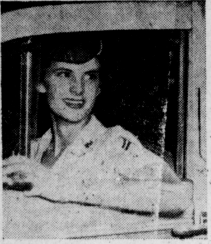
### Muleshoe Boy Talks From Submarine

## Much Feed May Yet Produce Grain; Most Of County Dry Area Gets Rain

A glorious rain fell in this section Monday night bringing relief from drought and heat which had beset the people. Rainfall at Muleshoe was 1.07 inches, said Judge R. L. Kump, weather recorder here.

It was the largest amount to fall here since Sept. 27, 1944, he said. Total precipitation for the year of 1945, with more than seven months gone, is 4.23 inches.

Indications are that the rain covered practically all of Bailey County as well as a large part of the Plains country.

C. B. Howard, Lazbuddy community, estimated a four-inch rain fell at his farm, washing the soil pretty badly.

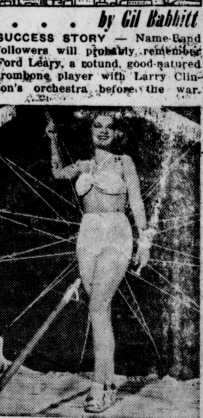
B. L. Hardin, living in New Mexico just west of West Camp school had a big rain.

# Former Muleshoe Boy Had Rugged Experience As Prisoner of Germans

The article was written by the minds don't necessarily turn to such names as Hitler, Himmler, Goering, Goebbels and other big names of the German Nazi party. In fact their thoughts probably encompass no names whatsoever, just faces glowing under gray German battle caps and the memories of the stinging fust of a rifle butt against their shoulders; the sights of a fellow American war prisoner falling with a German bayonet fit his back, the gnawing in his stomach from lack of food, the rocks and stones thrown by civilians as American prisoners marched by, and the complete exhaustion at the end of a day during forced marches on starvation diets.

At least that is what Sgt. Isaac O'Dell thinks when Germany and war criminals are mentioned. He was a prisoner of the Germans for fifteen and one half months. But despite those bitter memories, Sgt. O'Dell isn't sorry he was forced to undergo the experience.

"Since I was fortunate enough to get through these months Okey (cheerfully through my ability to keep out of the way of the guards), I am glad now that I got to go thru that experience. If just to see what people can be led into doing. The Germans look like us, and I don't act like us, and I don't think we have any more prejudice, but I don't have any ideas about them," O'Dell continued.

O'Dell, parachuted into Holland in January, 1944. His right leg became swollen and his left leg badly injured when the chute hit some wires and the air was spilled from it, dropping him to the ground. Found by Dutch patriots, he was nursed by the Dutch underground for eight hours, but by that time his legs were causing excruciating pain. Unable to treat him, the patriots were forced to turn him over to the Germans for treatment.

For a month and a half he remained in a German hospital. "The doctors treated me all right but I was interrogated every day," he said. "They tried to get me to talk and even tried to frighten me with the threat that I would be shot the next morning at sunrise if I didn't, but we had been warned about that so I didn't scare so easily."

From the hospital, O'Dell was moved to Frankfurt, where he was placed in solitary confinement on a bread and water diet for a day. "Just routine everybody had to go through it," he said, and from there he was sent to East Prussia.

It was there, he remembers, that three Americans were shot while playing ball in the prison yard. Why? He just shrugged his shoulders.

As possible. They were almost jubilant during the Battle of the Bulge.

Asked how the guards treated the war prisoners, O'Dell shrugged. "Some had some different ideas, but I could tell what their way was. The guards didn't have any good, they tried to rub it in as much as they could. They tried to help rebuild a victorious Germany, and I don't think they would be in any way different."

It was in East Prussia that the Americans were first taken to the East Prussia. They were evacuated, said the 22 year old prisoner, for two and a half miles to the railroad siding. Those who couldn't keep up were "clipped" with rifle bullets of bayoneted. When a man fell out, that was his "last" we saw of him. I made "it" a point to "keep up."

The prisoners were moved by boat from East Prussia to Stettin, port for Berlin, and thence to Berlin, where started the most grueling experience, O'Dell said, he had ever undergone.

"We started marching south out of Berlin on March 15, 1945. We marched for 35 days. Our objective seemed to be Munich, about 190 miles away by the shortest route, but we zigzagged all over that part of Germany, keeping away from battle zones. During that entire march of about 170 miles (it ended at Moosburg, near Munich, where the prisoners were recaptured by the U. S. Third Army forces) we were issued only three fourths of a loaf of bread."

"When we couldn't beg or buy food from German civilians, we stole it—anything we could get our hands on—and I'll add that most of it was stolen."

"Most of the fellows had fair shoes for the time. Mine weren't so good," he added. "I was kept pretty busy patching them up. For protection against the rains, we had two German Army blankets. Once in a great while we had shelter to sleep in. Mostly it was on the ground outdoors and usually it seemed to rain."

