Clarendon Takes Three Games From Valley Tuesday Night

Valley High School drove to Clarendon Tuesday for four games and managed to win only one game.

The Valley JV boys, who had not much winning thus far this season, was the only team winning Tuesday, defeating the Bronchos by a score of 35-33.

All of the games were close. In the first game of the evening, the JV girls lost to the JV Bronchoettes 15-20 in a low scoring affair. Valley trailed all the way, and was behind 4-9 at the end of the first quarter. At half-time Valley was behind 10-13, and at the end of three quarters Valley was 14-18 and finished 15-20.

Karen Ramsey scored 12 of the first quarter. Tina Ortiz added two points and Wanda Brittian one point.

Whaley To Seek Third Term As State Representative

State Representative Foster Whaley of Pampa officially announced today that he would seek a third term as State Representative for the 84th Legislative House District—created by the State Redistricting Board. The newly created District adds Crosby and Dickens counties and the north portion of Lubbock County to Whaley's old 66th Legislative District. Whaley lost Wheeler County to the District now served by J. W. Buchanan in the Northern Panhandle.

Foster Whaley is a 1949 graduate of Texas A&M; is a former County Extension Agent; has farming and ranching interests in Gray, Carson and Armstrong counties. He is a founding member of the Texas Cattle Feeder's Association and is credited with hedging the first pen of cattle in Texas, south of the Canadian River, on the live Beef Cattle Futures Market. He has served as a panelist member on Merrill Lynch hedging seminars.

Whaley, with the help of his wife, Lois, serve on a full time basis as State Representative. Their farming and ranching interest is leased out to others. They log over 50,000 miles annually serving their present ten county District.

Foster Whaley does not accept downstate Political Action Committee money for his campaign fund. An Austin publication stated that fewer than six legislators are in this category.

Whaley serves as a member of the powerful House Appropriations Committee and is vice chairman of the Constitutional Amendments Committee.

The Whaleys have three children: Christie, a 1977 graduate of Texas A&M, now living in Dallas; Wayne, a 1979 graduate of Texas A&M, now living in Houston; and Karlette, a senior student at Texas A&M.

The Valley JV boys won a squeaker over Clarendon 35-33, the game having to go into overtime. Valley had to come from behind to win this one, trailing the Bronchos 3-8 at the end of the first quarter, then pulling into a 10-10 tie at half-time. Valley went ahead 23-17 at the end of three quarters, only to see the Bronchos rally to tie it at 29 at the end of regulation play. The Patriots managed to pull it out 35-33 in the overtime period.

Jerry McNary won scoring honors with 18 points, while Randy Fuston scored 11 and Brett Cheatham added six points.

The Varsity girls game was a barnburner all the way, with the action see-sawing back and forth and finally going into an overtime. Valley was ahead 14-8 at the first stop, but saw the Bronchoettes come storming back to go ahead 30-23 at halftime. Valley outscored the Bronchoettes 15-14 in the third period, but still trailed 38-44. Valley finished strong in the fourth period and tied the score 54-54 at the end of regulation play. The Bronchoettes scored five points in the overtime period to only four for the Lady Patriots to nip them at the final buzzer.

Candy Jones scored 15 points for Valley while Sherry Hendrix tossed in 14, Angie Clay and Nina Reyna scored 11 points each, Angie Eudy, five, and Nadine Rice, two.

The Patriots lost their second game in a row in another wild one, 60-54. The Bronchos were ahead 15-12 at the first stop, and 28-22 at halftime. The Patriots took a 44-36 lead at the end of three periods, only to see the Bronchos wind it up with a big fourth quarter to win 60-54.

All of the stock for the show must be weighed in and in place between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. Friday. Entry fees are \$2.50 per head for lambs and barrows, and \$5.00 per head for steers.

All exhibitors must be members of active FFA chapters of 4-H clubs in Briscoe County, and the feeding period for the animals to be shown must have begun before November 15.

Animals will be divided into classes following weigh-in. Lambs must not be over 140 pounds and must have baby teeth. Top weight for the barrows will be 275 pounds. Each exhibitor may enter no more than three animals in each division of the show.

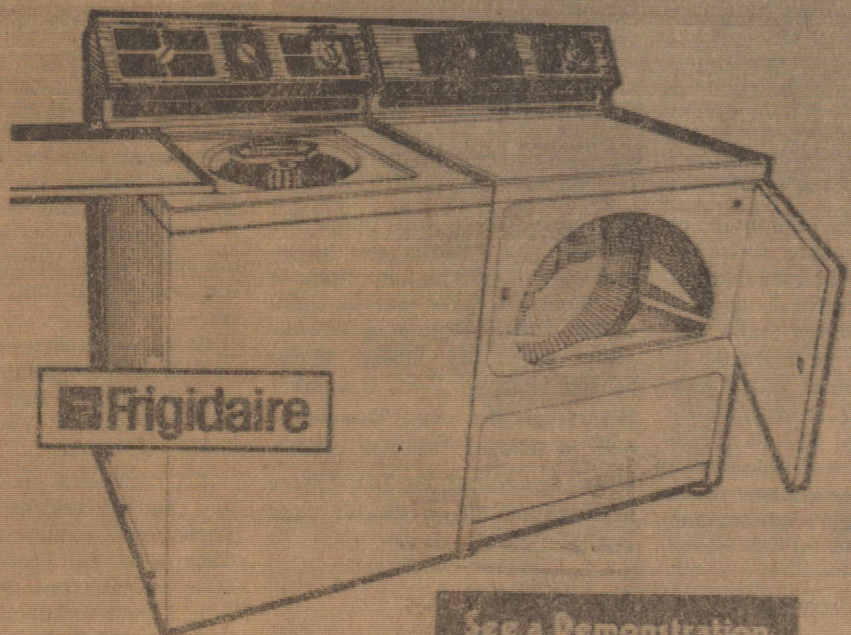
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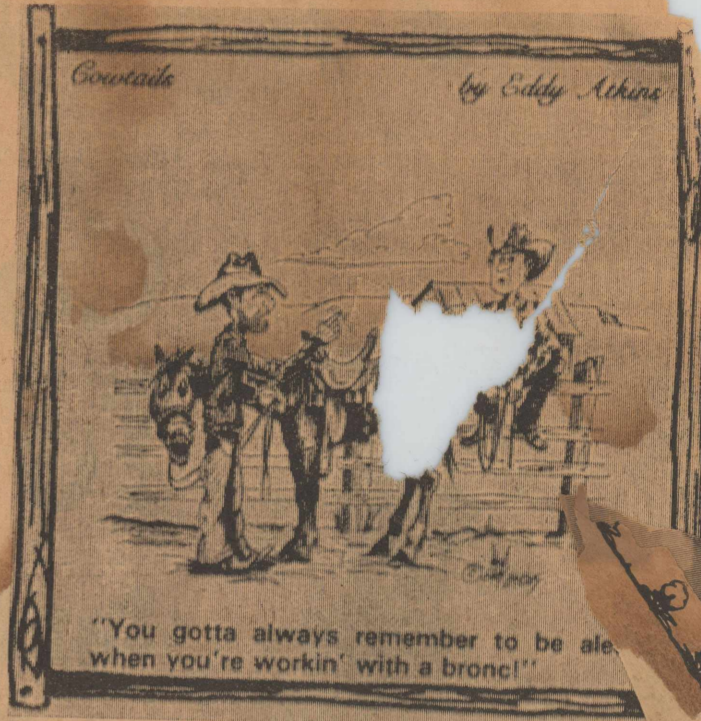
