## Planting Moisture Reported In Many Areas; Crop Prospects Are Brighter

Rains that apparently have broken a long drouth have fallen over the Plains the last several days and Thursday the sky remained overcast promising further rainfall before this spell is over.

Planters were busy in many parts of this section, and cotton, kaffir, milo and hagar seed were being sown into the ground wherever the ground was dry enough to be worked.

The rain put a smile on the face of many a farmer. It was growing late for planting in this territory and many feared a repetition of conditions of 1945 and 1946 when no rains fell until very late in the season.

R. J. Klump, weather recorder at Muleshoe, reports .86 of an inch fell in the city beginning with a shower Sunday afternoon.

Leonard Smith, of Lazbuddy, said a good rain fell at his home place a mile west and two north of the town, beginning at about 6 a. m. Tuesday. He said the showers that morning filled several lakes in the community and furnished ample planting moisture. However, he said, the rains were spotted there, lifting a mile here and there, and dabbing down again with as much as an inch and a half of rain falling in places. At Smith's place 12 miles northeast of Muleshoe very little rain fell.

Wyle Bullock, who live a few miles northeast of Muleshoe, said little rain fell at his place, but that he probably has enough moisture for planting. Heavier rains fell at a place he farms in Lazbuddy community.

**Near Flood At Maple**  
Several reports have come in from the south part of the county telling of near floods in places. Fields were washed badly. Friends here quoted J. G. Arn as having reported a very heavy downfall on Monday. Contours were washed out in some fields, it is said. Some fell as much as 5 1-2 inches of rain fell at that neighborhood.

F. A. Koppin, whose place is 2 miles south of Stegall, said five rains have fallen at his place, showers coming Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, and the manner in which the moisture came helped to soak the ground thoroughly.

## Additional Sources Of Gas Supply Promise Better Service Next Year

An announcement of personal interest to every user of natural gas throughout the area, served by the West Texas Gas Company, has been made by R. F. Hincey, president of the company. Hincey disclosed that his company has entered into an agreement with El Paso Natural Gas Company to purchase natural gas from that company at two points in West Texas. This new supply of gas, he said, should be available before next winter and will enable West Texas Gas Company to meet winter peak day needs of its customers throughout the area.

After these two connections are made, West Texas Gas Company will be drawing gas from five sources of supply. Multiple sources of supply of course minimize the incidence of temporary gas shortages which may occur when pipe lines break or when there is mechanical failure of compressor station engines.

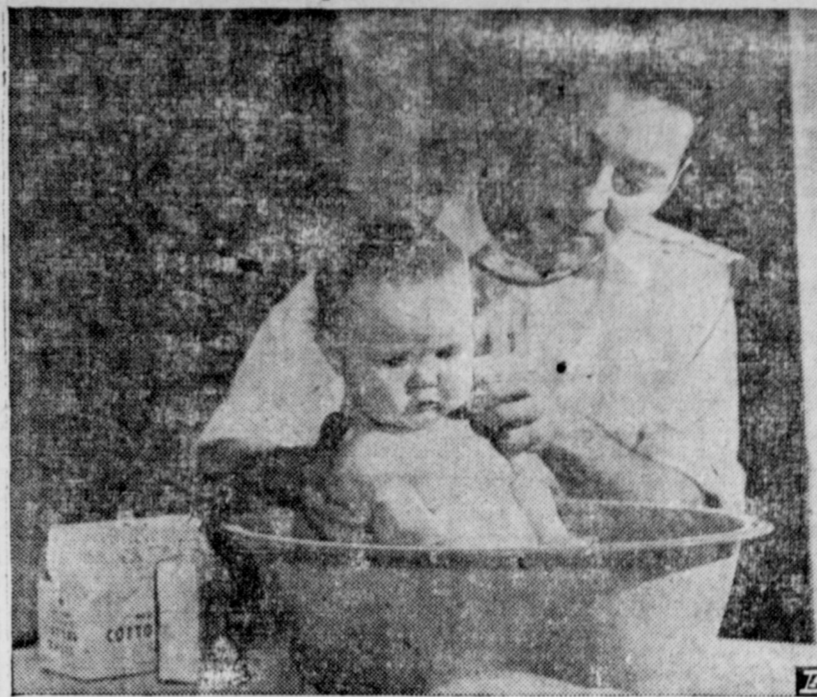

**LOTS OF QUESTIONS**

Lots of questions coming in on the international wheat agreement. That's the deal where the United States agrees to export 185 million bushels of wheat a year for five years at a fixed price ranging from \$1.50 a bushel this year down to \$1.10 five years from now, with a top of \$2 a bushel.  
 Canada is to kick in with 230 million bushels and Australia with 85 million. The 33 wheat importing nations who sign up, on the other hand, agree to buy the 500 million

bushels each year. Russia and Argentina, the other wheat exporting nations, didn't enter into the plan.

