Holland New Service Company Manager Here

Famous P-80 Will Be Shown June 23

LUBBOCK, June 4.—Residents of the South Plains will have the opportunity to get a close-up view of the Army Air Force jet propelled Lockheed P-80 "Shooting Star" on June 23 at the Lubbock National Aeronautics Ass'n. air show which will be held at the Lubbock Municipal Airport commencing at ten o'clock. Major Victor Modena, assistant recruiting officer at Goodfield Field at San Angelo, has assured NAA officials that at least two of the 9-mile a minute P-80s will be at the field for the show. Other air force planes which will go through maneuvers during the show are an A-6, B-5, P-47, P-51, AT-6, and AT-7. There is a possibility that these models will be supplemented by others.

In addition to the Army Air Forces show, the program will feature a display of new models of private aircraft and a model airplane show, the latter event carrying a \$25.00 prize. The Army flying exhibition is scheduled for 2:00 p. m.

Garth Graduates At Keesler Field

KEESLER FIELD, Miss.—Pvt. Charles F. Garth, Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Garth, Sr., Stinnett, and husband of Mrs. L. E. Garth, this week was graduated from one of the world's greatest educational programs—one of the AAF Training Command's airplane mechanics training courses at Keesler Field. The Garth family formerly lived in Muleshoe. The training he received in the mechanics school covered his airplane and engine mechanic operations. The training course extended 42 days and included instruction in aircraft electrical systems, engine operation, fuel and oil systems, propellers, structures, instruments and basic inspection. This qualifies him for additional specialized training in the maintenance of heavy bombers, cargo planes, jet and rotor aircraft.

World's New Champ Milk Producer



IONIA, MICH.—With the production of 22,526 pounds of milk and 714.8 pounds of butterfat during the year ending February 1, Ionia Ormsby Queen of the Ionia State Hospital farm has added the title of world's champion milk producer to her 12 records, displacing Essex Sutorne April Belle, who was announced as a new champion only last November. The Holstein-Friesian cow's lifetime herd test record, over a period of 16 years, shows the production of 252,567 pounds of milk and 8,071 pounds of butterfat, with an average of 3514.5 days per lactation. Her highest individual record, at six years, shows 23,866 pounds of milk and 771 pounds of butterfat, making three times daily, 565 days. Four of her records are over 700 pounds of fat and all over 500 pounds, with nine of her marks topping 20,000 pounds of milk.

Plant Is Sold Muleshoe Tile

Sale of the Muleshoe Tile Plant equipment to a Brownwood man is announced this week by the owners, M. F. Roberts, O. G. Bowen, and Henry Lee, all of Muleshoe. They sold the plant to a Mr. Wilson, who is moving it to Brownwood. The local plant operated about three months and produced many tile, some of which were used for construction of local buildings. All have been sold except about 2 thousand tile still on hand and yet for sale.

Office Moved

Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District office is in a new and larger quarters in the building recently finished for Mrs. Doris McCarty at the northwest corner of the square. The building is 25 by 80 feet and has five offices plus a large storage space in the rear for cars belonging to the personnel.

N. S. Abbott is the Work Unit Conservationist in charge of the office. B. F. Parsons is agricultural engineer. Jesse Thompson is soil scientist. The office has three conservation aids, Claude Karth, Henry Williamson, and Charles Ball. Miss Jerry Osborne is clerk-typist. The Board of Supervisors for the district is composed of Ray Carter, president; Earl Black, secretary; Henry Schuster, Virgil Nowell, and Paul Carmickle.

Sewing Room

Mrs. Gerald Moore wishes to announce that the Sewing Room in the high school building will be open for public use on Mondays and Wednesdays during June. The room is equipped with eight large sewing tables and five machines, and Mrs. Moore, home economics instructor, will be present to help with problems if anyone is in need of her aid. She hopes this service will be of special benefit to those who do not have a sewing machine and particularly to mothers who would like to remodel garments for small children.

