Candidacy of Ralph Brock, Lubbock attorney, for Senator from the 30th State Senatorial District was announced here Saturday.

Brock, 32, former Lubbock county attorney before he waived classification and volunteered for military service, was born on a Crosby county farm Dec. 2, 1915. He was educated in Lubbock public shools, graduating from Lubbok high school in 1933 at the highest ranking boy scholastically.

He was a Texas Tech honor student from 1933 to 1935, then transferred to the University of Texas Law School. He was graduated there with an LLB degree in 1938 after receiving recognition for scholastic accomplishments including appointment to membership of the board of editors of the Texas Law Review and, his last year, having been awarded a first prize for the best case note of the year.

Brock worked his way through high school, Texas Tech, and the University Law School. His work included employment in an ice factory, laborer in the Texas Tech library, a life guard at the Lubbock swimming pool, and as a newsboy He was a guard on the state capitol grounds, an elevator operator, a creamery employe, a clerk in a state senator's office, a mailing clerk in the state park board and an employee in the oil and gas division of the State Railroad Com-

Brock began practice of law in Lubbock in June of 1938.

He was elected county attorney of Lubbock county in the summer of 1940 at the age of 24 and took office Jan. 1, 1941. Reelected in 1942, he resigned to enter the service, after waiving deferred classification. He entered the service July 2, 1942, resigned the office he had been reelected to without opposition, and relinquished the right to salary amounting to more than \$9,000. He separated from the U.S. Navy as a Lieutenant, (senior grade) in October of 1945, having spent forty months in service, 20 months of that time in the Pacific theater aboard a seagoing tug.

Brock resumed practice of law in Lubbock upon separation from the

announces. He has invited all members of veterans agriculture classes here to inspect the experiment, being conducted on the Bill Millen farm near Y. L. school, and in addition all who are interested in growing better wheat are invited to go along. He said wheat growers and handlers especially are urged to see for themselves what the eight varieties being tested have done under iden-

tical conditions with irrigation. The eight varieties being tested ara: Blackhull, Pawnee. Red Chief, Tenmarq, Wichita, Triumph and Comanche. Some of these are old varieties, some are newly developed and recommended for their high milling qualities, Mr. Adams said.

The test is really to demonstrate the growth of wheat under irrigation. Such tests are being conducted at other points, but Mr. Adams thinks that this will be the most important one because of the control that has been maintained on the project since its inception by him and Mr. Millen.

Thirty-two drill rows are devoted to each variety, and when it was greatest care to be sure only the variety intended was planted in each strip.

In 1903, E. K. Warren bought 40, 000 acres of land from L. T. Clark This was known as the Y. L. Ranch later sold the tillable land out of the subdivision is now Block W.

Blocks Z, X and Y, the Bovina Cattle Company Land, and block W make a continuous strip of land some six miles wide and thirty miles long, with an abundance of irrigation water from 20 to 100 feet below the surface.

At the present time practically 100 per cent of this land is in cultivation with farm homes on practically every 160, valued at from \$4,000 to \$15,000 each, surrounded by fine shade trees and flowers.

There are some 375 irrigation plants in operation, wells furnishing from 1000 to 1500 gallons per minute. The crops grown on the the dry land are principally grain sorghums, cotton and wheat. In addition to these crops, the irrigated farms grow alfalfa, spuds, onions,

and tomatoes, not to mention beans. Thirty-five years ago there were a few farm shacks, not a tree to be seen. The motive power was Pete and Beck, a walking plow, a one row cultivator, and a farm wagon being the farm equipment. Now the farm equipment is all kinds of modern stuff, tractors, two to four row cultivators, combines, haying machinery handled by one man, occasionally by one woman, that puts thse hay in the bale.

A. This is a butterfly ham slice, so-called because it has two sections or wings. It is also called a double slice of ham. Q. Where does the cut come from and how is it identified?

Q. How should this cut be prepared? A. Like other slices of ham, the but-terfly slice should be broiled or pan-broiled. 