Not only wheat farmers but general farmers and ranchmen are interested in the plan because they see in it a general pattern for a lot of other items of world trade, such as cotton, rice and wool.

C. H. Bates Extension farm management specialist, answers some of the questions which come up the most often.

Q. Why hold ourselves down to 185 million bushels exports when we've got a demand for 500 million bushels?

A. The agreement doesn't limit exports to 185 million bushels, it only guarantee a market for that much at a fixed price. As long as the world wheat shortage lasts, the U. S. can expect to export around million under the agreement, 20 million to nations outside the plan and around 150 million to occupied zones.

Q. Why doesn't the government get out of the wheat business?

A. The agreement does not set the price of wheat in the U. S.

Q. Why bind ourselves to sell 185 million bushels of wheat at 30 cents a bushel under the world

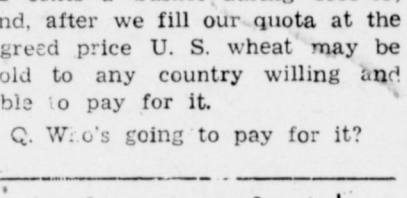

**KITCHEN MEMO** BY JEAN CLARKE

Part of the problem of meal preparation is the ever present question of what to serve for dessert. Here's one using ingredients from your faithful emergency shelf and simple enough to prepare. For *Cherry Almond Sponge* soften 1 envelope gelatine in 1/2 cup cold water. Dissolve this in 1/2 cup boiling water. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. almond extract. Chill. When mixture begins to thicken, beat until frothy. Then add 1/2 cup chopped almonds, 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries. Beat until stiff. Fold in 8 egg whites and pile into sherbet glasses. Chill. Serves 6.

A hot water tap leaking 60 drops a minute wastes about 65 gallons a month, enough hot water for 7 baths. A penny for a washer, a few minutes' time, saves gas water heater operation and, of course, lowers the gas bill.

The children's eyes will sparkle when you serve them a molasses milk shake. Mix well 1 tsp. molasses to a glass of cold milk.

Too much frost impedes air circulation, the greatest factor in correct refrigeration. Your gas refrigerator should be defrosted when about a half inch of frost has collected on an appreciable number of fins.