Malone Milk Company is open for business, its owner, Dudley Malone announces. The plant, located at the northwest corner of the courthouse square, will produce pasteurized milk and milk products, including cream, buttermilk, and butter, and later on, when equipment is available, ice cream. Mr. Malone formerly was a resident of Muleshoe, when he operated the Phillips Petroleum agency here. The last two years he has been co-owner with his brother of a milk plant at Hereford. He sold his interest there to his brother and entered business here for himself.

A brick and tile building 25 by 80 feet in dimensions has just been completed under supervision of the J. R. D. Huyck. At the rear of the creamery building a residence for the family is nearing completion and the family joined Mr. Malone here this week.

Thus Muleshoe gained a fine business and a fine family at one stroke. The interior of the building has been arranged so as to best serve the convenience of the workers and the patrons.

Latest type new equipment has been installed in the plant. Pasteurizing equipment is now in use. It is large enough in capacity to serve a town of twice Muleshoe's present population, to which Mr. Malone expects the town to grow.

He explained that milk to be pasteurized is first placed in the pre-heater. After pasteurizing the milk is put through an in-line milk filter of which the plant has the latest type machine. In pasteurizing milk, the fluid is brought to a temperature of 143 degrees and held there for 30 minutes. Milk is pasteurized in order to kill certain bacteria, including those which cause Bangs Disease, typhoid and tuberculosis. If present, the milk is passed through the cooler and the temperature is lowered to 50 degrees. It is then bottled and rolled into the plant vault. The vault is 10 ft. by 16 feet and a low temperature is maintained at all times. The creamery at present is handling Cream O'Plains butter, made at Hereford.

A whole milk market has been established in Muleshoe with the starting of operations by the new milk plant. Mr. Malone's advertising to milk producers of the territory that he is in the market for all the whole milk they can bring him.

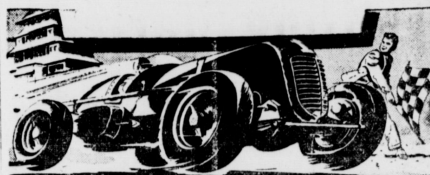

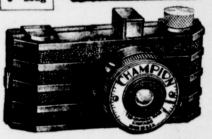

caus widespread approval of the quick action of the House of Representatives in passing legislation to stop the paralyzing railroad strike. Within two hours after the President addressed the joint session of Congress we had passed the bill requested by him.

The railroad unions are made up of the very highest type of American citizens. They did a great job during the war. The union organizations were 18 to 2 against the strike. It was principally the stubbornness of one man, Mr. A. F. Whitney, that produced the disastrous situation. A country that cannot protect itself against utter chaos is in a bad shape. I am convinced that the quick action of the House gave hope and encouragement to a great majority of the American people.

The American people have been kicked around by such tyrants as John L. Lewis until their patience is exhausted. People generally do not have time and opportunity to read the Congressional Record and

they cannot understand why more effective action was not taken against racketeers in industry and labor months ago.

The fact is that before the war, during the war, and since the war, the House of Representatives passed legislation to meet the situation but the legislation has usually died in the Senate. However, the Senate has now passed the Case Bill which was approved months ago by the House, and the bill has gone to the White House.

Those of us who voted for the bill to stop Mr. Whitney's paralyzing railroad strike have been threatened by Mr. Whitney, and he has also insulted the American people. In commenting on those of us who voted for the bill, Mr. Whitney, according to the Associated Press, said:

"My Board of Directors has already authorized me to spend \$2,500,000 to defeat the members of Congress who have voted for the shackling labor legislation Mr. Truman has propos-

ed. We mean to defeat every member of Congress who voted for that bill."

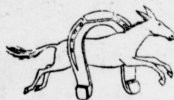

And by taking this precaution to protect the freshness of bread—and all other foods—we can save money for ourselves—and release food for the millions of people who are actually starving in Europe!
