Houston crack house killer set to die today

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — Robert Dale Rowell already had a slaying under his belt, a fatal stabbing committed while in prison on a robbery conviction, when a Harris County jury decided he deserved to die for shooting three people at a Houston crack house, killing two of them and leaving a third paralyzed

Rowell, 50, faces lethal injection this evening for the 1993 shooting spree that left Raymond Mata, 38, and Irvin Wright, 52, dead. Mata's wife, Angie Perez, was seriously wounded

He would be the 18th Texas prisoner executed this year and the first of two on consecutive nights this week. Condemned inmate Shannon Thomas was to follow him to the death chamber Wednesday night for a triple slaying in Baytown on Christmas Eve in 1993.

Perez said she heard a thumping sound and screams from Wright's room. Wright, investigators determined, had been badly beaten with a claw hammer and was led into the couple's room. All three were herded into a bathroom where they were shot in a bathtub. Rowell then took a shower.

911 call backfires when caller busted for pot

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Ronald Meyers called police when he heard suspicious noises outside his home He ended up in jail after officers saw something suspicious inside the home an eight-foot tall pot plant and nearly \$100,000 of marijuana.

Meyers summoned officers to his home in an upscale neighborhood Thursday morning, claiming that someone was trying to open his windows and that he could hear voices outside.

Officers found no burglar but asked if they could check inside, said police spokesman Sgt. John Booth. When Meyers, 59, let them in, officers found more than \$100,000 worth of marijuana,

The stash included an eight-foot pot plant, more plants growing in the garage and harvested marijuana — some packed into large plastic bags — stuffed in large storage bins in a bedroom, Booth said.

Officers also found syringes and other drug paraphernalia, he said.

Crossing Jordan: Rice visits to offer sympathy

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) - Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice rearranged her travel schedule at the last minute Monday to try to win a deal on Israeli-Palestinian border issues.

While negotiations continued in Jerusalem, Rice made a quick side trip to Jordan to offer condolences for the more than 50 people killed in terrorist hotel bombings last week. She set a large yellow and white wreath beside a temporary wall erected in place of blown out glass at the Radisson SAS hotel, where many of the victims had been attending a Palestinian wedding celebration.

Rice said the United States and Jordan will stand together against ter-

"There is no justification for the wanton killing of innocents," Rice said before going inside the hotel to survey the damage.

She also met with Jordanian King Abdullah II.

Accused parent killer caught

BELLEVILLE, Ind. (AP) — A Pennsylvania teenager suspected of killing his girlfriend's parents in an argument over her curfew was captured in Indiana on Monday with the girl in his car after a police chase that ended in a crash. The 14-year-old girl was not hurt,

David Ludwig, 18, and Kara Beth Borden were taken into custody around midday after he crashed his parents' car head-on into a tree in Belleville, some 600 miles from where the killings took place.

Police were questioning Ludwig but had not spoken with Kara. Because of her age, Indiana and Pennsylvania law requires a relative, guardian or attorney to be present.

Investigators said it was not immediately clear whether the girl was abducted or went







Tech official discusses new programs for university

Progress with scholarship funds, the Texas Tech campus in Spain and a new application process for the residence halls are a few ongoing internal projects aimed to benefit Tech students.

Michael Shonrock, vice president of Student Affairs, said Barnes & Noble has decided to donate \$150,000 to the Student Government Association's \$5 million scholarship fund.

The SGA has taken the initiative with the "Paving the Way to Student Success" campaign.

Shonrock said Barnes & Noble's donation is a "return of investment."

"Obviously, the more you use the local Barnes and Noble, the more we can return to students," he said.

A press conference for the scholarship fund is scheduled for Friday. Shonrock said Tech President Jon Whitmore and Chancellor Dr. David Smith are expected to attend.

An estimated \$450,000, he said, has been raised for the scholarship campaign, and he expects more money to be raised for the scholarship fund during the winter break.