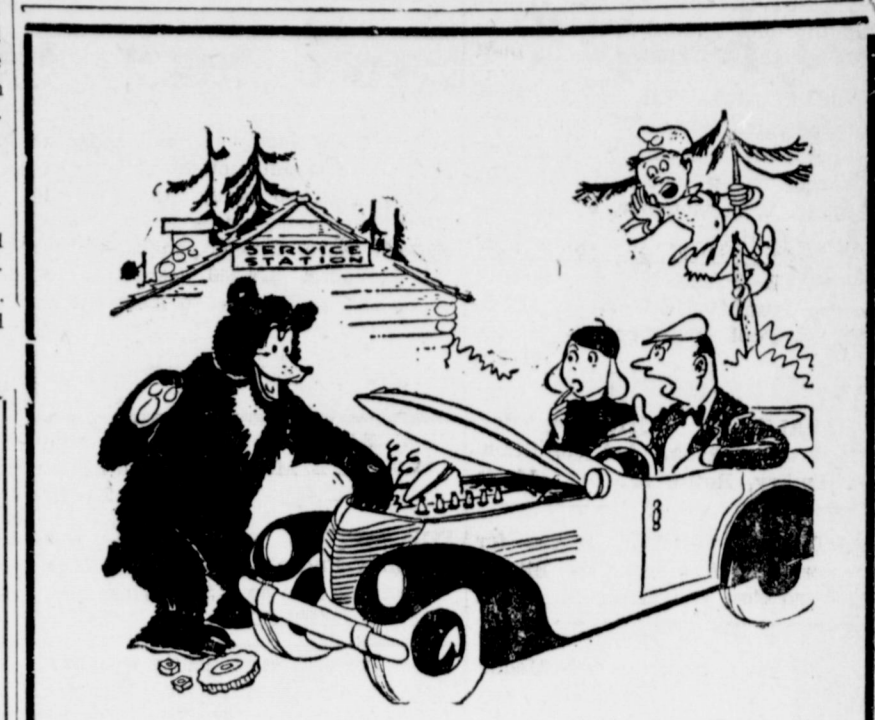

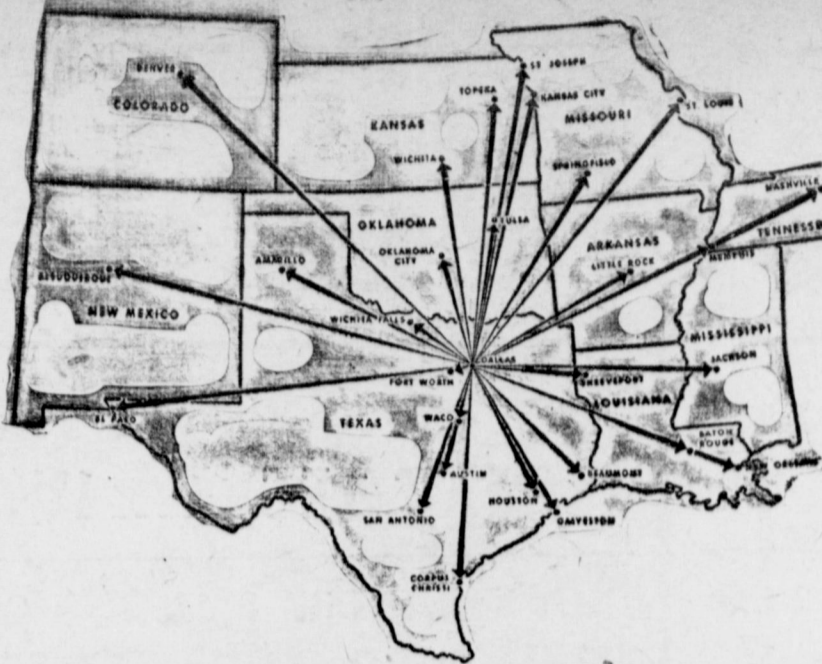

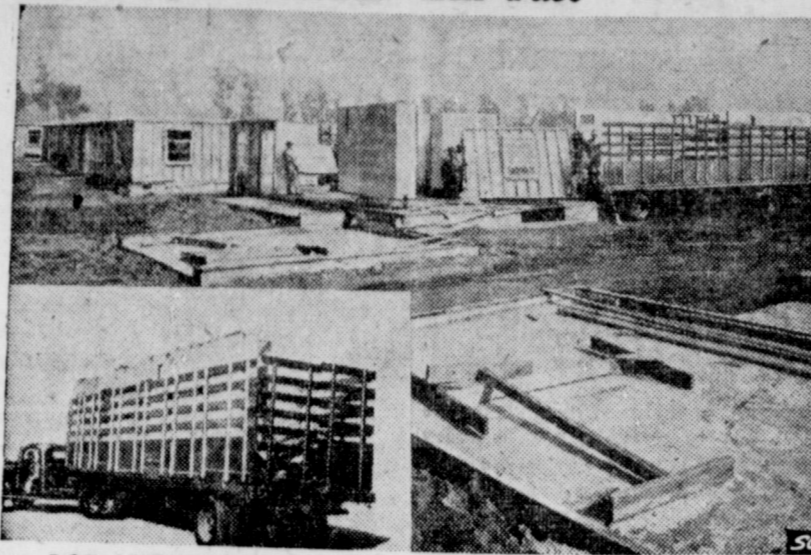

**Invasion of Insects By Air Poses Threat Pests, Plant Diseases Survive Shorter Trips**

Danger of invasion by undesirable alien insects grows apace in every agricultural country of the world as air transport, which is accounting for an ever increasing share of traffic, cuts the time of travel between them from days to hours, and as airplanes take over a larger share of traffic.

