School official arrested for camera in bathroom

WACO (AP) — Bruceville-Eddy's school superintendent was arrested for allegedly placing a hidden video camera resembling an air freshener dispenser in a women's bathroom at the school administration office.

Danny Edward Doyen, 46, told investigators that he bought the camera with a school district credit card and placed it in a restroom to obtain nude photos of female employees, according to the McLennan County Sheriff's Office.

Doyen has been superintendent in Bruceville-Eddy, a town of about 1,500 residents about 20 miles south of Waco, since 2002. He was booked Wednesday into the McLennan County Jail on a charge of improper photography or visual recording, punishable by up to two years in a state jail.

The school board had an emergency meeting Wednesday night and placed Doyen on administrative leave. School officials searched all campus bathrooms and found no recording devices, so they believe the camera in the administrative building was an isolated incident.

CDC: HIV diagnoses down in minorities

ATLANTA (AP) - The rate of newly reported HIV cases among blacks has been dropping by about 5 percent a year since 2001, the government said Thursday. But blacks are still eight times more likely than whites to be diagnosed with the AIDS virus.

"The racial disparities remain severe," said Lisa Lee, an epidemiologist at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The falling rate among blacks seems to be tied to overlapping drops in diagnoses among injection drug users and heterosexuals, CDC researchers said.

The study was based on 2001-04 data from 33 states that have name-based reporting systems for HIV. Health officials do not know which diagnoses represent new infections and which ones were infections people had for years but had just discovered.

The CDC found that overall diagnoses in the 33 states decreased slightly, from 41,207 cases in 2001 to 38,685 in 2004. The rate fell from 22.8 cases per 100,000 people in 2001 to 20.7 per 100,000 in 2004.

Zoo visitors get to eat the attractions

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — VIP guests at the grand opening for the night safari zoo in northern Thailand will not only get to see exotic animals — they'll also get to taste them.

The Chiang Mai Night Safari Zoo will open officially on New Year's Day, with the "Exotic Buffet" for the event including tiger, lion, elephant and giraffe, said project

director Plodprasop Suraswadi. "VIP guests who pay 4,500 baht (\$110) for the buffet will have the privilege of tasting an exotic menu, ranging from dog meat from (Thailand's Sakhon Nakhon province) to lion meat from Africa," he said.

Critics have lambasted the idea, saying it will encourage wildlife trafficking in a country and region notorious for smuggling endangered species for unproven traditional medicinal benefits.

Directors across the conference agree that the classic role of bands at football and basketball games is being diminished in favor of flashy, big-screen promotions and canned

The problem of the diminishing role of bands is compounded at some schools in the Big 12 because the bands have been moved at stadiums in favor of better seating for higherpaying customers.





(U-WIRE) AUSTIN — This November's issue of Harvard Law Review was dedicated to the memory of the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist. Its lead article was penned by Chief Justice Roberts, Justice O'Connor, Justice Ginsberg, Texas Solicitor General Ted Cruz, James Duff, David Leitch and Maureen Mahoney. Their commemoration of the former chief justice is poignant and emotional. It powerfully and personally conveys the impact of this man. It also provides a valuable perspective on one of our nation's finest leaders.

Rehnquist's interests were diverse. and theater to an intense affection for college football, the former chief justice is said by current Chief Justice John Roberts to have been "so interesting in part because he was so interested - in just about everything." These interests extended even to playing charades. Cruz, a former clerk of the Chief, recounts one of his favorite memories "is his [Rehnquist's] lying on his stomach on the floor, pantomiming firing a rifle and mouthing and civil liberties in wartime.

The Chief also was adored for his lifelong humility. He was born in the Midwest to modest means and in 1943, at age 18, enlisted in the Army. As Cruz notes, "Law has too long been a profession of the privileged few, and it is fitting and worth noting that the Chief was an enlisted man, serving as a weather observer in North Africa."

It is impressive that despite his powerful intellect the Chief contentedly served his nation in such a simple fashion. It takes unique character and strong dedication to serve our country as an enlistee in the military.

And he was tremendously bril-From a love for the high arts of poetry liant. James Duff, his former administrative assistant, recalls former justice William Douglas, who served for 36 years on the Supreme Court, saying that "of all the justices with whom he served, Bill Rehnquist is the brightest." He performed his judicial duties with such alacrity and efficiency that he was able to manage the court effectively while still finding time to write four highly acclaimed books on issues as diverse as the 1876 election







Los Lonely drug charges dropped

SAN ANGELO(AP) — Los Lonely Boys drummer Ringo Garza had misdemeanor drug possession charges dismissed after his wife said marijuana found in their West Texas home belonged only to her, prosecutors said.

Lenora Garza, 25, was fined \$2,000 and credited with time served after she pleaded guilty Wednesday to a misdemeanor charge of possession of marijuana.

The same charge against her husband was dismissed because she claimed sole ownership of a container housing less than two ounces of the drug, Tom Green County Attorney Chris Taylor said.

"It's a misdemeanor marijuana case - in some circles, that's a badge of achievement," defense attorney Dick DeGuerin said in Thursday editions of the San Angelo Standard-Times. "I don't mean to be flippant, but I don't think it's a terrible thing.'


