### Mr. Muleshoe

I have never seen a county that would be willing to tear up the paved roads and go back to dirt roads. The objection is that the roads will cost money. Sure they will, but they will be worth it and a whole lot more. Anything we have that's worth having costs us money. But I wouldn't go back to the gasless, lightless and automobileless days for anything you could name. To develop and grow is the nature of human beings, especially Americans who come into a new country and go to work to build it up to suit them.

The bonds will double our county taxes. That is a cinch. But the joker is that he don't pay any county taxes to speak of. We pay the bulk of our taxes to the schools; our county assessment is extremely small. If all taxes were as light as our county and state taxes, we would save pay very little taxes, considering the benefit we get.

Muleshoe is way behind her neighbors in city paving and Bailey County is way behind her neighbors in the matter of road paving. Let's catch up. Let's get in the stream of progress and go along with the rest of the Plains.

We are getting these bonds at the lowest rate of interest that will obtain for some time to come. Interest will average only 2 1/2 per cent. At that rate, government bonds are almost as good an investment to the people who have money.

Therefore the ultimate cost of the bonds is reduced for us, and probably we won't ever see a time when we can improve at the present price.

There is another thing that some overlook. That is the possibility that the state will take over these road bonds. The state has not failed to do so yet and we do not believe this program is over. The roads will meet fully the state highway department specifications, and when the state again begins to take up county bonding there will be no reason why they won't assume the payment of ours.

Read in another column of this paper the names of just a few business men who are wholeheartedly in favor of the issuance of bonds. The committee which picked up these names did not have time to get the names of all who favor the bonds. They just got the names of the men they could reach quickly. But it is enough names to show how the people of Muleshoe feel.

I believe too much emphasis is being placed on taxes, anyway. We get more for our tax dollar in the U. S. than we do for nearly anything we spend a dollar for. A man will think nothing of spending seventy-five to a hundred dollars on a little fishing trip, but if his total tax bill for the year is thirty dollars he may let out a squeak. When we pay a dollar to our schools, churches, city, county, state or nation, we get more out of it than for any other dollar we spend, because we get what we like to call the "American Way of Life" law and order, better living standards, a progressive community, better communication facilities, and everything else that goes with our kind of country.

### Irrigation Drill Bits Made Here



Pictured above is Carl Sneed at Sneed's Welding Shop which is specializing in making drill bits for irrigation rigs throughout the territory. In addition, the shop reinserts and repairs bits here.

The work is accomplished by use of some heavy duty equipment. For instance the shop uses a 100-pound acetylene generator supplying five torches.

In the picture above the largest bit weighs 733 pounds. All bits were built in the local shop. The shop furnishes vital service to drillers of the area by making and repairing drug and diamond bits.

The shop also operates portable welding outfits both acetylene and electric making trips to rigs over the territory to speed up repair jobs.

## Voters Offered Chance To Aid In Bailey County Development

### Best Type Of Roads Planned

The Journal offers an explanation of the type of construction to be used in paving farm-to-market roads under the \$625,000 bond issue to be voted on September 10 in Road District 1-A, Bailey County.

These roads will be what is known as a triple bituminous or asphalt type highway on a calciche base.

All roads will be adequately drained, graded and topped, to be equal or better than the State Highway construction of this kind.

State highway specifications will govern throughout and the voters of Bailey County can expect a high type of construction. If these bonds are voted it will place good roads leading to markets within the reach of everyone.

Road District 1-A is composed of Commissioner Precincts No. 1, 2 and 3. And it is the plan to divide this money equally among the three precincts.

It is estimated that this bond money will build 25 miles of paved roads in each of the three precincts.

### Towns Celebrate Paving Completion

Sudan celebrated Friday and Saturday the completion of a 62 block paving program in the city, and the completion of the paving of 36 1/2 miles of farm to market roads leading to the city.

Another small town to celebrate completion of a paving program in recent days is Abernathy, Hale county.

### RAIN AT BAILEYBORO

Reports reached here of a big rain at Baileyboro Sunday. The fall was said to have been very heavy. This rain followed by only a few days the general rain of Tuesday, August 27. Several other parts of the county were said to have received showers.

### State May Take Up Road Bonds

Most counties of Texas that have voted bonds for paving roads have had these bonds taken up by the state. Their bonds were voted without any definite commitment from the state, but when sufficient funds were obtained at Austin, the bonds have been taken up.

Some counties had not paid over 20 per cent on their bonds when they were taken over by the state for maturing.

It is not a certainty that Bailey County's road bonds will be taken up by the state fund, but it is a probability and a strong one.