"I'll never forget one German guard on that hike. Seven feet, two inches in height he was. He seemed to be the ring leader in viciousness and cruelty. He's one I'll remember a long time. One thing those Jerry guards do have? respect, for and that was marauding American airplanes."

"While marching we were frequently strafed by Yanks and nobody hit for the ditch lines as fast as those Germans. You couldn't keep them in sight when the bullets were flying."

The long line of prisoners were shuffled out of Nurnberg just three hours ahead of General Patton's last moving armored divisions. The hike didn't last much longer. At Moosburg Patton's columns intercepted the SS troops and the prisoners suddenly found themselves in a no-man's land, between the battling German and American troops.

"What did I do? I dug in, just as fast and as deep as I could dig. And stayed there with the fire of both forces whistling overhead. However,

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the battle lasted only three and one half hours, when the Germans broke and fled.

The Americans rescued a total of 170,000 prisoners that area after the battle, prisoners of all nations.

O'Dell and his fellow American prisoners remained there a week, fed by the Yank troops and then they were moved to LeHarve, and

from there to England for the trip sack to the U. S. O'Dell had dropped in weight from 175 pounds to 125 pounds and that American food, plenty of it, tasted like manna.

"I got back to England 15-18 months after I left it," O'Dell said. "That's quite a while to complete one mission. But I completed it, in a round about way."

The summer wears the Air Medal, the ETO ribbon with one battle cluster and the Good Conduct Medal.

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*Just Between Us*

It was Shakespeare who spoke of a low and gentle voice as "an excellent thing in woman." But it took John Reed King, radio quiz-master of Mutual's "Double or Nothing," to tell how a well-modulated speaking voice so essential to feminine charm can be achieved by all who want to devote ten minutes a day to the effort.

Here is John's recipe: Take a deep breath and, as you exhale, say "maw," starting very quietly, progressively increasing the volume and then decreasing it until it fades away almost imperceptibly. This should be done all in one breath without any feeling of strain. Try to focus your tone on the hard palate at the roof of the mouth behind the front teeth, making it as round as possible. The gradual progression of volume from soft to loud to soft again should be smooth and even.

Next, read a full page of a book in a total whisper. Pretend that someone across the room is trying to understand you, so be as distinct and expressive as possible without breaking into "voice."

Finally, pitch your voice a full tone lower than is normal to you and speak in this deeper tone for at least five minutes as you make ordinary conversational remarks. Unconsciously you will find yourself pitching your voice lower for some time after. And you'll no longer let your voice become shrill in moments of enthusiasm or excitement.

## Winter Wheat Crop Insurance Now Available To Bailey Co Farmers

Unfavorable weather, insects, and other natural hazards need not hold the same threat for Bailey County winter wheat farmers this year as in the past, according to W. L. Key, chairman of the county AAA committee.

Farmers can get all risk crop insurance on winter wheat this year for the first time since 1943. Every wheat farmer in Bailey county will have a chance at this non profit insurance, offered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

He can choose between two contracts—one, covering up to 75 per cent of the average yield, the other up to 50 per cent. Both contracts are for a three year period. The farmer can pay his premiums each year by cash or by premium notes. "We want every wheat farmer

in the county to have an opportunity to purchase this all risk protection," Mr. Key said. "If you'd like to find out more about the program, or if you'd like to file your application now, drop by the County Triple A office. Contracts are now being written by the office force.

"Producers who desire protection by this non profit, all risk insurance must be sure to get contracts all signed, sealed, and delivered before the closing date in Bailey County, That's August 31, 1945, or their own seeding date, which ever comes up first on the calendar.

## Pontiac Recovered Thief Arrested

Recovery of the Pontiac Torpedo coupe stolen here the night of July 13 from its owner, Mrs. Hatlie Ray Jones, and the apprehension of the confessed thief is announced by Bailey County Sheriff J. C. Buchanan.

The car was found August 7 by officers seven miles out of Las Vegas, N. M., on the highway. The man arrested is Kenneth Flowers, who gave his home address as Nacogdochs, Texas.

Sheriff Buchanan interviewed the man, who is only 19, in the Clovis jail and found where certain papers taken from other cars here the same night, could be located. He found them and returned them to their owners.

Chances are Texas won't try the youth who faces ten years in the pen assessed at Clovis and an equal term at Tucumcari, thus saving Texas courts a lot of expense.

Following the announcement of President Truman of the new atomic bomb, Congressman George Mahon made known some of the inside facts in connection with the production of this deadly and spectacular weapon.

The eight man subcommittee on Military Appropriations of which Mahon is a member provided the funds for the project, beginning in the early days of the war. It was necessary to maintain the secrecy of the project in order to deny to the enemy any knowledge of it. The committee devised a way to provide funds for the project without even making known to the Congress that such an undertaking was in operation.

