**FARMHOUSE FLOOR PLANS PUBLISHED**

COLLEGE STATION — Farm families planning to build new homes can now get ideas for floor plans from the Texas A and M College Extension Service.

Extension Publication B-145, entitled "Floor Plans Of Farmhouses" has been released by the Extension Service and can be obtained at local County Extension offices or by writing to the Texas A and M College Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

The publication contains 75 different plans for farm dwellings of two to eight rooms, both one and two story houses. Many plans are

shown to accommodate families who plan to build small houses and add other rooms in the future.

Prints showing more details on any one of the plans in the publication may be secured either through the local county home demonstration agent or county agricultural agent, or may be requested directly from the Extension Service at College Station.

**"BOILED" HAM NOT BOILED**

COLLEGE STATION — "Boiled" ham is not boiled by good cooks today. Neither are "boiled" eggs and fish actually cooked by boiling.

The term "boiled" as concerns these protein foods is a dated phrase that no longer means what it says, according to Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation of the Texas A and M College Extension Service. When prepared by cooks using modern methods, these "boiled" foods are actually simmered—cooked in water just below the boiling point, Miss Lawrence says. The high heat of boiling toughens protein, and housewives will get greater tenderness by cooking longer at lower temperatures.

Even "boiled" coffee is a dated phrase, Miss Lawrence points out.

Brewing tests have shown that the finest flavor in coffee is obtained by using water that is just below boiling.

The common use of "boiled" for these foods is simply a case of an old term that has lagged behind modern cooking knowledge and methods, the specialist says. She is of the opinion that the attention of housewives would be called to better methods of cooking if these dated names and phrases were changed as cooking methods change.

**FIRE PREVENTION WEEK  
OCTOBER 6 — 13**

COLLEGE STATION — In connection with Fire Prevention Week, beginning October 6, President Harry S. Truman has asked "every citizen to do his part by learning how to detect and eliminate all possible causes of fires in his home and in his business."

According to a U. S. Department of Agriculture report received by the Texas A and M College Extension Service, the answer to the President's request must come to a great extent from the rural people.

Last year, fire destroyed \$200,000,000 in rural property—almost half of total fire losses in the United States. Fire also took 3500 lives on farms last year and 30,000,000 acres of forest land were destroyed by fire. These losses are now at a 16-year high and are climbing steadily.

For every week as well as Fire Prevention Week, the Department of Agriculture has made these suggestions to rural people for stopping fire losses.

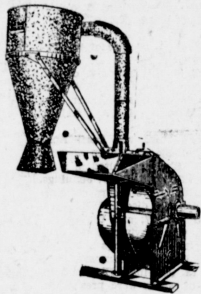
Keep handy at all times at least a few fire-fighting tools, such as water pails, tall ladders and fire extinguishers. Establish fire breaks around haystacks, farm buildings and maturing crops of high fire haz-

ard and go over the farm carefully looking for fire hazards and getting rid of them. Enlist the aid of local fire officials in making frequent inspections of premises; install proper lightning rods; and try to make new buildings fire-safe. Remember that the best way to fight fire is to keep it from starting.

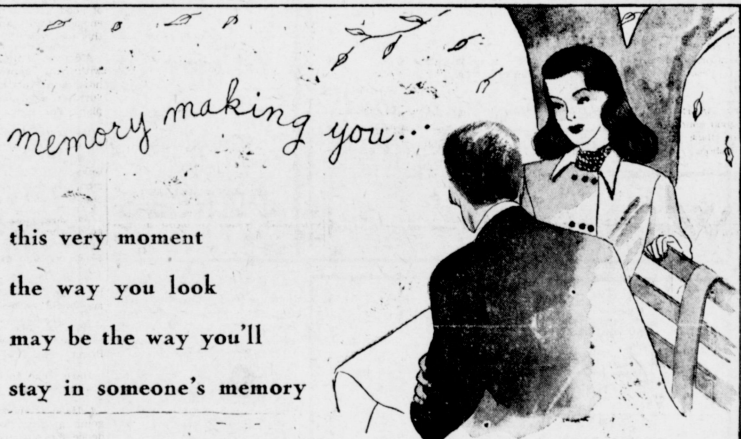

Mr. Reynolds, an aggressive American business man, started the pen company with a capital of \$26,000. The profits in one year of actual operation will be over \$3,000,000.