This information passed along by those in position to know, and who have ample experience in the matter to know.

There has been considerable publicity setting forth objection to the bond issue and taxation necessary for the proposed road paving program for Bailey County. Obviously, roads cost considerable money, which must be raised by taxation. Everyone favors improved roads; even those who object to this issue would like to have them if they didn't have to help pay for them.

Since this program has been brought up and the benefits and merits of such road paving has not been set forth, it is believed that the question should be given an impartial consideration, weighing the benefits against the cost.

### BENEFITS:

1. Reduce the car operation cost about 1 1/2 per mile, saving each car owner who uses the road about \$150 a year. This is based on data which has determined that the average rural resident drives his car about 10,000 miles a year.
2. Valuable time in commuting and transporting produce to market is saved, particularly when roads are in bad shape due to rain or blown out by winds and dry weather.
3. Maintenance cost is saved. There is much more grading and maintenance operations involved in keeping a dirt road in good condition than on a paved road. Every time it rains, and at regular intervals, the dirt road must be graded, while in the case of the paved road, light shaping of the ditches is necessary only occasionally.
4. Paved roads make a progressive community, attract new citizens, make rural life more attractive, result in intensified development and improvement of the country in general, cause more business activities, and help coordination and modernization of the school system.

Yet, for all these benefits, the average taxpayer will pay about \$11.20 per year for a quarter section of land; for one section of land, \$44.20; these figures being based on present county valuations, but as the county grows, there will be more valuation and less taxation to the property owner. The savings of one blowout to a farmer's car alone will pay his additional taxes on a 160-acre farm per year. The savings on the operation of one automobile would be close to \$135 per annum. If the farmer has more automotive equipment, the savings will be relative times more according to the amount of equipment owned.

In last week's Muleshoe Journal there appeared an advertisement on the road bonds to be voted on September 10 which to the average voter is somewhat confusing.

The statement was made that county taxes would be doubled with no further explanation. The voter should bear in mind that his county tax is only a small portion of his overall tax assessment. For example: on a quarter section of land assessed at \$7.00 per acre the increased tax for this bond issue will be only \$11.20.

For a county or community to prosper and progress transportation facilities are vital. Losses to growers of produce are tremendous because of inadequate facilities for transporting produce to market, resulting in loss of time and money because produce is perishable and best of roads is hardly good enough. Thereby, a loss is created not only to the individual grower but to the country as well.

To secure this small road improvement program, it is necessary that you go to the polls and vote for Good Roads on Tuesday, September 10, 1946.

**U. S. Report On Water Due Soon**

AUSTIN—The U. S. Geological Survey office in Austin said Friday that a detailed report will be released within two weeks on the effect of the prolonged drought on the underground water resources in the Panhandle and South Plains areas.

Meanwhile field men are continuing a joint investigation of the water situation in those areas by the Geological Survey and the Texas

Board of Water Engineers. It is believed that the steady increase in water consumption in this section of the state, coupled with the fact that rain has been subnormal for many years, may have resulted in dangerous depletion of the underground water resources.

W. N. White of the U. S. Geological Survey office in Austin said that particular attention is being given to the study in Potter, Randall and Deaf Smith counties, in Amarillo is hoping to expand its water supply.

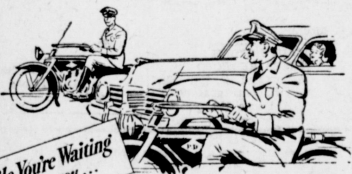

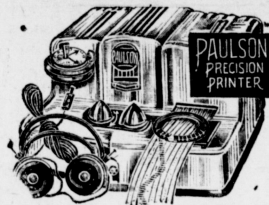

A cover crop may be defined as a crop grown for the purpose of protecting the land from the action of the weather. Quite often a cover crop also provides good fall, winter and spring grazing and may serve the purpose of a green manure crop when turned under in Spring. For instance, small grain, vetch, or winter peas may be considered cover and grazing crops during the winter and green manure crops during the spring. In this case the same crop covers and protects the ground in the winter and improves the physical condition and fertility of the soil when it is plowed under.

## Monthly Benefits To Vets Survivors Payable Under SS

Many survivors of World War II who have died since leaving the service will benefit from one of the provisions of the Social Security Act Amendments of 1946. Elliott W. Adams, manager of the Lubbock Social Security Administration field office said today.

Mr. Adams explained that the new section of the act provides for the payment of monthly benefits to qualified survivors of the veterans who die within 3 years of their discharge and whose dependents are not qualified to receive compensation or pensions from the Veterans

Life Insurance is not considered as compensation or pension. In the case of such veterans who died before the enactment of the new amendment, the measure provides for monthly benefits retroactive to the date of the veteran's death if the survivors file their benefit claims with the nearest office of the Social Security Administration before midnight February 10, 1947. Of course, monthly benefits other than retroactive are payable on claims filed at any time by qualified persons.

