Services Held For V. B. (Doc) Williams

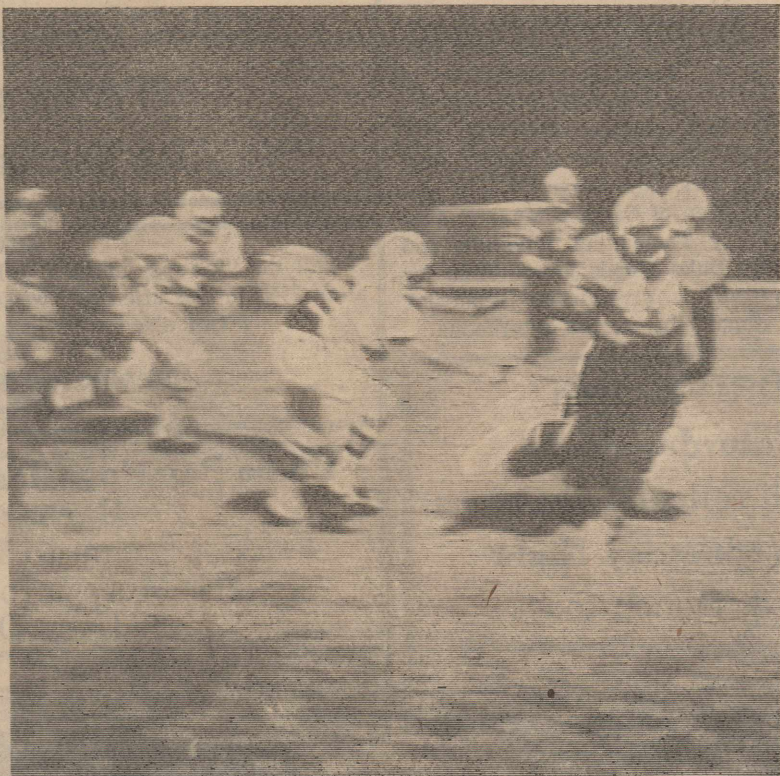

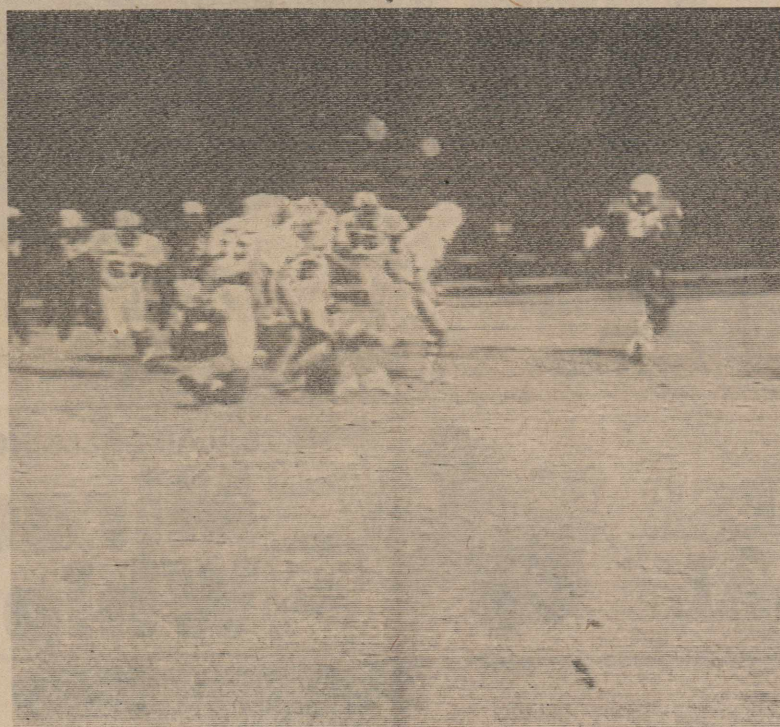
One daughter, Jannie Ann Williams, preceded him in death on July 21, 1942.

James McNary Is Player of The Week

Valley High School's James McNary, who was injured early in the second quarter of the first game of the season and missed the entire second game before returning to score four touchdowns in the third game and four in the fourth game, was named Monday by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal as the South Plains Offensive Player of the Week.

In the first game of the season against Crosbyton, a Class A school, on his first carry, McNary broke for 33 yards and a touchdown. He only carried the ball three other times in that game, gaining 64 yards before going out with a shoulder injury. The Patriots lost that one 12-6. McNary missed the second game against Ralls but returned for the third game of the season in a 60-0 win over Spur.