**9 Out Of 10 Fires Preventable, Says U. S. Chamber**

Asserting that more than 90 per cent of fires were preventable by simple, common sense precautions.

The United States Chamber of Commerce urges observance of the following "safety tips" recommended by the National Fire Waste Council.

Check from cellar to attic for rubbish—and get rid of rubbish. Check heating system. Keep ashes in

metal containers and shield fire-placers with screens. Supply ash trays liberally throughout the house—don't smoke bed—keep matches away from children. Send garments to dry cleaners. Never bring gasoline into the house for any purpose. Don't use flammable fluids for cleaning purposes. Replace frayed electric cords and defective electrical equipment.

"Farms and rural property are burning at a rate of about \$200,000,000 this year," the United States Chamber of Commerce said. "When a farm fire occurs, farm folk face the prospect of having their property completely destroyed."

"Farmers should periodically inspect chimneys and flues, lightning arresters, farm storage of gasoline, storage places of kerosene, barns and other buildings where spontaneous ignition could occur, as well as stoves, furnaces, and pipes. A heavy loss of life on farms occurs when kerosene is used to quicken fires."

"Farm fire protection consists of rigid observance of simple precautions."

"The destruction of property in the hundreds of millions of dollars by fire is outrageous. Only through organized efforts together can relief be obtained. President Truman has asked the United States Chamber and local chambers to organize an intensive campaign. The United States Chamber of Commerce sponsors the National Fire Waste Council, comprised of thirty six national organizations and in cooperation with local chambers is planning a campaign during Fire Prevention Week this year which should be of interest to every organization and property owner in the United States."

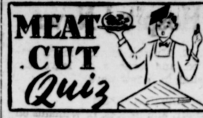

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. This is the rump half of a leg of veal.

Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?

A. This is the upper half of the veal leg, as distinguished from the shank or lower half of the leg. It contains the rump bone and a portion of the round (leg) bone. This cut has a high proportion of meat to bone; and, like all cuts of veal, comparatively little fat. If the cut is boned and rolled, it will be easier to carve.

Q. How should this cut be prepared?

A. Any large cut from the leg of veal may be either roasted or braised. This makes a very delicious roast, cooked very slowly in an open pan. A slow oven temperature (300° F.) is important in roasting veal. The roast may be improved by laying slices of bacon or salt pork or bacon drippings over the roast while it is cooking. Allow about 25 minutes per pound. The roast is done when a meat thermometer inserted into the largest part registers 170° F.

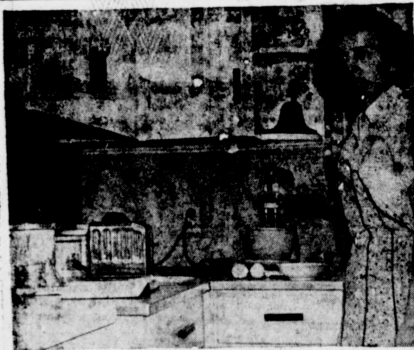

### Wire Rural Home With Room to Grow

"Electricity is an efficient worker that operates milking machines, runs ventilating fans, heats hotbeds, supplies power for electric clippers, dries the women's hair, delivers water to the stanchion cups, water tanks, sinks and bathtubs and runs the corn sheller and drill press—all at an amazingly low cost," says the article in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families.

"The future holds a hundred other uses for electricity on the farm. So the smart owner, when he puts in electric service, will insist on a wiring job that will not only take care of present needs but will serve equipment and appliances he is likely to have 5 or 10 years from now.

"Nowhere in the house is the need for convenience outlets so great as in the kitchen. Shown above is a double convenience outlet at counter or working height—an important item from the standpoint of use. Locate the outlets in the work areas and have plenty so it will not be necessary to take the electric clock plug to use the electric mixer, coffee maker or waffle iron. Some homemakers like an outlet near the breakfast or dining table for the toaster. Conveniently located outlets should be provided for the home freezer and refrigerator."