Pay ceilings set by Congress for veterans training or studying under the GI bill do not apply to disabled veterans, the Veterans Administration has announced.

Maximums of \$200 for married veterans and \$175 for single men were prescribed by Congress for veterans training-on-the-job or studying under benefits of Public Law 346.

Disabled veterans, VA said, are enrolled for training or study under Public Law 16, a separate act, and are not affected by the new legislation.

Patients in VA hospitals in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi will be entertained by one of the best professional billiard players in the world late in November. Erwin Rudolph, a trick shot specialist, is making a tour of Southwestern VA hospitals through the courtesy of the Billiard Association of America, VA announced.

Blind veterans who have the grit to try and who get proper aid can get fun and benefit from many sports heretofore believed impossible for sightless people, the Veterans Administration believes. In Houston, Texas, VA, with the cooperation of a local bowling alley, has inaugurated a class of bowling for blind veterans.

The fundamentals of bowling have been successfully taught to the blind in several cities, VA said. The Houston classes are being directed by R. L. Springfield, advice officer for blind veterans.

Two more guidance centers to help veterans with their vocational and educational problems have been established in Texas, by the Veterans Administration.

The centers will be operated by Lamar College of Beaumont and North Texas State Teachers College in Denton.

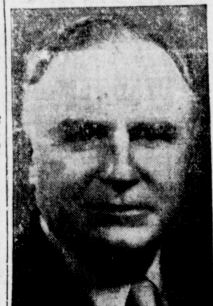
VA guidance centers are now operating in all sections of the Southwest. Psychologists and vocational experts are available in all the centers to help veterans.

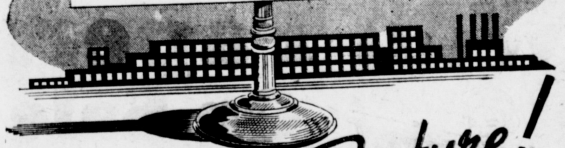

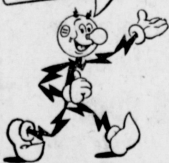

### Less Hogs Now—But More Money

COLLEGE STATION.—In January of 1937 there were 298,000 more hogs in Texas than there are today. That sounds like a blow to Texas swine production, but a comparison of values shows that prices and quality are more important than mere quantity in production. Even though there are almost 3,000,000 hogs in in the state now than in 1937, today's value of Texas hogs is set at \$34,905,000, as compared with the 1937 value which was only \$4,202,000.

These figures were released from the Agricultural Economics Service Center which has been recently set up at the Texas A & M College Extension Service.

 1 lb seedless raisins.  
 1 orange, 1 lemon, 1 apple peel and all.  
 3 lbs. sugar.  
 1 cup vinegar.  
 1 cup grape juice or other fruit juice not too sweet.  
 1 teaspoon salt.

1 tablespoon each cinnamon, cloves, mace or other spice to taste. Add pears, orange, lemon and apple. Mix with all other ingredients and boil for two hours. Pack in jars and seal while hot. This is an excellent way to use hard pears.

### Airport Meeting Held At Lubbock

Charles Lenau last Thursday attended a meeting in Lubbock when Civil Aeronautics administration officials explained details in the program in which municipalities may build airports or improve present facilities.

Lenau explained some of these details at the meeting of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce Friday.

Members voted to appoint a permanent airport committee and Lenau, who is president of the body, will name the members of the group. The group will keep in touch with developments with the view of improving the local airport as opportunity presents itself in the future.

For an over-all view of what the "depression days" did to agriculture of this state, the service center has figures showing that it took Texas farmers 13 years to again reach a cash income of 20 million dollars after seeing it fall below that figure in 1929.

### TRY SUMMER MINCE TEA


Home makers planning to can pears from their own orchards should harvest them when they are mature but still green and allow them to ripen in a cool, dark, well ventilated place. This practice will assure a finer texture in the canned product will prevent the fruit from having a bitter taste. Once ripened, the pears must be used immediately or they will quickly become discolored, warns Mrs. Laurette A. Wilson, county home demonstration agent of Bailey County.

She gives this further advice to the home maker: Since pieces of the pared fruit become discolored so quickly, drop them immediately into a solution made of one gallon


of water and two table-spoons each of salt and vinegar. This treatment not only checks discoloration but also prevents loss of vitamin C.