In commenting on the new weapon Mahon said, "Our committee has been working on the project for more than three years. General Marshall assured us of his faith and the faith of the President, and qualified experts in the project and we backed it, providing the funds, feeling that if the two billion dollar experiment was a success it would shorten the war and save lives. That apparently is what is to happen.

Finally after months of impatient waiting for the production of the first bomb, Secretary of War Stimson came to the Capitol and asked for a secret meeting with five members of our Committee. He said that the first bomb was about to be produced and the chances for success were better than 99 percent. Requested that we proceed immediately to Oak Ridge, Tenn., and inspect plants there. We were flown to the plant and escorted through the different facilities by Maj. Gen. Groves, the manager, and a group of scientists.

I was amazed at the huge size of the project. It was unbelievably big and the complicated process for production of the bomb were astounding. We were cautioned as to secrecy and shown the whole works. The processes are not only secret—they are incomprehensible to the layman. The final product is a very offensive looking substance but its power defies description. It will be up to the President to decide how much information can be made public.

"The bomb has such terrific power it poses a threat to civilization itself. America must stay far ahead in scientific research or face destruction. Our plans for future protection must be well laid. We must not only insist upon an organization for world peace we must demand it and make it work. That is the only hope for civilization."

### BLACKWATER VALLEY Soil Conservation District News

Board of Supervisors: B. H. Black, W. R. Carter, R. Q. M. Beasley, Paul M. Carmickle, and Virgil Nowell.

"An irrigation system planned and established by trained technicians and according to the slope and soil type of the land is more satisfactory than one laid out by guess," says Dwight Sheriff.

Dwight was trying to run water 2145 feet in 5 to 6 rows on a medium textured, permeable soil, with a grade of 4 ft. per 100 feet. He was getting an equal distribution of water along the rows, since it collected at the lower end, and break covers were frequent, losing high priced water. Also the water carried with it much silt from the shoulder of the main ditch, or lateral and also picked up much silt along the rows.

This system, as planned by the Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District technicians, now includes 3 runs of 715 feet each with a grade of 2 feet per 100 feet which will enable him to water 20 to 30 rows at a time.

"I get better penetration, more equal distribution, no washing, and the water is clear," says Dwight. Dwight and his father, Roy, who own and work a 320 acre farm in the West Camp Community, of which some is irrigated, became the first cooperators with Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District November 6, 1943.

### The Army Answers Your Questions

Q. My son has 105 points, but he writes that his job is essential

and that he will not be discharged. Does that mean he will have to stay in the Army until the war with Japan is over?

A. Not necessarily. The Army is continually training replacements particularly for those jobs that are classed as essential. As soon as sufficient replacements are available for these positions, men with high numbers of points will be released.

Q. Do soldiers who have been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor have any special Army privileges?

A. Yes, they receive two dollars a month additional pay and may, at any time, request and receive a discharge.

Q. When a soldier divorces his wife, can he stop her family allowance?

A. Yes, unless the divorce decree stipulates that he shall pay alimony to her. In that event, he may receive a family allowance not to exceed \$42 per month.

Q. My brother is a civilian employed by the War Department overseas. He wrote us that he was injured and received the Purple Heart. Can civilians get this decoration?

A. Yes, United States citizens serving with the Army who receive wounds as the result of an injury incurred while in the line of duty may receive the Purple Heart decoration by a medical officer.



## NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE ASSOCIATION OF COUNTY TAXPAYERS OF BAILEY COUNTY, TEXAS, hereby gives notice that an election will be held on the 25th day of August, 1945, in said County, in order to re-allocate county taxes.

That a special election be held in said County on the 25th day of August, 1945, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same tax payments by their last election thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Bailey County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year to supplement the county tax, the following:

- Not exceeding 50 cents (.50) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year for County purposes;
- Not exceeding 5 cents (.05) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year for roads and bridges;
- Not exceeding 5 cents (.05) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year to supplement the county tax to the County and
- Not exceeding 5 cents (.05) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding three (3) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of supplementing the county tax for the purpose of the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements, shall be authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers of the County, then the said election shall be held on the 25th day of August, 1945, in order to re-allocate county taxes.

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition proposed by amendment to Section 66 of Article 8 of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 6 of Article 8 by changing the rate provided for in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies, the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers of such county at a general or special election, and in such election the qualified voters of such county shall have written or printed thereon the following:

### "AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote. The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

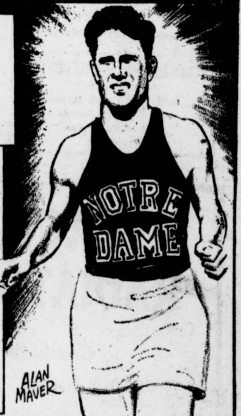