Last week against Paducah, McNary carried the ball 12 times, scored four touchdowns, and rushed for 231 yards. In ten quarters of play this year, McNary, 5'8" and 165 pounds, has rushed for almost 500 yards and

Valley Patriots Roll Over Paducah For Second Lopsided Victory

The Valley High Patriots, who caused some second looks two weeks ago when they rolled over Spur 60-0, created more attention last Friday when they defeated Paducah 70-0.

James McNary, who scored four touchdowns against Spur, again scored four touchdowns last Friday against Paducah and gained over 200 yards for the second game in a row.

Paducah took the game opening kick-off on their own 10 yard line and returned it to the 39. A couple of plays later, the Dragons fumbled and the Patriots recovered on the 38. The Patriots ran a couple of plays, then quarterback Rod Carpenter passed to Ray Williams for 13 yards and a score. The PAT try failed, and with 7:53 to go in the first quarter, Valley led 6-0.

The Patriots got off a short kick-off which bounced off a Dragon and Valley recovered. McNary got the ball for the next three carries and on the third play he ran 36 yards for a touchdown. Williams kicked the extra point, and the Patriots were ahead 13-0 with 4:37 left in the first quarter.

Paducah returned the kick-off 16 yards for a first down on their own 26 yard line. The Dragons were unable to pick up a first down and had to kick to the Patriots.

Brittan returned the punt 40 yards to the Valley 39. On the next play, Ray Williams bolted through the middle on a 39 yard scamper for a touchdown. Williams kicked the PAT, and gave the Patriots a 20-0 first quarter lead.

The Patriots kicked to Paducah, and on this possession the Dragons gained a first down before being forced to kick the ball back to the Patriots. The Patriots took the punt and returned it to their 25 yard line. On the next play, McNary broke 75 yards for a touchdown only to have it called back because of an illegal motion penalty. At

that point time ran out in the first quarter with the Patriots ahead 20-0.

Valley went on to score 19 points in the second quarter to lead 39-0 at halftime.

The Patriots scored 18 points in the third quarter to lead 57-0 at the end of the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, Valley scored 13 points.

Scoring was as follows: McNary, four touchdowns; Williams, three touchdowns and four extra points; Carpenter, two touchdowns and passed for one touchdown; Terry Brittan, one touchdown, and Mike Dowd, one touchdown. Defensively, Brum Pinkerton was in on a lot of tackles, and Shane Smith, Dennis Farley, Joe Kirk Smith, Dee Dowd, Mike Dowd, Dane Cheat-ham, Troy Scoggins, Tommy Morris, Bruce Setliff, Bucky Beavers all had their names called for good play during the game.

The reserves played much of the third and fourth quarters. Statistics were as one-sided as the score might indicate.

The Patriots have an open date this week, and will open district play Friday of next week when they go to Nazareth.

Just how good are the Patriots? Obviously the last two games were against weak teams. The Patriots' first four games, three of which were won, were all against Class A teams. Comparisons are being made as to how this team would stack up against last year's team which won a district championship. This year's Patriots are not as big, but obviously they are quicker and are able to score on any given play. The Patriots are not a one-man team, for either of their speedy backs is capable of breaking for the distance any time he touches the ball.

Nazareth, the Patriots' next opponent, was picked as the team to beat in the district at the beginning of the season and will probably give the Patriots a good test. Valley fans are looking forward to that meeting.

The bale weighed 1880 pounds and ginned out 490 pounds. The bale sold for 75c a pound and brought \$367.50. The seed turnout was 900 pounds, and sold for \$120.00 per ton, bringing \$54.00. The growers were Blake D. Barton and Johnny Barton.

Caprock Gin paid 75c a pound for the cotton and \$120.00 for

the seed and ginned free.

Premiums were paid by Merrill Food, Valley Drug & Gifts, Brunson Supply, Rice Dry Goods, First National Bank of Quitaque, Panhandle Compress, Rolling Plains PCA, Matador Motor & Implement Co., C. R. The total premium brought \$330.00, bringing the total price of the cotton to \$751.50.

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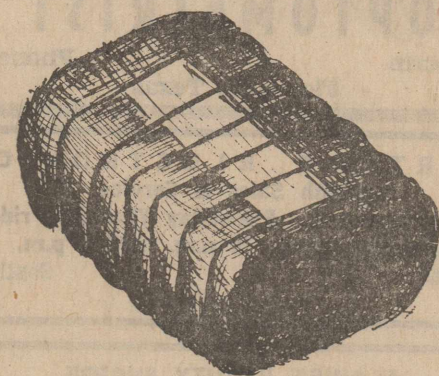