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

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

aris is burning. Why? You'll hear talk from both sides. From the left about how these riots are a justified outpouring of justifiable rage and frustration with bigotry, fight the

From the right about how the children and grandchildren of African and Middle Eastern immigrants, mostly Muslim, are a generation of vipers — terrorist cells of the New Europe.

This is so much bunk. This isn't religious in nature. And rioting sure as hell is never justified.

What you are seeing here is something

French society is not an immigrant's society. Americans have gotten so good at bringing new people in from the cold, we've forgotten how hard it is for everyone else. Especially if you are like France, which, for being an enlightened Western country, is really, really bad at making any kind of real change.

Here, an American is an American if he/ she believes in American ideals. A Frenchman ... is, well, French. Hence the problem. And the French don't only like their Frenchness - which is hard to reconcile with being an immigrant, or Muslim - but they like the institutions they have come to recognize as being French, such as a hideously inefficient and bloated welfare state.

It is instructive, perhaps, instead of asking what has happened, asking what hasn't happened. What hasn't happened? France hasn't helped employment. Since the 1970s, The Wall Street Journal reports, the U.S. has created 57 million new jobs. Europe, only four million - most of those, in government. France hasn't cut government spending and

The outpourings of the Fifth Republic are responsible for about half of the GDP, contrasted with 36 percent in America. Because let's face it: It's hard to get a job in France (especially with a dusky skin tone), but easy to stay in it with a mandatory short continually up for grabs. workweek and early retirement. Which is why everybody is so reluctant to create

who looked just like them, there wouldn't be a Civil War about it. enough chairs to go around. France hasn't employed its people: The latest youth jobless rate is 23 percent (Europe's near-worst). The overall jobless rate is 10 percent. In the "sensitive urban zones" where the majority of the rioters are living and currently burning, unemployment nears 40 percent.

France hasn't mended her cities. The festering suburbs of Paris are a kind of apartheid beyond the dreams of the American inner-city. Look down on a map of the City of Light, and what do you see? Where are the hotbeds of violence? Clichy-sous-Bois. Montfermeil. Torcy. Le Queue-en-Brie. Noisy-le-Grand. All are on the outside of the Paris. As if an invisible wall girded the city.

Why didn't the French try to pierce that wall? They can't. Because France doesn't encourage the kind of small business, the kind of entrepreneurship that not only creates the majority of an economy's jobs, but is essential to immigrant integration into civil society.



So France needs a more conservative economic policy. But she also needs a liberal social policy; France has no real equivalent to our affirmative action, which can be decried today because it's been so successful in the past. Compared to the United States or United Kingdom. foreign faces are rare in not only in French government, but also in the boardroom and national news media.

Our Supreme Court, the least democratic of our branches, is staffed with Catholics, Jews, and Americans of the Irish, Italian and African persuasion — all groups that at one time or another large segments of the populace wanted booted out of the

We attack any notion of hyphenated Americanism, but we forget what an inspired compromise that is.

Here, you are able to balance fear of losing your ancestral ways with your pride at being a part of this country, to keep the old world with the new.

France has no equivalent linguistic middle ground for the French-born descendants of the "newcomers." You're either "French" or an "immigrant." No hyphen. An awkward valley, to be sure - especially if, say, your population consists of 5 million to 6 million people of North African origin, or 10 percent of the Fifth Republic.

If the idea of an upward push for darkcolored faces up the socioeconomic ladder is a saber rattle in the face of proper Gallic identity, I suggest it is time for their notions to change, and soon.

> As freedom spreads through the world, societies, as a necessity, must become more open. Open markets, open minds - and of course, open gates. Immigration is necessary and highly beneficial to every great nation that's embraced it; but, you can't have it both ways. You can't bring in foreign workers to do your dirty work and not give their offspring a slice of what they made. You can't have generations of workers kept from jobs and from recognition because your economy's too immobile; your self-identity's too narrow. Grow up.