Pests that might not withstand a long sea voyage may survive the

shorter air ride in good shape. Reaching new lands where conditions favor their development they soon may build up a strong colony that could become as costly as the Hessian fly, the European corn borer, the Japanese beetle, the codling moth or the cotton boll weevil.

The department of agriculture is charged with this country's defenses against the entry of dangerous foreign insects and plant diseases. Even toys have been found to be carriers.

Farmers must be sure that all mail and express from foreign countries have been inspected and passed free of any insects or diseases before being permitted on their land.

**Jura Stallions Prove Good Farm Workers**

While the Swiss Jura horse, long recognized as the national breed of that country, has not been generally recognized in America, interest has

been centered in the breed in recent years because of the fact that the stallions are suitable for all types of farm work.

The breed has shown proper temperament, strength and resistance to disease, and while light in weight has proven an excellent draft horse. It is exceptionally strong, tame and docile.

**Sexing of Baby Chicks Proves Difficult Task**

Chick sexing is difficult to learn and in order to become proficient it is necessary to receive expert instruction and to have considerable practice and experience with thousands of chickens.

Reliable authorities have stated that a student must sex at least 250,000 cockerels before the male genital eminence can be accurately recognized. The expert sexer appears to be endowed with a natural ability to recognize and classify the various types of genital eminence to be found in chickens, but accuracy is obtained only by regular practice, investigation of errors and a liking for the job.

**Fertilizer Won't Solve Entire Farm Problem**

Many farmers are inclined to use fertilizer as a crutch by attempting to make it substitute for good soil management.

Vital as fertilizer is, it cannot do the entire job. It must be backed up by other practices that add organic matter, build soil structure and boost crop yields.

**New Insecticides Are Non-Poisonous to Bees**

One serious cause of bee poisoning has been that bees have taken dusts containing arsenic and have stored this poison in combination with pollen in the hives. Arsenic remains permanently poisonous but newer insecticidal dusts and sprays, such as DDT, DN and D.D.D., are less dangerous to beneficial insects as the toxic effects will break down gradually.

this manner that company officials are encouraged to believe enough pipe will be secured to extend service this year to a great many new customers who want gas service and to remedy the local bottlenecks mentioned.

Expansion work now underway or to be started in the immediate future, includes the following items, Hinchey said:

(1) Installation of a 300 horsepower compressor near Fritch, Texas, to increase suction to the Turkey Creek (Field) Compressor Station. Part of material now on hand, compressor unit to be received in August; estimated completion September, 1948.

(2) Installation of three 400 horsepower compressor units at McSpadden Compressor Station (near Canyon, Texas). Nearly all materials on hand, one unit received, two to be received during June. Construction about 60 per cent complete; estimated completion July, 1948.

(3) Installation of one 300 H. P. compressor unit at Plainview station. All materials now on order; compressor is promised for October; estimated completion Dec. '48.

(4) Installation of an 80 horsepower compressor unit at Littlefield compressor station serving Levelland and Whitharral. Construction about 60 per cent complete; shut down waiting on materials which are expected in June. Estimated completion Aug., 1948.

(5) Replacement of nine miles of 1-2 inch pipe with 6 5-8 in. pipe between Littlefield compressor station and Whitharral. Approximately four miles will be completed during June, 1948.

(6) Replacement of ten miles of 1-2 inch pipe with 6 5-8 in. pipe between Tahoka and Brownfield. Construction will be started as soon as pipe now on order is received.

(7) Installation of a 300 horsepower compressor unit at Tahoka compressor station. All materials now on order, compressor unit is

promised for July; estimated completion Sept., 1948.

(8) Replacement of 10 1-2 miles of 4 1-2 inch pipe with 8 5-8 inch pipe extending from Littlefield northwestward to the point of intersection with El Paso Natural Gas Company's line between Amherst and Sudan. Pipe now on order and promised for June delivery; will be installed as soon as received.

(9) Installation of new 6 5-8 inch takeoff line to Odessa No. 1 Town Border Station and a new line to a new Odessa Border Station No. 2. This has been completed except that a portion of the 6 5-8 inch line is laid on top of the ground. This line will be buried in June, 1948.

(10) Numerous extensions of distributing mains and services to meet franchise requirements within the 44 cities and towns served are being completed each week as the pipe is received and as contractors' crews can make installation.
