face-to-face counseling is ideal to ensure the person knows what to do to deal with a confusing situation.
"You really need someone there to help you go, 'OK, let's see what our next step is"' she said.
Thornton said $i t$ is possible that because of the shame caused by the negative stigma associated with HIV, the patient would not receive immediate treatment.
"It's a real hard thing to know what someone will do when they test positive, so being at home alone is not my idea o healthy, safe place to be when they test positive," he said.
Thornton sugugested that any one who conducts an atho HIV collection test also follow up with a clinical HIV test. Prices of STD and HIV tests vary with income, Thomton said, but most Tech students qualify for low-price tests. Control is important in testing for HIV, Thormton said, and clinic workers at Planned Parenthood and other STD clinics have been trained in proper test-taking procedures.
Taking an HIV test at home cannot be compared to taking an at-home pregnancy test, Thornton said, because one is life"It boils down to the stigma," he said. "If you're pregnant, you may not be shunned by the public."
There are cases where women are devastated to find out that they are pregnant, Thornton said, but there are several options a woman has to deal with an unwanted pregnancy-
