





bodies. They allow scientists to grow cells that normally do not reproduce themselves in the body; such has brain cells, and the cells that make up the heart.

Stem cells can be derived from two places: fertilized embryos or the patient's spinal cord. Although using spinal cord tissue for the extraction of stem cells is possible, the stem cells from embryos are much more viable.

Despite the potential for this kind of science, President Bush has repeatedly stated that any bill supporting embryonic stem cell research passing his desk will be vetoed. The President acknowledges that such work is groundbreaking and that it could save lives. However, he refuses to allow government funds to be spent on that research.

In a press briefing last week, White House Press Secretary Scott Mc-Clellen said "The President's policy is that we should not be using public dollars for the destruction of life." Call: (806) 747-3393




