloria Moreno was employed to work in the migrant program.

The Board discussed the requirements of setting up appraisal districts. No determination was made by the Board as to which way this would go. The 1978-79 school budget was amended. The 1978-79 budget called for \$653,697.00 and the new budget is set for \$619,937.75. The Board prepared the budget and set the hearing to be held August 30, at 8:30 p.m.

Target Price Set For '79 Cotton Crop

The target price for 1979 crop upland cotton will be 57.7 cents per pound, the same as the preliminary target price announced last December 26.

Since the target price is used as a base to determine disaster payments, the 1979 disaster payment rate will be one-third of the target, or 19.2 cents per pound. Disaster payments are made if the producer is prevented from planting upland cotton or other nonconserving crops or if yields are substantially reduced. ASCS county offices may now begin making 1979 disaster payments to eligible upland cotton producers.

The target price is also the basis for a later determination of any deficiency payments to upland producers. If the national average price received by farmers during calendar year 1979 is less than 57.7 cents per pound, cotton producers will receive a deficiency payment at a rate equal to the difference between the higher of such average prices or the loan level of 50.23 cents.

To receive disaster or deficiency payments on upland cotton, farmers must comply with the set-aside requirements for any wheat and feed grains on the farm.

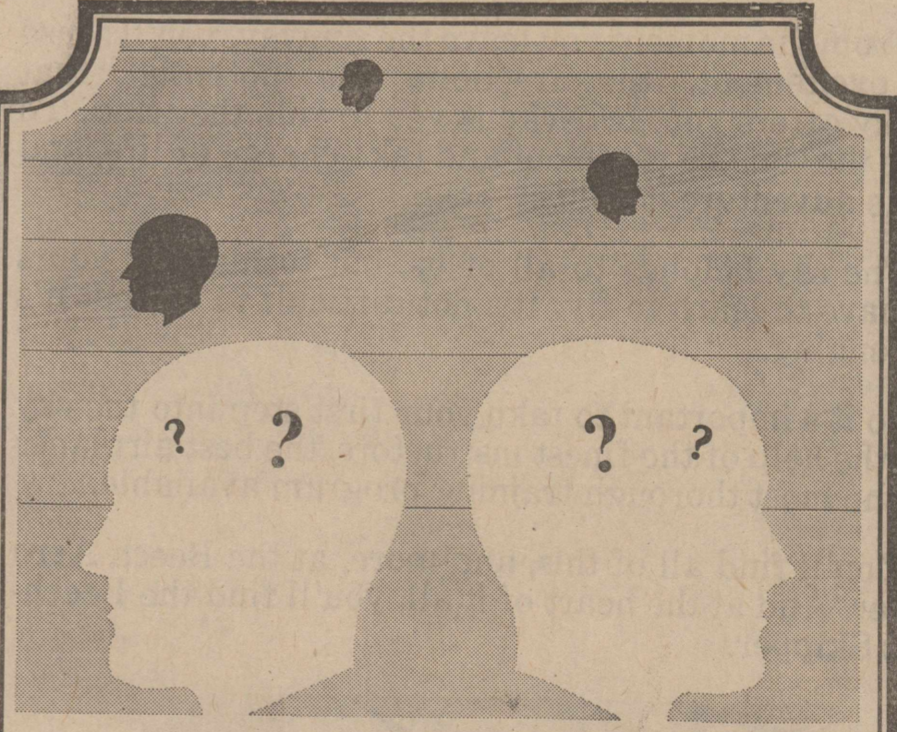

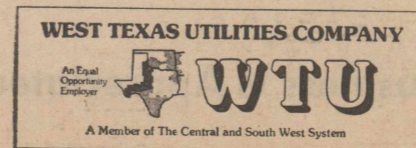
